Junior classes had mini feasts, major local surveys and Play Centre visits.


Show Day fulfilled its promise - a great turn-out although partly wet.


The Library Ladies' Committee again served with excellent results. Could any school be better served by this band of dedicated parents?



OTARA REVIEW

CARE OF YOUR TEETH

Over the period I have been here I have been very pleased with the general condition of the children's teeth. I have also noticed the more healthy condition of the teeth of those children who take fluoride - they have far fewer cavities.

Living in a community like our where there is a lack of natural fluoride in the water - fluoride tables obtainable from a chemist are the next best thing.

Children's teeth are so important and unless they are cared for, it is inevitable that sooner or later a child will wear some form of denture. It is not difficult to keep teeth in good order.

Here is the A.B.C.D. for Good Dental Health.

"A" - Avoid sweet sticky foods.

"B" - Brush your teeth immediately after eating

"C" - Consult your dental nurse or dentist at least twice a year

"D" - Drink fluoridated water or in this case take fluoride tablets.

All children over $2\frac{1}{2}$ years of age are eligible for free dental treatment at the school clinic. After the Christmas holidays I shall start dental services again on 17 January 1971. Regular time will again be between Ruakaka and Waipu schools and I am always available at either of these schools.

The reality of the Law was shown to our Form I class recently when they visited the Magistrate's Court - newly opened in Whangarei.


Full courtesy was shown to the pupils even to allowing them (some) to sit in the Jury Box. A personal address by the presiding Magistrate

SECONDARY DEPARTMENT NOTES

This year has been one for "firsts" in the Secondary Department, amongst these records being the largest enrolment ever (228) our biggest 6th Form (30), our largest staff, the development of a new Library room, the institution of a Sports Council and the first 6th Form Ball the school has held. There is of course one significant "last" - the last year and the last magazine of the Waipu District High School.

A school magazine mirrors many of the activities of a school and may also give some impressions of what sort of education its children receive.

For instance you will notice that examination results for 1970 were again of a high standard, including the response of pupils to the teaching being provided and the support received from parents.

An extremely varied sporting programme has been completed ranging from our annual fixtures with Papakura, Katikati and our neighbouring schools to participation in a volleyball tournament and the staging of the Lower Northland Secondary Schools Cross Country event. All fixtures went smoothly, reflecting credit on the enthusiasm of pupils and the efforts of teachers and parents. Saturday teams competed in Whangarei with distinction.

The School Council has been active, in its scheme to "adopt" an Asian family in need.

Change is another theme of significance. In recent years, and especially this year, we have introduced what we feel are useful and progressive changes in our patterns of subjects and options. New approaches to the teaching of several subjects have been adopted, especially those that form the "core" - English, Social Studies, Mathematics and Science.

If the High School to be established next year can carry forward and develop the pattern of service given by staff, pupils and parents in the past, then the future of secondary education in the area is assured.

The Johnny O'Connell Four provided the music at these functions. This added to their success.


The 1st term social was organised by the fifth form. In this we invited Katikati and Tauroroa High Schools as they were here on sports visits. This social raised \$36.00.


