RESCUE BREATHING

Many hundreds of lives have been lost each year through suffocation by drowning. A great many of these deaths could have been prevented if people knew the art of Rescue Breathing.

(a) Lay the patient on his back and if on a slope have the stomach slightly lower than the chest.

(b) Ensure that the mouth and throat are clear of obstructions, and if necessary, wipe out with the fingers, preferably covered by a handkerchief.

(c) Give the patient's head the maxium backward tilt so that the chin is prominent, the mouth is closed, and the neck stretched to give a clear airway.

(d) Open your mouth wide, make an airtight seal over the nose and blow. The operator's cheek or hand supporting the chin can be used to seal the lips.
