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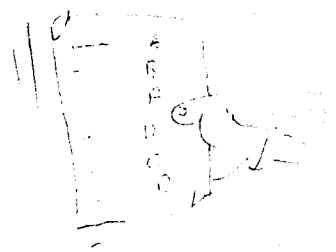

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



1992 has proved to be another extremely busy year with numerous happenings in all fields of endeavour. One area however has emerged as dominant throughout the year - and that is culture.

A particular highlight has been the involvement of students in cultural exchanges. Bream Bay College has had numerous students overseas on exchange. In return we have enjoyed overseas students attending our college and living in our community. At different times throughout the year our college has been enriched by students from: Sweden, Norway, Germany, Canada, USA, Costa Rica, Brazil, Thailand, Australia, Tahiti and Tonga. The exchanges are of mutual benefit to those involved. The college owes a debt of gratitude to our host families who are vital to the success of the programme.

A second cultural highlight of the year was the visit of the Principal, teacher of English and 20 students from Higashi Senior High School, Osaka, Japan. This group was with us for a week and we were involved in a reciprocal programme of culture activities which culminated in the formalisation of a sister school arrangement. The visit certainly stimulated interest in Japanese Language - and this is a future challenge to the college and may eventually lead to students from Bream Bay visiting Higashi Senior High.

A further cultural focus during 1992 was the visit of Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra comprising 90 student musicians and 10 adults from Michigan, USA. Their performances for the school and community were rapturously received. With both the Kalamazoo and Higashi groups, the college received superb support from families who were prepared to billet the visitors.

The additional focus on cultural events throughout the year was obvious. We had visits from a violinist and pianist, drama groups, rock groups and the Dilworth Choir. The Maori Cultural group have been very active and have been called upon to put on a formal powhiri for visitors on numerous occasions. They also organised a multi-cultural concert. The Taku Manawa Singers were involved in the Northland Area Health Board launch of the video Te Ha O Te Hau Ora as part of an anti-smoking campaign. The group also sang live on Radio Ngati Hine.

Music continued as a great strength of the college. The Variety Concert has become ^{one} of the annual events. "Power Recall" were our top band and they won Best Stage Act at the Auckland zone final of the Battle of the Bands.

The Youth Salute was a further cultural focus with our five top achievers representing the school extremely well both at the function and in the associated photographic display. Our school stole the show with the item from "Power Recall". An additional recognition of the high reputation of our musicians was the invite to provide the music for the inaugural ASB Sport Northland Secondary School Sportpersons of the Year Awards. Other cultural successes have related to junior debating and speech making. Then there was the annual School Ball, the Variety Bash, the Spring Festival, the visit of a Japanese Intern, the Art, Craft and Technology display.....the list goes on!

Although the emphasis was definitely on culture, 1992 was remarkable in many other ways. Linley Pirihi was New Zealand's Top Maori Scholar - and ex Bream Bay College student Rachel Weir was Top Girl Scholar. Both received \$5000 and a commemorative medal from the Governor General - Dame Cath Tizard.

1992 witnessed the Board of Trustee Elections. A new board was elected from a very competitive field of candidates. This new board has settled in and begun working hard in the best interests of the students. Bream Bay College also experienced its first visit from the Education Review Office who conducted an "Assurance Audit". The vast majority of comments in the report were very supportive of the performance of the college and affirmed our mission of "potential and self-worth developed in a caring environment". This is a great credit to the students, teachers, Board, parents and community.

As we look forward to 1993 it may be that the emphasis will fall on guidance and pastoral matters as we prepare for the introduction of vertical forms known as "whanau". Certainly exciting things are happening as we continue in our quest to improve the educational opportunities available to all students.

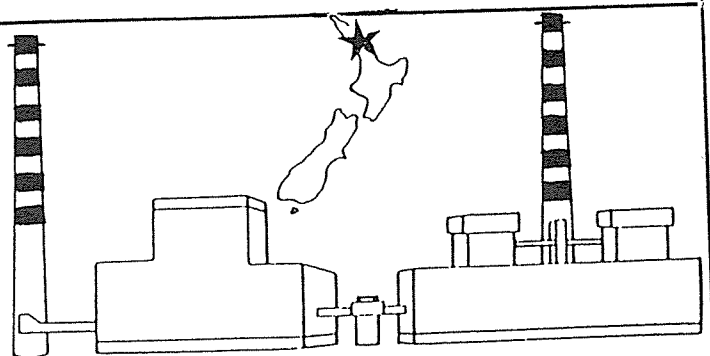
BOARD CHAIRMAN

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P.T.A. REPORT

The P.T.A. committee for 1992 is:

Graham Boag left the committee during the year to become a member of the Board of Trustees and we then welcomed Shirley Neal. We continue to meet in the College Meeting Room on the second Wednesday of the month and parents/caregivers are invited to join us.

The races at Ruakaka continue to be our greatest source of funds. For a gallops meeting we receive \$800 and for a harness meeting we receive \$700. This year, the P.T.A. has been involved with nine race meetings and our funds have been boosted by nearly \$7,000. Before each race day, members ring lists of parents to find out who may be available to help. Approximately twenty-five people are needed each time and tasks include carparking and gatekeeping. Support for this fundraising scheme is generally good, though lately we have struggled to find the numbers needed. Last P.T.A. committees have spent much time and effort negotiating contracts with the Whangarei Racing Club and we must not let such a profitable scheme slip through our fingers.

Catering for College events is another activity in which P.T.A. members are involved. The Senior Ball in August is a grand night that we enjoy being part of. This year, twelve ladies prepared and served the supper and both Homecraft rooms were used.

This proved most successful in dealing with the large number of people who attended. P.T.A. also organised ground security for the night. Other catering activities included serving refreshments on the Options Night and at the Spring Festival Concert. We also have the Senior and Junior Prizegivings to cater for shortly.

The second-hand uniform service continues to prove there is a need within the community for cheaper clothing. We held a successful sale in January and also had a uniform stall at the Spring Fair. Throughout the year families are able to contact the College office or our uniform organiser for clothing needs.

There are other activities in which the P.T.A. have been involved. In February, we had a stall at the Variety Bash and sold iceblocks and flavoured milk. Our A.G.M. was held in March and this featured a wonderful display of equipment bought by the P.T.A. During the first two weeks of the last term, we organised a group of ladies to work in the library and catalogue books onto the new computerised system.

Funds raised by the P.T.A. are spent in all departments within the College. Major purchases year include four tape recorders, soccer and hockey gear, furniture for Homes Economics, ten taiahas, girls cricket gear, spades, basket ball singlets and Leggo for Maths. There are many minor purchases as well.

Finally, many thanks to the families and staff who have supported the P.T.A. throughout the year, whether it be through helping at the races, catering, activities or monetary donations. A P.T.A. is only as good as the support it receives. We wish you all well and look forward to your continued involvement with us in 1993.

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ENGLISH 1992

1992 has proved a fairly typical year for the English Department. A full range of courses was offered from form one to form seven, and students have continued to develop the skills that we have come to expect at Bream Bay.

We were fortunate to have full complement of enthusiastic staff. One disappointment was in having to farewell Mrs Rosemary Jones in term 2. Mrs Jones had proved a hard working and dedicated teacher at Bream Bay College. She left us to begin working in the private sector. She has returned to school on several occasions and keeps in touch. We were lucky that Mrs Smythe was able to take over from Mrs Jones and bring her own style of friendly and positive teaching to the school.

One of the main emphases this year was on written work and reading. All classes produced a range of capable and creative written material. All teachers and especially Mr Flower and Mrs Moulton, worked very hard in the reading area and it was pleasing to note that a number of pupils showed considerable improvement in reading ability.

There were several highlights during the year. Things began with the now traditional visit by the Northland Youth Theatre in early February. They presented 'Broadwood', a very polished drama centered on the true-life, and much publicised incident, at a school in the Hokianga.

Next was the drama 'Taku Mangai'. This one man show by Willy Davis proved a culturally rewarding experience for all who saw it. Later in the year we were visited by a drama group from Kamo High School. They performed a play called 'The Minds Eye'. This was written, directed and acted completely by students. It was also a very polished performance and proved the standard that students drama can reach.

Another highlight came when the Ellis project visited school and showed the award winning movie 'Te Rua'. Students who saw the film remarked on the excellence of the production.

Other points of note include field trips (library, newspaper, etc) in-class drama, inter-class and inter-school debating, research work at all levels (and of the highest standards), entries in writing competitions, speech competitions, media work, the school speech contests, visiting speakers and so on.

One real difference this year was the arrival of several overseas exchange students. They brought a new requirement to the English teaching at school and provided their own refreshing input to the classes they were in. One sixth form class counted 10 different national backgrounds in its English class!

As 1992 comes to an end there are several things to look forward to next year. The library should see its new computer issuing and catalogue system in action. This will bring new benefits to research work. Sustained Silent Reading is going to be phased in at specific times as part of the school-wide curriculum move - rather than just in the English Department. There will be further drama visits and hopefully some visiting performers in poetry.

Thanks to all staff involved in English teaching, and to the students who made up the classes.

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SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT

1992 has been a year of consolidation within the Social Studies department. There were no major changes in curriculum direction at any level, just minor adjustments to the units taught and the methods of assessment used.

There were fewer staff involved in this subject this year, due to changes in school organisation. Mrs Meyer has taught all the Form 1 classes, and a third form, whilst Mrs Waerea has been involved in Form 3. My thanks to these staff and Mrs Craymer, Ms Filer and Mrs Raine for their efforts and dedication this year.

Some of the highlights included a

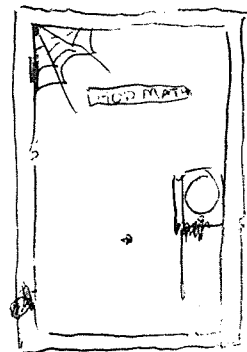
- Form 4 visit to the 'Battlefield' sites in the Bay of Islands and a overnight stay on the 'National Marae' at Waitangi

THE MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT



The teachers in this department are Mr Reid Form One, Miss Bren and Mr flower Form Two, Mr Simons Form Three and Form Seven Statistics, Mr Burton Form Three, Four and Five, Mr Day Form Four, Mrs Raine Form Five, Mr Whittaker Forms Four, Five and Six, and Mr Northey Forms Three to Seven Calculus.

Again students entered many competitions with results being of a high standard, the National Bank (University of Otago), the BNZ Senior Competition and the AMC (Australian Maths).

Successful students were Bevan McKenzie 99% (a distinction award). David Sherwin 88% (a credit award), Lenska Papich 84% (a credit award). Neal Parlane 79% (a credit award) and Shane Bongard 74% (a credit award) in the AMC. Also Hawea George and Shane Bongard did exceedingly well in the Otago competition.

The new Maths Syllabus will be used next year concentrating mainly in the Form One to Four area. An inservice course was run early in Term One to help with this change. A Form Three Workbook was also introduced with feedback being quite positive. Workbooks are being planned for Forms One to Seven.
