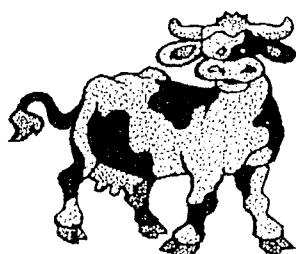

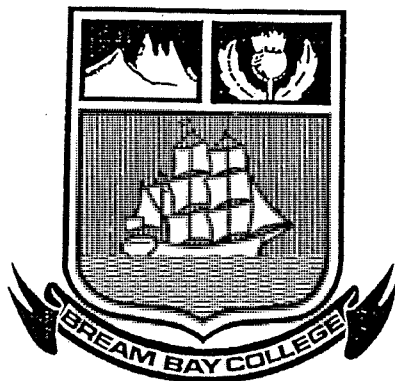

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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I would like to begin by acknowledging the huge contribution that the Board makes to our College. The contribution of the chairman especially has been huge. Mr McLeod has not given hours each month to the College but days. The issues that Neil has had to grapple with have often been complex, required enormous consultation and very often required heart breaking decisions. He has never flinched from that responsibility. I am most grateful for the tremendous support he has given me both in my role as principal and personally. I need also to acknowledge the support and tolerance his wife Dianne and his children have given Neil.

There is much that I could and probably should report on about the curriculum but there just isn't space. However, I would like to focus on an aspect of curriculum innovation. It is to report on the success of our three academies; the sports, tourism, and design academies. Students, who wish to follow a less academic, although an equally demanding but more vocationally orientated course now have three excellent options to choose from. Each course leads to recognised qualifications that link to the real world of work.

Individual students and groups have again excelled in the classroom, on the playing fields and in cultural competitions. However, who to mention. Kelly Fogden and Robert Simpson (mountain biking) and Dennis Macomber (shooting) have represented New Zealand this

year. Joelen Hardie (athletics) is ranked first in her age group for the 100m and 200m. Joelen along with Arepa Pairama will represent the College at the national intersecondary schools athletics championships later this year. Our boys touch team has made it to national finals. This is but a sample of our sporting successes.

We continue to excel at speech and debate. Bernice Drinnan made it to the national finals of the Lions under twenty three-speech competition for the second successive year. She also won the Rishworth Cup for the Rotary sponsored Northland speech competitions. We again competed in the manu korero speech competitions, Tai Tokerau kapahaka festival and secondary schools competitions.

Two long serving staff members have resigned this year. Ron Reid after coming out of an earlier retirement to teach again called it a day at the end of Term 3. Ron taught in the junior school, in the workshop and at the alternative school. He had a story and usually a song for most occasions. Paul Atkins has been with us for the last 6 years teaching music. He has been a huge contributor to the success of so many students and bands over this time. This year Kurios made it into the top 16 bands of the Rockquest competition. Funk Monkees went one better and made the final 8.

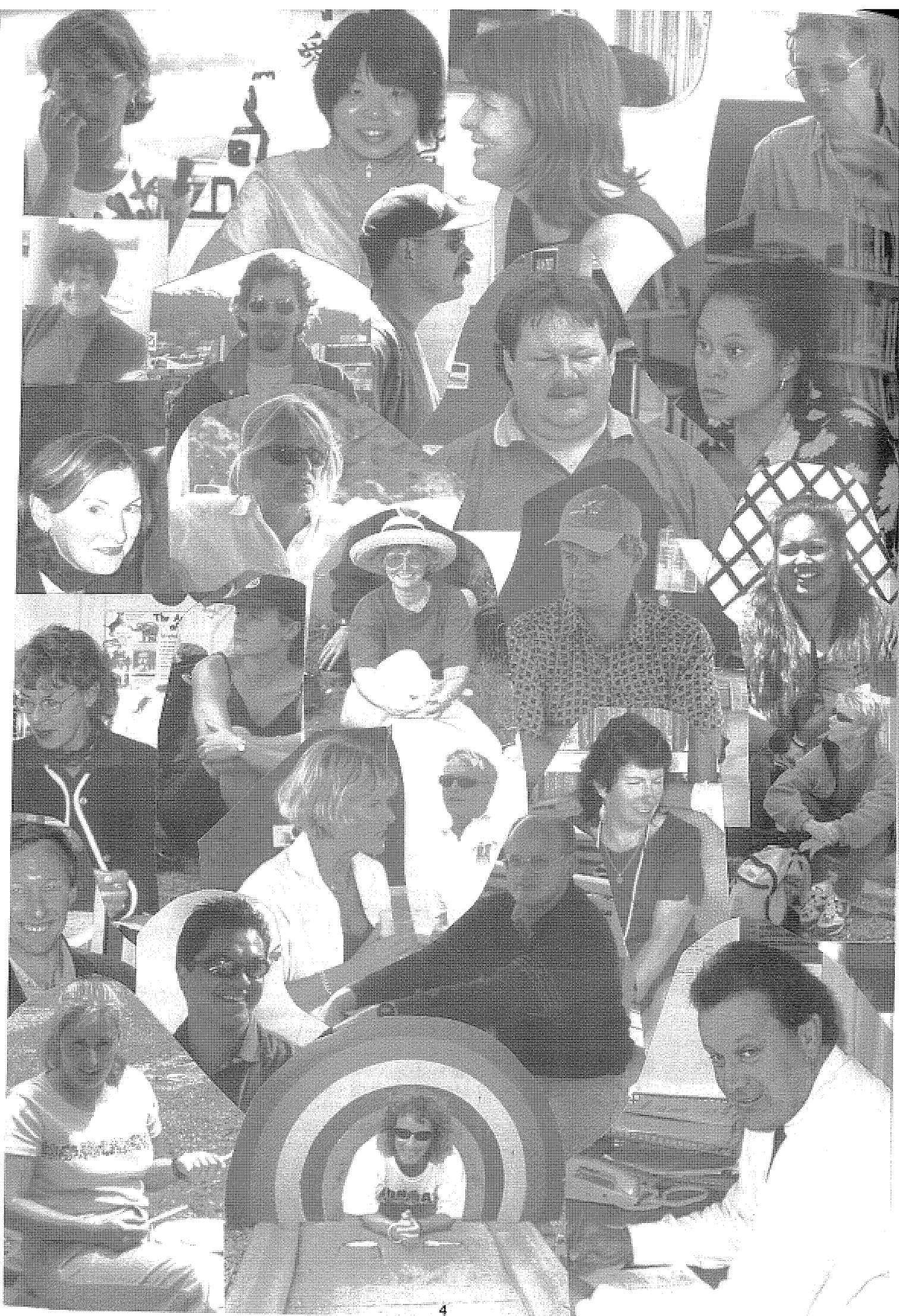
This was achieved in a starting field of 600 bands. Paul has given way beyond the call of duty. He provides gear and his musician friends for the variety concert. He has arranged gigs for our top bands. Wherever our kids are he is there. He is an outstanding musician in his own right. And he has given so much of his talent and time so our kids can play

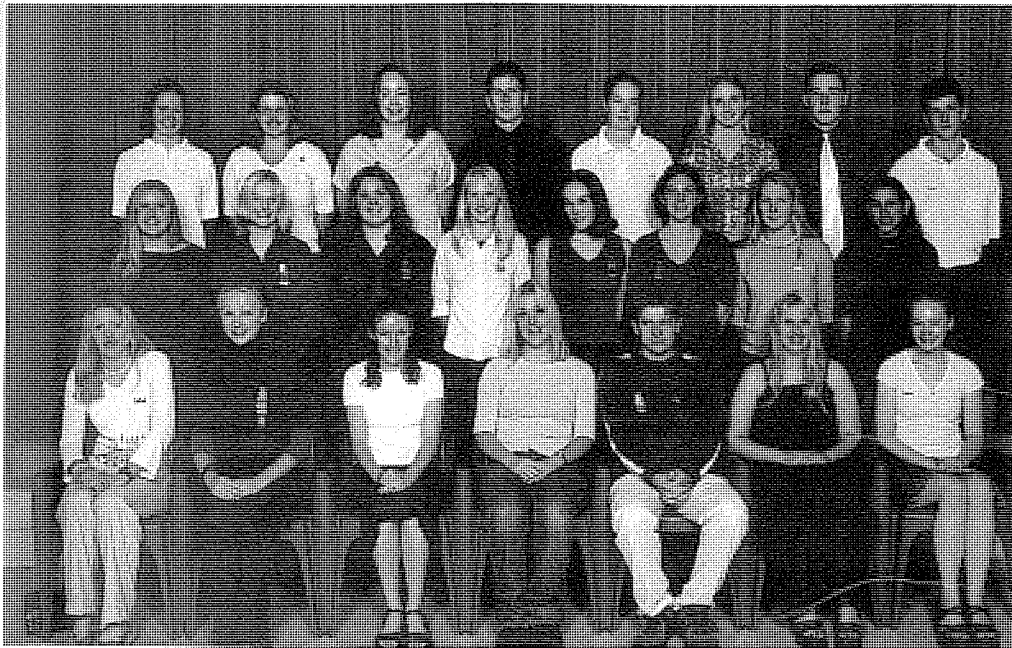
The Majority of the meetings ran smoothly , and this is due to the many supportive student

Students returned to school to find the Workshop and Home Economics roof being replaced. When this has been replaced the Art Rooms, Graphic Room and Mr Pitt's home room will have to be vacated so that the roof can be replaced. 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DESIGN ACADEMY

A new programme-a new challenge

This year Bream Bay College implemented a schools partnership programme from the Auckland University of Technology - Certificate in Creative Pattern Making and Fashion Design. This full year course consists of three modules:

1. Pattern making and sewing skills
2. Theory of Fashion Design and Textiles
3. Fashion design and Garment Construction.

Students had the opportunity to gain 20 credits at level 2 for Unit Standards.

The year began with 26 students enrolled, some of whom thought they would just be 'making stuff'. When the realisation struck that there was a lot of work to be done, the expectations were high and they would have to be committed for the whole year our class reduced to 20 very early in Term 1. Of the students left only one of two had ever sat in front of a sewing machine!

During the year the students have learnt to draft skirt and trouser patterns for their individual figures and make these garments. They have also learnt to adapt and alter patterns so they can make any style of these garments they wish.

The second and third modules increased their knowledge of textiles, their properties and usage and the history of fashion and the fashion industry. This course could lead them straight into further programmes at AUT and

one of the many areas in the fashion industry.

For me this has been a very enjoyable year and I'd like to thank Ginny Gardner for giving me the push to teach this course.

I have seen the students complete their assigned garments and their skills and confidence grow throughout the year. Some of them even made their own ball gowns! They all now have a very useful life skill and for some a means of earning income.

To the students that have been with me this year, I would like to thank you for a great year and I hope you look back on the year 2000 in the Design Academy as a positive and worthwhile year.

Tourisminfo.art

The sign over the new shop in the Ruakaka Shopping Centre says bbc.tourisminfo.art. It looks like a website address for travel and art information from the giant British Broadcasting Corporation. But [bbc](http://bbc.tourisminfo.art) stands for Bream Bay College and the shop, opened on June 14th, is a new venture providing work experience for the 17 students taking the school's National Certificate in Tourism, level 2 course.

The shop is designed to promote tourism primarily in the Bream Bay area and provide an outlet for the work of local artists. It supplies information on Bream Bay and Northland tourist attractions, activities and accommodation as well as a booking agency for Intercity and Newmans buses.

Artwork currently on sale includes pottery from Greg Barron, paintings of local areas by Patsy Montgomery and Pat Couper, glassware by Revitaglass and Swamp Kauri bowls by Swampworks. Students selling their own artwork will also be an exciting feature of the Centre for tourists and locals alike.

At this stage Helen Stewart is staffing the shop in a voluntary capacity and it is open from 10am-4pm weekdays, except Wednesday and from 9am- noon Saturdays. Most Wednesdays, 10am-3pm will be used as a work experience day with two students at a time manning the centre and putting into practice what they have learnt in their Unit Standard papers. This opportunity will also

give them on hands' experience with business management, bookkeeping and business responsibility.

All of the students have completed and passed the Kiwi Host course.

Tourism teacher, Sue Matthews, said that part of the long-term plan for the shop and students includes studying the production of websites and brochures and then producing the same for potential clients already in the Tourism Industry. Research and planning of Bream Bay tourist trails covering factors such as conservation, art and history is also on the agenda.



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TOURISM ACADEMY

2000 has been our first year for Tourism as an Academy and while numbers have fluctuated the enthusiasm has remained constant.

It has been an eventful year for the Tourism class and Term 1 saw us studying Attractions & Accommodation in our local area. So a trip around various accommodation alternatives, e.g. Langmead Lodge and Lochalsh Bed & Breakfast, and attractions such as Paul and Sonja Mrsich's Podgora Gardens, seemed called for.

Using the places visited on this trip as references and examples proved invaluable later on in the year.

Term 2 had us looking at Activities - passive and active. A day our horse-trekking and caving at North River Treks got us right

into the 'active' and talking to Ian and Ann about the tourism aspect of their business added to our general knowledge of how tourism is operating in the Bream Bay area.

The opening of our Tourisminfo.art Centre in Term 3 was both exciting and an enormous learning curve. The purpose of the Centre is to:

- provide a positive learning experience for students;
- provide a place for work experience so students can be assessed and practice their customer service skills covered in class;
- promote Bream Bay College and the Bream Bay area;
- promote individual Bream Bay tourism/business operations;
- provide an outlet for art and

- craft - including students own work.

To date all of these outcomes have been achieved.

This would not have occurred without the support of the community and a special thanks needs to go to Helen Stewart for her generosity and commitment.

Finally Term 4 had us heading north on an information gathering trip on features that contribute to attracting tourists and promoting the area, e.g. signs, entrances into townships and attractions.

First stop was Kawakawa with a look at the internationally famous Hundertwasser toilets - amazing what a good looking loo can do for a place!) This is an outstanding attraction that has brought hundreds into the town. The next stop was Paihia - a quick look around and then over to Russell. B. I have finally caught up with the Harry Potter series. It is great to be able to talk to kids about books they are reading.





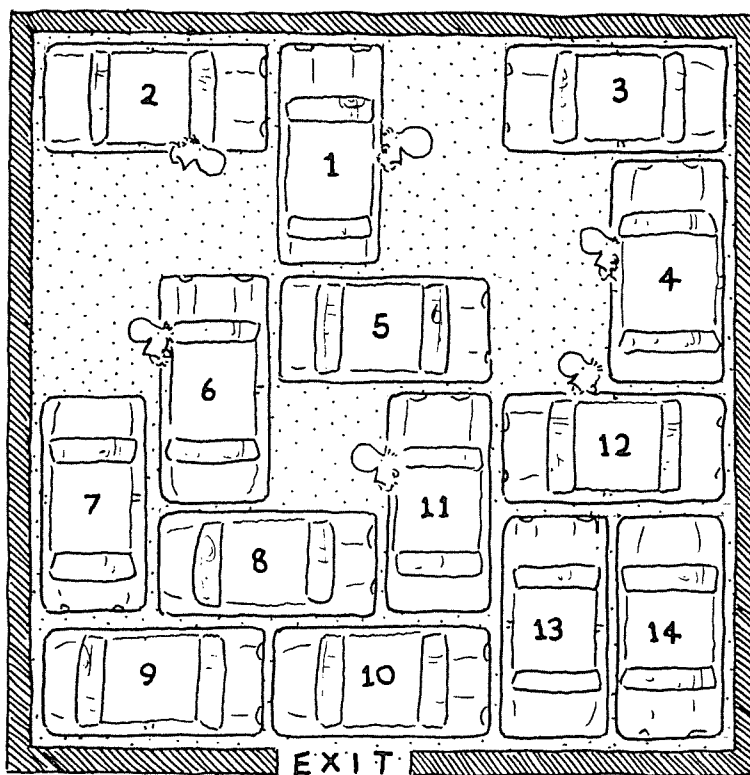

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MATHEMATICS

Welcome to the new Millennium and to new beginnings! New beginnings have been a main focal point at Bream Bay College this year. With this success in mind the Mathematics Department has undertaken many changes with many innovative ideas on how to help our students prosper.

As new HOD I have spent most of this year producing new schemes of work which I implemented to Years nine to Year twelve. We are now working to the National Curriculum document and covering the required levels for the appropriate age groups! They all now work on the five main curriculum objectives of Number, Algebra, Geometry, Measurement and Statistics each year. They cover levels 3 and 4 in Year 9, levels 4 and 5 in Year 10, levels 5 and 6 in Year 11, levels 6 and 7 in Year 12. There is an overlap each year so a level is repeated so that the work from the previous year is reinforced and not forgotten! By the beginning of 2001 Years 7 and 8, and bursary classes will also have new schemes of work.

The main objective of the Mathematics Department has been to make maths as an enjoyable as possible and therefore we have undertaken many practical activities. My classroom walls are proof that the students really enjoy these activities! We have also been known to have practical lessons out on the field with remarkable results! It is amazing how kids learn when they are actively out in the sun!

I have however enforced a homework policy so that all

students have at least 2 homework's a week. I think homework is an essential part of independent learning, which helps to reconsolidate the knowledge they have learnt in class. It has been proven to be very successful in their exams this year. Next year we will have all Years nine to eleven with their own homework book as well as a classwork book.

The response to Mathematics competitions this year has been phenomenal! Firstly 'The National Bank Competition' which we had an outstanding number of forty plus students enter and receive participation awards.

The 'Australian Maths Competition' proved again to be our most successful competition with Kallam Brown (Year7) and Glynn McCabe (Year 8) receiving distinction awards. Courtney Hayward, Ashlee Jenkins (Year 7), Matthew Bucknell (Year8), Erik Brys, Hadlee Barker, Lisa Brown, Greg Hemingway, Terrence Beardsell (Year 10) and Yoko Seto (year11) obtaining credit awards. Two students managed to receive achievement awards, Emma Knight (Year8) and Erik Brys (Year10). Finally but by no means least we must not forget

the participation awards for over forty students. It was outstanding the interest the competitions aroused.

The Form 3 Economic Studies class also made waves – on the sharemarket. The introduction of this class at Form 3 level allowed groups of students to study a selection of companies which they hoped would be successful. Our students then invested in their shares with \$50,000 allocated by the Stock Exchange in a 'Monopoly' type of game for secondary school students. With over 900 entries throughout New Zealand, competition was tough, especially for third formers competing against 7th formers, some of whom must have had inside knowledge of sharemarket movements.

Despite this, several of the

Students made perceptive choices, especially in Fletcher Challenge and technology firms; buying Telecom shares on the downwards slide hurt some groups but overall, the three groups made good profits – when most adults were losing on a falling sharemarket.

Our top group turned \$50,000 into \$62,000 in 6 months and came 29th in the competition. Was it good luck or good investing? The other two groups came 84th and 89th out of 970 competing. It will be interesting to see how well next groups go.

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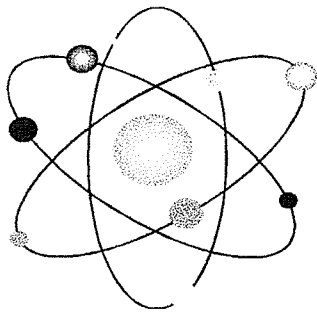
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SCIENCE

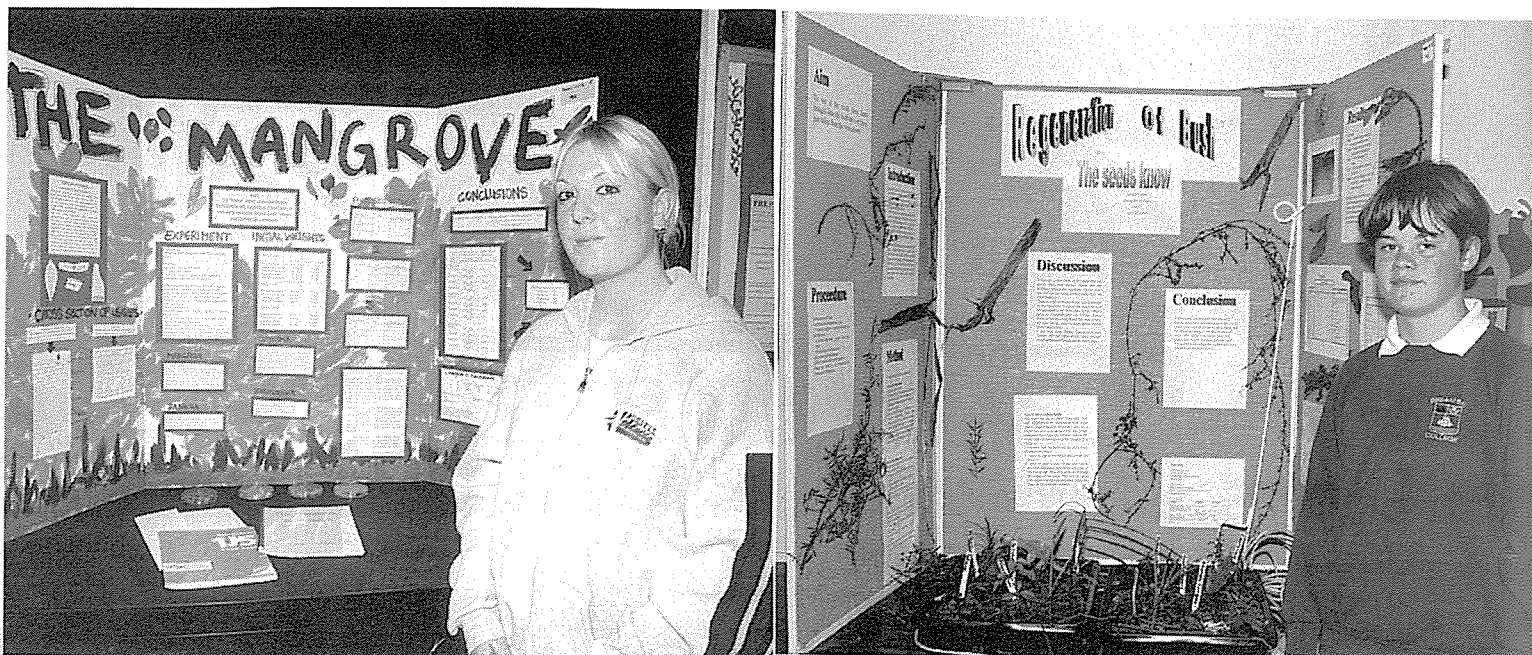
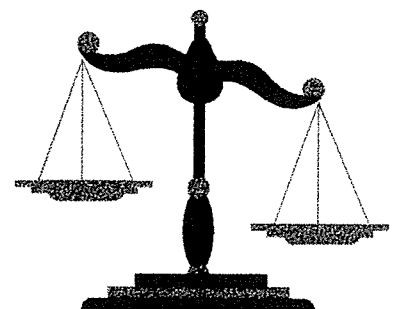

AUSTRALIAN TOUR

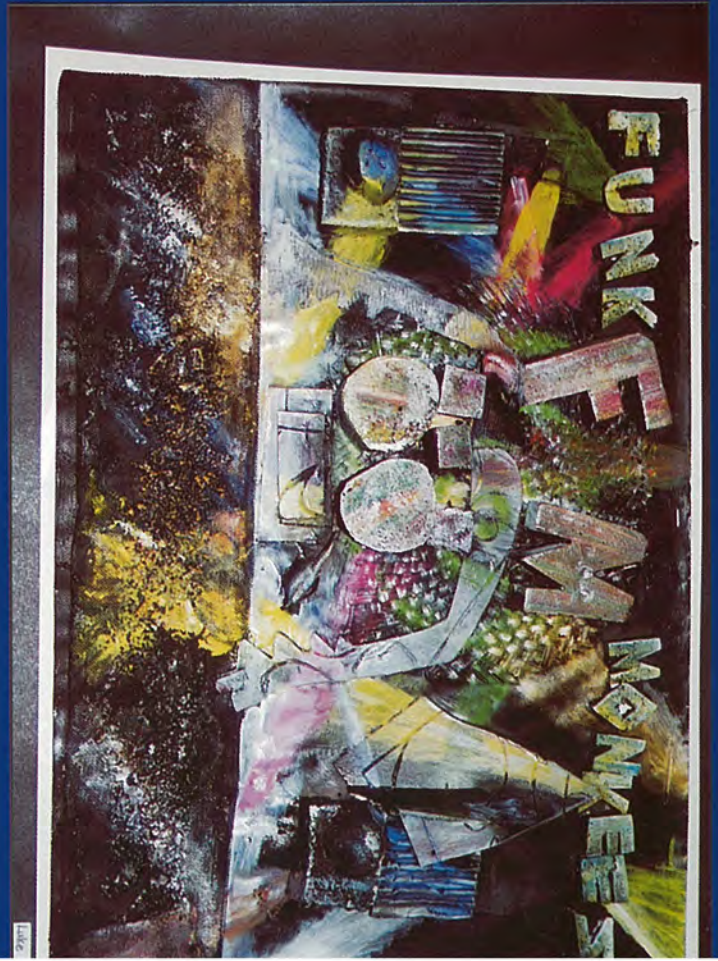
Term 3

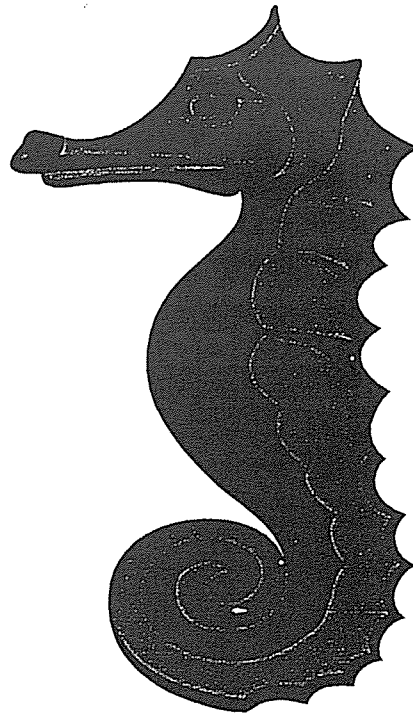


MARRIAGE

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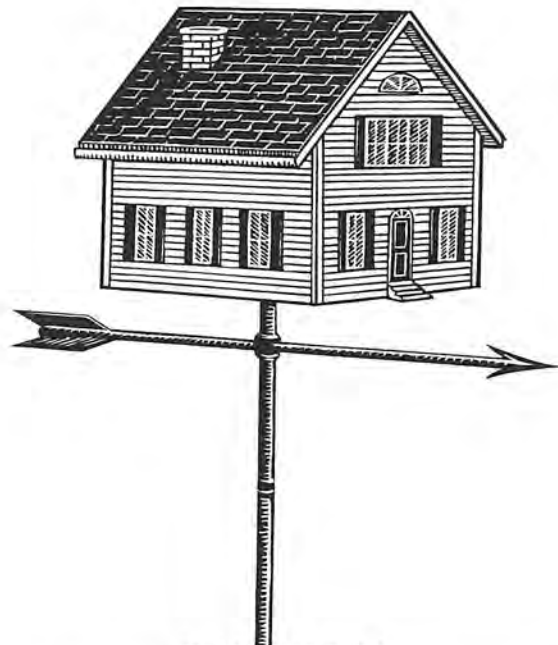

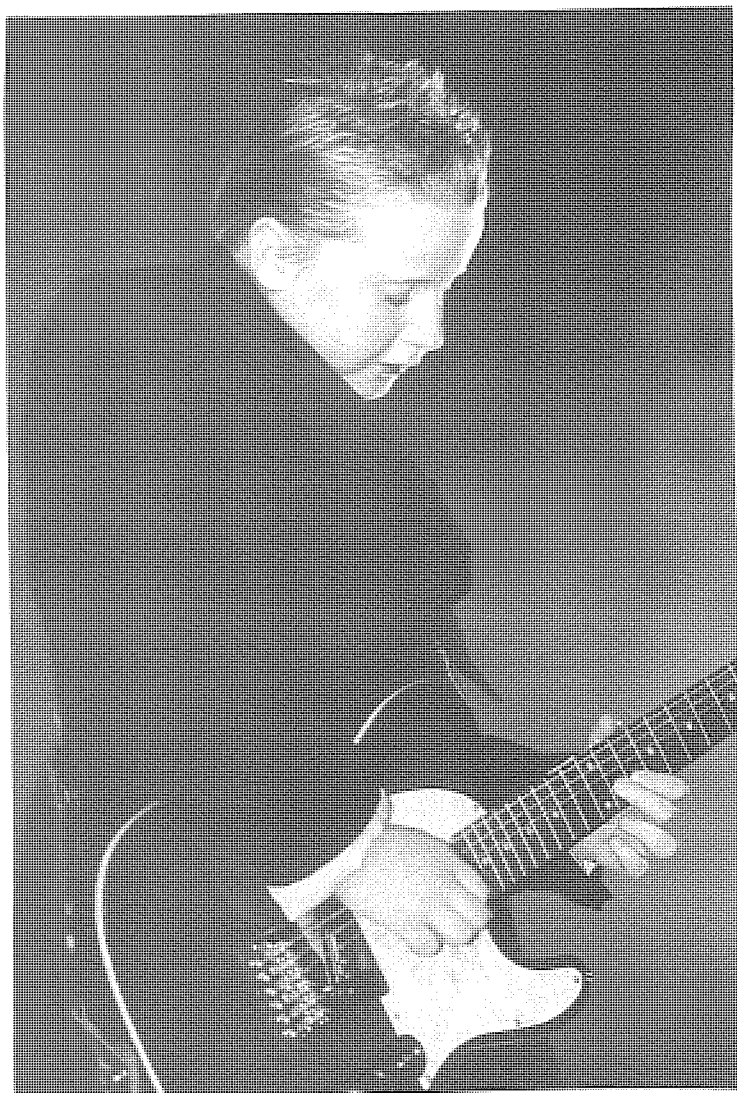

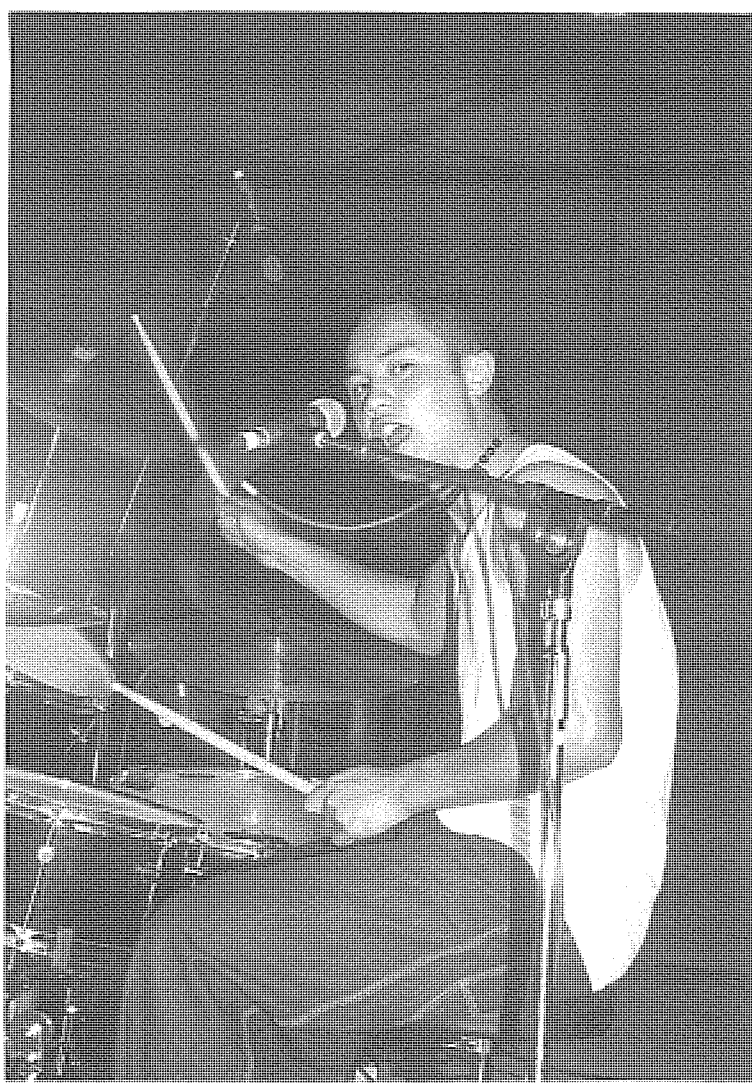

manner.

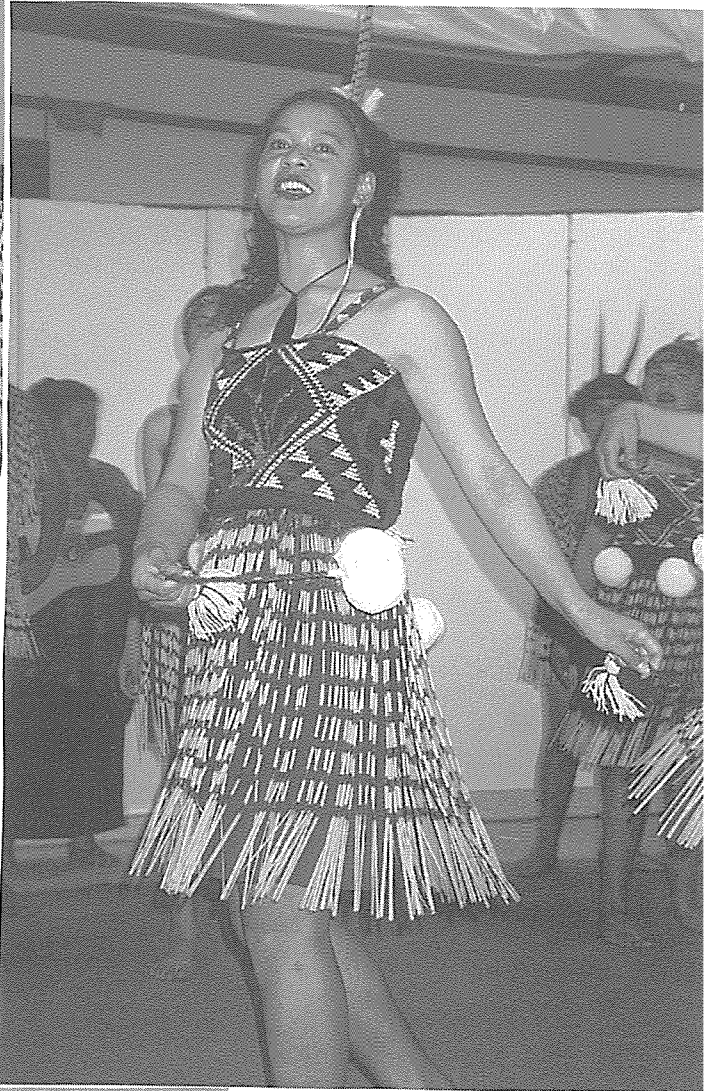
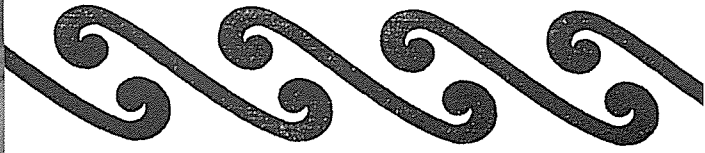

WINNING WAYS WITH SPEECHES

Bream Bay College students have a fine tradition in speech making. Many of our students have gone on to win speeches in regional and national competitions in the history of our school. We have had national success in the English section of Manu Korero, and the Lions 'Youth of the Year'. In recent years our students have regularly won the Northland Rishworth Speech Competition and have been finalists in the national Lions Speech Awards. The late Ray McCullum, Head of English for 25 years, fostered this skill in the school and it still continues.

Earlier this month 60 finalists checked their cue cards for the last time and faced their peers to deliver their speeches. This year 3 judges had the pleasure of adjudicating and we listened carefully, laughed at the wit of our students, were persuaded and informed by them and then finally had to make our decisions.

What makes a good speech? It's rather like the question of what makes a good band. It is the ability to connect with the audience and by using a variety of skills have them believe in your performance. The task for student's to deliver a formal speech to their peers is a difficult one. A winning speech in this situation needs to be interesting, contain humorous anecdotes if possible, but still be informative. Not an easy task even for adults but all the winners on the day showed these skills.

Senior Section. (Forms 5,6,7.)

1st Place. Ruby Mitchell.
Topic 'What I Feel Strongly About'

This was a fine lyrical speech about living in Waipu. Ruby used anecdotes

her peers could identify with and descriptive language to build a picture of living in a small rural township and what she will miss when she finally leaves.

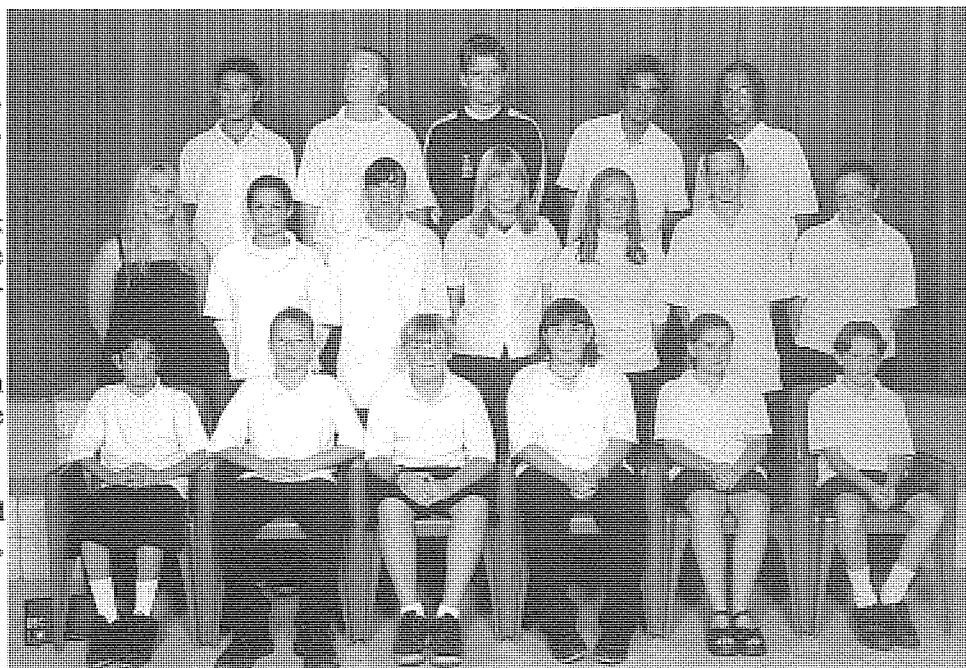

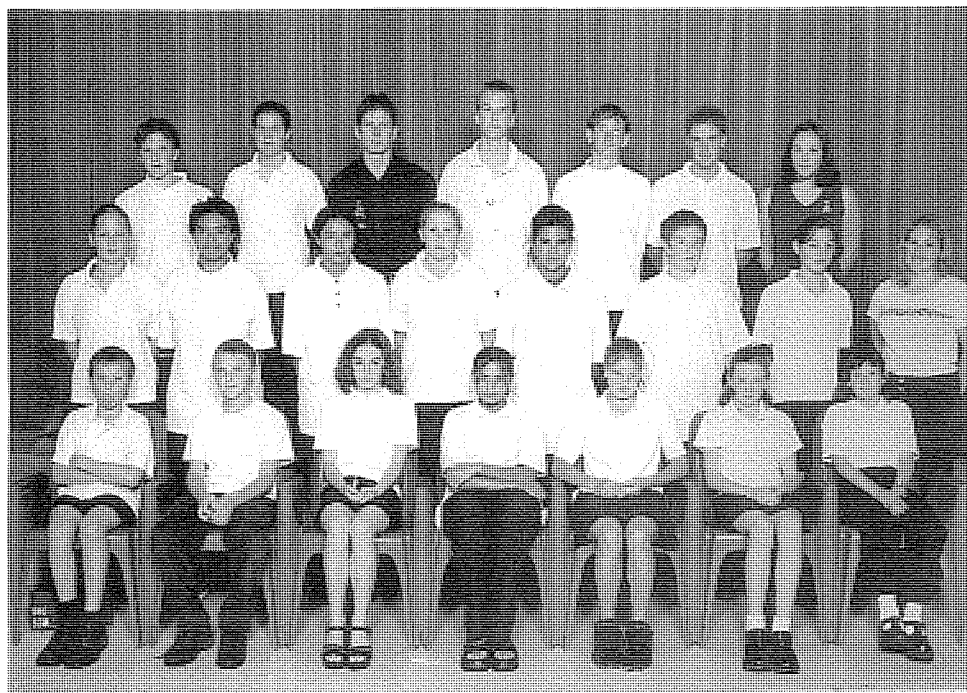
