Principal's Report

He mihi nui kia kotou katoa
Harei mai, harei mai harei mai

Bream Bay College is a great school in a tremendous location. Our students are warm and friendly; the staff are committed and hard working. I am fortunate to have been given the opportunity to lead and shape the future of this great school. I wish to thank the previous Board of Trustees under the leadership of Neil McLeod for entrusting me with this task.

With the help of the students, parents, staff and the board I wish to achieve a state of 100% achievement: I define this as achievement by all students academically, culturally, physically and socially.

By academically I mean that every student attains a minimum level of literacy and numeracy, develops their artistic talents, is ICT enabled, and excels in their areas of strength.

By physically I mean students attain a minimum level of coordination skills and athletic capabilities.

By culturally I mean being able to participate in our bicultural country and have experienced and appreciated other cultures.

By socially I mean having learned self-responsibility, the concept of group good and ways to appropriately interact.

To have students achieve in this way requires:

An environment where students comply because it is the right thing to do, not because we can wave a big stick.

That the school is focused on restoration rather than retribution, where underlying values that cause us to behave the way we do are surfaced, challenged and modified for the common good.

An environment where everybody can step forward and shine without fear of ridicule or alienation.

I will evaluate my time at Bream Bay College by how well we achieve these goals.

The staff of the school are vital to its success. This year has seen a number of changes. Sue Crawford the Deputy Principal was farewelled at the end of 2000. I wish to thank Peter Northey for stepping into the role of deputy principal and Virginia Gardner, Eric Hansen and Mark Bayer for stepping into the role of assistant principal. Their support as senior managers in the school has enabled us to undergo an immense amount of change in a short period of time.

Murray Lints joined our school as acting principal at the start of 2001 for a term taking over from John Fitzgerald who left after 5 years service. I wish to thank Murray on behalf of the school for his stewardship and leadership in what proved to be a trying time for the college. Your work certainly paved the way for me at the college.

This year, long serving staff members Lynn Fraser-24 years, Noelene Godinet-24 years, Irene Hill-23 years, and Barbara Milne-20 years have departed. We wish them well in their retirements. Ngaire Tauhara-White to another teaching position, Kevin Pitts left to Australia, Tanya Petrove to the correspondence school, Debbie Woodward to have a baby, Lisa Lumsden to have a baby and study leave, Calidah McKenzie to have a baby, John Cameron, Penny Goodall are leaving to seek out new challenges and Joanne Hammon-study leave for 2002.

These movements have made places for Hannah Edge, Clair Sargeant, Tearani Cooper, Wendy Kake, Karen McCulley and Rachel Adams. I wish again to publicly welcome these staff members to our school.

Lastly we were saddened to hear of the passing away of Mr Ron Reid, a long serving Bream Bay College teacher.

I wish to acknowledge the work and commitment of the previous board, made up of Kerrie Lomas, Huw Turner, Neil McLeod, Graham Matthews, Tracey Poutama-Mackie and Marie Smyth. I certainly enjoyed the short time I had working with you.

The new board of Peter Dunn, Sandra Hayward, Tracey Poutama-Mackie, Gavin Sims, Marie Smyth, student representatives Judy Dunn followed by Gemma Taylor, Stuart Abercrombie and Sue Crawford has picked up where the old board left off. They are a talented group with a clear focus on the learning needs of the students.

My first impression of the school was, what a friendly place. The students and staff showed a genuine warmth and interest. This is a strength of the school. Students and staff are fiercely loyal and committed to the school. The parent body was shaken and unsure with some parents having opted to move their sons and daughters to other schools. I am pleased to hear that our parent body's confidence is returning and can report that we have re-enrolled a number of students from our area who were going elsewhere. I look forward to the college exceeding our parental body's expectations.

A particular area of concern has been some student's work habits. A number of students show themselves to be willing to sit back and cruise, or worse make put-down comments to others who seek to achieve. We will focus on remedying this in 2002.

The school had started on a rebuilding process in term one. From my first day we have continued this process full steam ahead. We have sought to document all aspects of the school but also improve all areas as part of this process. Any gaps found have been plugged or are in the process of being plugged.

Our education review office report was reassuring in some ways. The issues they identified were the issues we had identified and were working on. The senior management team has led the documenting and review processes ably, assisted by staff who volunteered.

They have produced a senior assessment manual, revamped all education outside the classroom processes, introduced a lunchtime tutorials programme, produced subject descriptors for every subject, revamped the curriculum structure, revamped the junior options structure, reviewed all aspects of student welfare systems, undertaken a complete review of curriculum quality control and delivery, reviewed all subject schemes, revamped the financial systems, introduced computerised student tracking, reviewed staff and student code of conduct and harassment practices, updated all personnel appointment systems, started on reviewing all policies, revised the appraisal system and updated the reporting systems, to name but a few administration areas.

On the individual student level all staff have focused on student management issues and sought to improve classroom outcomes. They have even adopted students, without them knowing, with a view to assisting and helping them achieve. The staff have focused on ensuring all senior students gain qualifications.

Along with this we continue to be a leader in the health promoting schools arena with initiatives like mana wahine and te roopu mana tama. We are a top enterprise study school with Marie Smyth being selected to be a Northland Enterprise trainer. We have continued to excel in music under the leadership of Rose Waerea and we continue to produce fine athletes.

I must acknowledge the work done by the PTA and Whanau support. The PTA has provided many extras for the school from their fundraising activities such as race days. They

fulfil a vital role by providing feedback to the school and taking the opportunity to ask many questions on what is happening in the school. They took on the task of upgrading the tuckshop area and seeking funding for a junior playground. They have been great company and terrific supporters of the school. Whanau support members have given freely of their time to assist with powhiri and kai, they have given valuable feedback and again asked many great questions. On behalf of the school I thank you all for your input and interest.

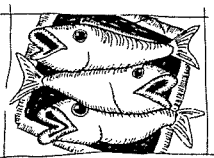
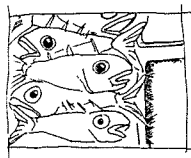
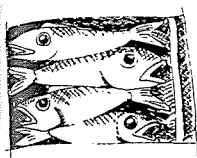

Mrs Fraser was known as someone who was always calm and collected, even in the face of the numerous student emergencies that cropped up every day.

Ms Godinet was at the College for 24 years. She was originally employed as a Physical Education and Health Teacher, but it wasn't long before her landscaping talents were discovered. With the support of Mr Warwick Aston, the founding Principal of Bream Bay College, the new and bare grounds were transformed by Ms Godinet into the beautiful landscaped, shaded area that we now enjoy.

Mrs Hill was at the College for 23 years. Initially she worked as part of a Government work scheme, but the quality of her work was recognised and she became a member of the Support Staff. Working with Clive Craymer, Mrs Hill set up a Resource Room that became the envy of many schools. She was responsible for all the textbooks and AV equipment. She oversaw the introduction of TIM (Text and Information Management) and BAC (Business and Computing) which replaced the old typing classes with computerised courses. She will be remembered as having the best handwriting on the staff – a skill that was often used in writing numerous certificates. Ms Milne was also very artistic and had a love of plants. This was immediately evident to anyone entering her classroom.

Mr Cameron was at the College for 6 years. Mr Cameron was appointed Administration Officer in 1995. His job was to oversee all support staff, look after buildings and ensure school financial practices were sound.

✕ The mice problem quickly disappeared thanks to Dean who squashed it under the heater.

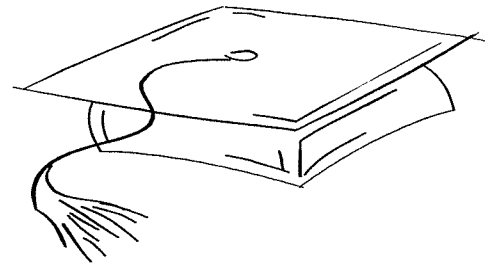
✕ The state of some couches and armchairs deteriorated but cheers to Laurance and Lance they were replaced with better versions. (Don't look under the deck!)

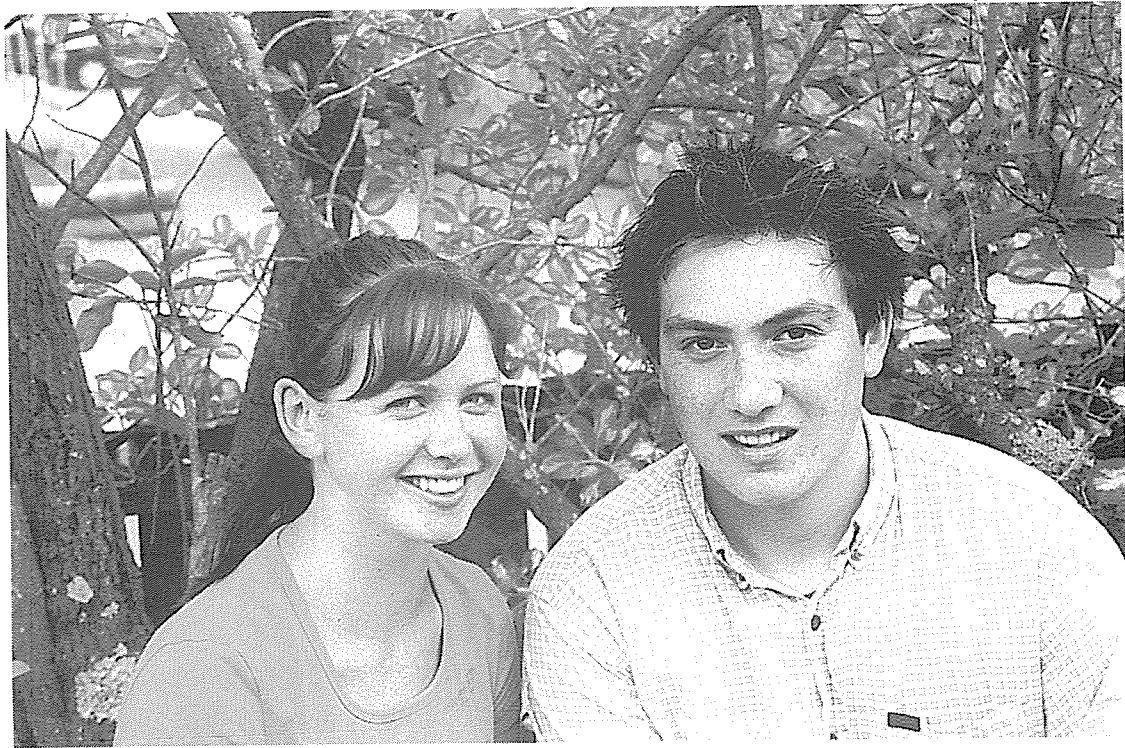

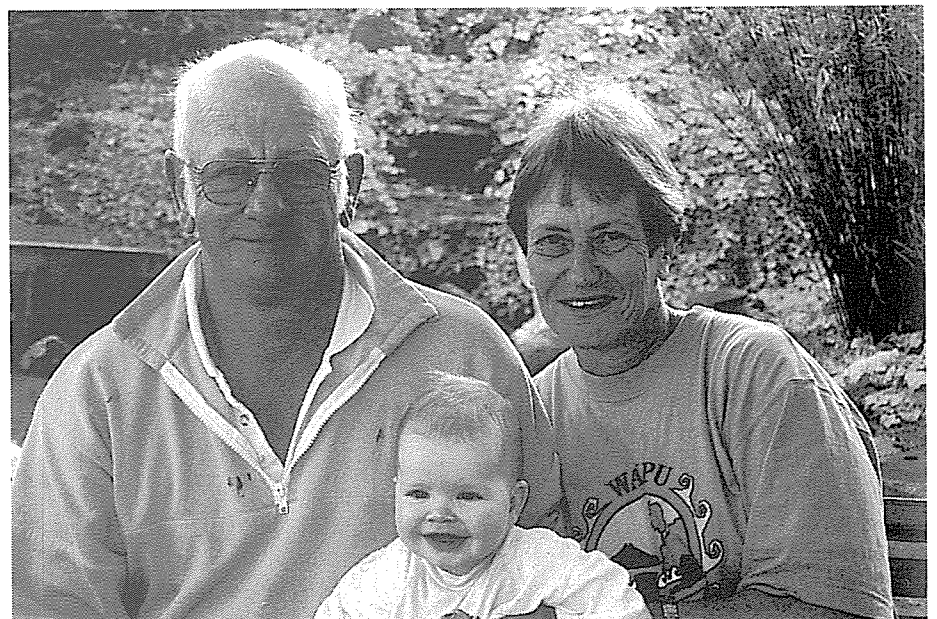
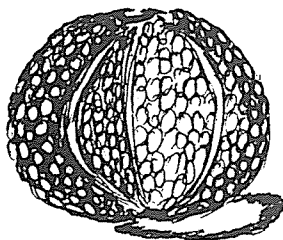

Porteous. The candlelit lanterns that were handcrafted by some seventh form

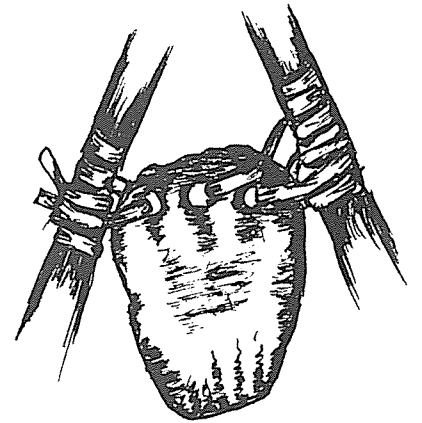
Students, and the hired pillars, decorated the foyer entrance nicely. The band

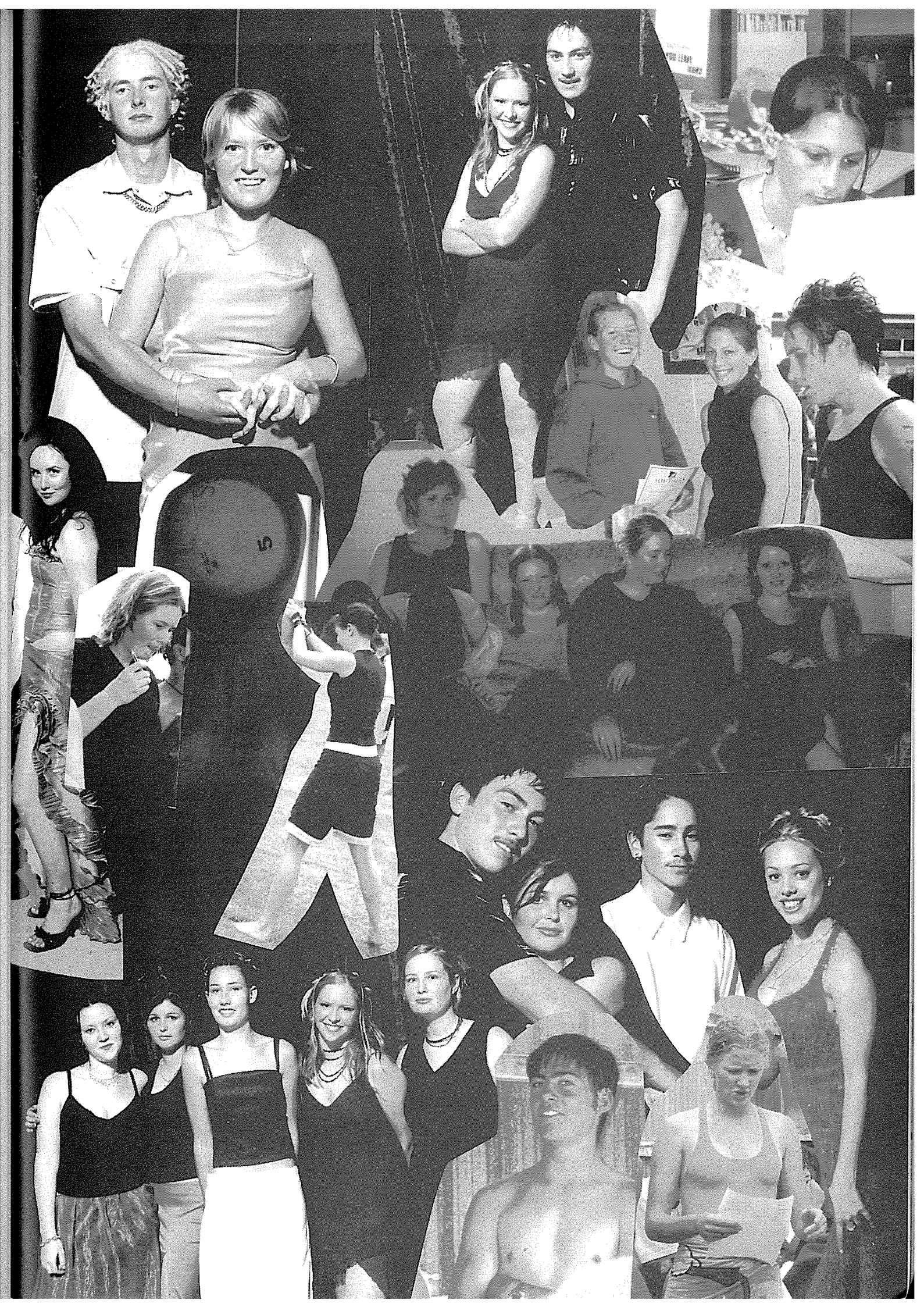

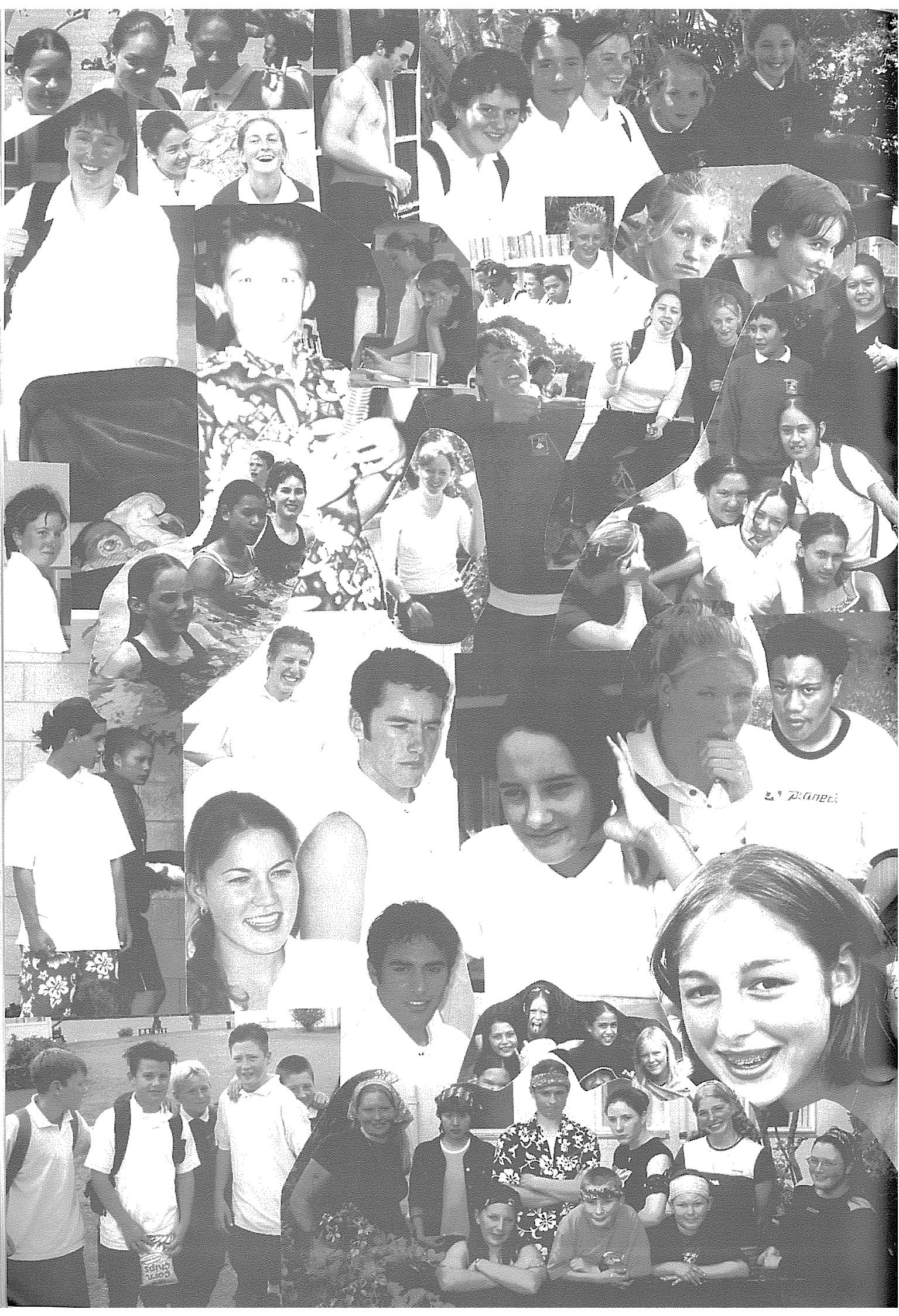
most photogenic couple was awarded to Harley Murray and Kirsty Borriello.

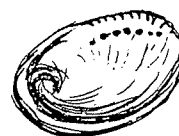
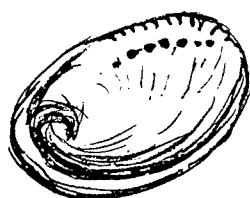

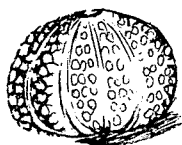
Ms Mackay was fair with her judgment of our quality of sewing and she always helped us when things went wrong.

played in the College League team which was unlucky to lose the Northland Finals to Bay of Islands College.

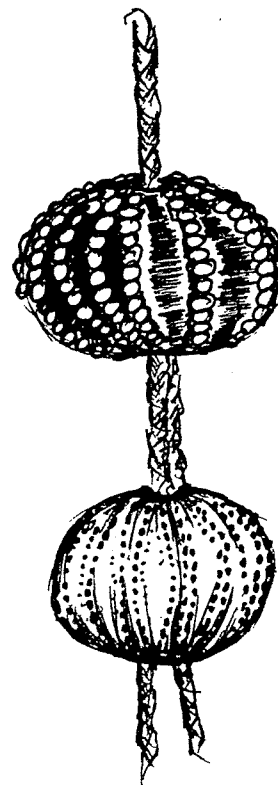
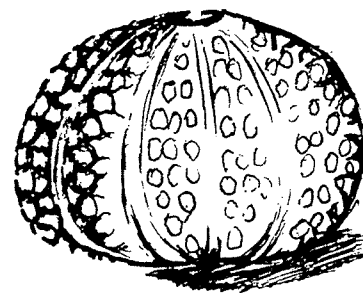
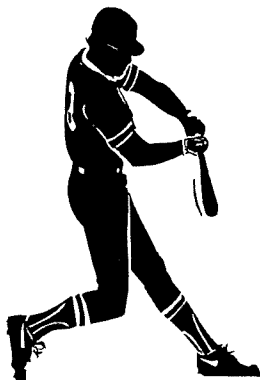

With this in mind we have endeavoured for success and achieved it with a record number of 'A' School Certificate passes in the Mathematics Department in 2001, which we haven't seen for a long time. Congratulations to you all! I would like to commend the following students on attaining eighty percent and above: Shane Barclay, Maree Vaile, Amy Jenkins, Nadine Hopkins and Campbell Sims. Let us keep up the good work and continue achieving at an even higher level.

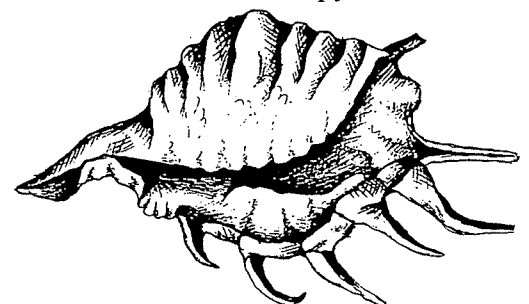
We have succeeded in having a very committed department this year and the students are beginning to really prosper being in a well established environment. I would like to thank our teachers Linda Bayer, Jono Simons, Marie Smyth, Pete Northey and all of the Years 7 and 8 teachers for their contribution to the department this year and their ongoing support.

As HOD I have spent most of this year improving schemes of work for Year 13 and familiarising myself with the new NCEA Mathematics Certificate to be implemented next year. Students are still all working on the five main curriculum objectives of Number, Algebra, Geometry, Measurement and Statistics each year. They cover levels 3 and 4 in Year 9, levels 4 and 5 in Year 10, levels 5 and 6 in Year 11, levels 6 and 7 in Year 12. There is an overlap each year so a level is repeated so that the work from the previous year is reinforced and not forgotten!

Earlier in the year, Years 7 and 8 had new schemes of work implemented by Margaret Northey, a big thank you to her for all her hard work. It has been a great success this year!

We set up an alternative to School Certificate this year which re introduced the idea of Unit Standards. It has proved to be very successful for a number of students who have managed to achieve twelve credits or more, which is equivalent to half a School Certificate pass. Given the success of this course this will continue to run as an alternative for NCEA next year in a separate class.

The introduction of homework books and write on books this year proved to be very successful for most parents/ caregivers to keep track of their children. Our homework policy is still that all students have at least 2 homework's a week. Homework is an essential part of independent learning, which helps to reconsolidate the knowledge they have learnt in class. Next year we will enforce again that all Years nine to eleven with their own homework book as well as a classwork book. Years twelve to thirteen will continue to have write on books, which helped them with independent study as well as the work done in class this year. For 2002 we our aiming for each student in Years nine to thirteen to have their own copy of a textbook.



We have taken part in a number of Mathematical Competitions this year. The 'Australian Maths Competition' proved again to be our most successful competition with four students obtaining a distinction award. Well done Brook Gilmore, Kallam Brown, Conner Power and Courtney Hayward. There were two credit awards for Ashlee Jenkins, Graeme Crawford and five participation awards for Mark Ashley, Rory Taylor, Jared Gravatt, Mitchell Franks and Karen Mc Aulay. 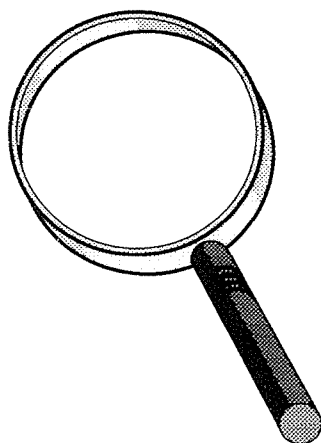

Congratulations to Ms M^cKenzie on the birth of Bella truly a Bream Bay belle.

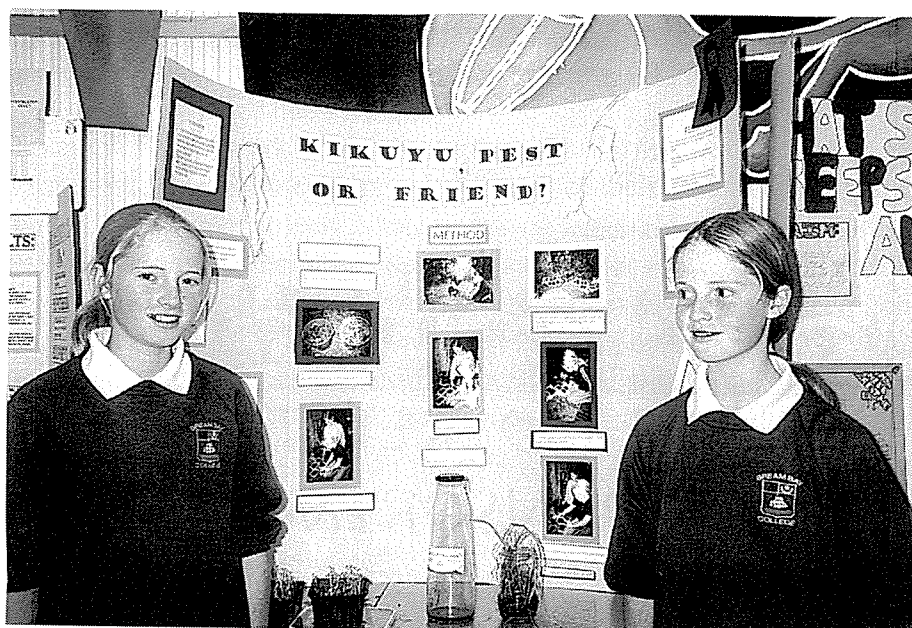
Welcome to Ms Adams who is capably taking Ms M^cKenzie's classes while she is on leave.

After such an excellent year we are hoping that many 4th form students will continue with their computing skills and elect to take BAC as their option next year.

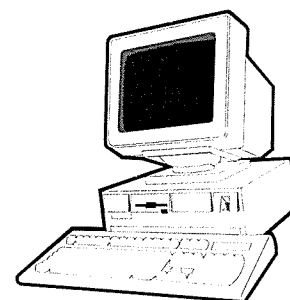

Commerce Department

Enterprise achievements flew the flag again for the Commerce Department in 2001.

Following the success of her community enterprise groups for the last five years Mrs. Smyth forth form groups again completed the top award in Northland at this level.

This years group consisted of Laura Aspen and Melissa Bell, Sarah Lyndsay and Steven Smyth who planned a project to provide two Ispy tables for Waipu Primrary school.

Amy Jenkins, Janah Mclean, Gemma Spring, Rachael Goodall, Nicky Grimmer, Charlotte Jones, Tessa Howell with their young enterprise company, Phat Cat Tales made a major impact in the Northland awards for their efforts in designing and producing modern books and CD's for young readers.

Their prize of \$500 (shared among the members) was for their effective case of Technology by a young enterprise company, enterprise exam, The Economics and Business and legal classes again made good use of community visits to illustrate the curriculum. Visits this year included

visits to New Zealand Yachts (with stop overs at the Pizza Hutt) and then the Whangarei Courts to make the studies more realisteic. Next year with extra legal studies being implemented, we hope to make greater use of the law courts.

H2002 at Form 6 level, the Commerce Department will be offering six management papers in the new Enterprise Certificate in Management. The Certificate is being promoted by the New Zealand Institute of Management, the national organisation of managers in NewZealand with over 5,000 members and 100 corporate members.

The Institute has become the largest organiser of management programmes in the country with over 60,000 people enrolled in its programmes. Its courses are used as training programmes by many large companies expecially those in the retail and food sectors, government departments and the army. Students who succeed in the new College courses will gain credit for these when they undertake training with these employers. It would also provide for suitable training for adults wishing to return to the workforce.

The new management papers will replace the existing 6th Form Business and Legal Studies, and Economic courses, although successful students will be able to pick up commerce

subjects at Form 7 without disadvantage.

Social Sciences

2001 has been yet another successful year for the Social Sciences Department. Exam results from last year were very good and numbers taking the subjects in the senior levels have continued to increase.

Staff

Staff teaching in the Social Sciences this year were: Mr Hansen (Geography, Social Studies), Mrs Waerea (History), Mrs Tauhara-White (History), Mr Turner (History), Mrs Smyth (Tourism), Mr Duffield (Social Studies), Ms Mackay (Social Studies), Ms Godinet / Miss Sargeant (Social Studies). All Year 7 & 8 homeroom teachers also taught Social Studies as a core subject. Year 13 students were able to study Classical Studies through the Correspondence School.



Exam Results

In the NZQA examination results released in January this year, all examination classes recorded class averages that exceeded the national averages. In the Universities Bursary exams, History recorded a class average of 62%; the highest in the College. The Geography average

was 57%. In the School Certificate results, History had the unusual distinction of having a 100% pass rate, with all students passing their exam with a class average of 62%, and the Geography average was 58%.

Growth of Social Sciences

This year saw 4 students taking Classical Studies. Although these students had to study through the Correspondence School, Classical Studies will continue to be promoted as a viable option for Year 13 students who do not want to study a Science or Mathematics. As the numbers wanting to take Classical Studies grows, a fulltime teacher will be appointed to teach the subject.

Numbers in the History and Geography classes have continued to remain strong. Geography is now the most popular option choice in Years 11 and 13.

Curriculum Development

The main focus this year has been in developing courses in readiness for the introduction of the NCEA next year. Mr Hansen was selected as a Local Facilitator in Geography for the Auckland and Northland regions. This meant that he was involved in training teachers in these regions in the implementation of the NCEA. It also meant that he was in a position to ensure that the transition to the NCEA in 2002 for Geography and History would be a smooth one.

In Social Studies, staff spent time in an In-Service course developing new units and Common Assessment Tasks for Years 9 & 10. Combined with the end of year examinations that will be held, these units will ensure a

more rigorous and consistent form of assessment across each year level.

Field Work

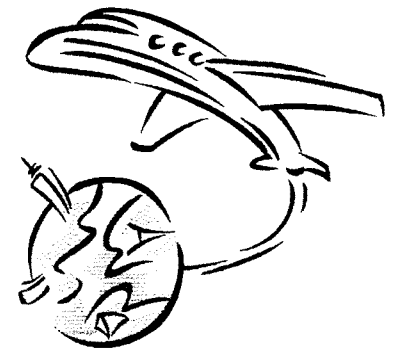
Participating in fieldwork is one of the more interesting facets of studying within the Social Sciences.

Social Studies – trips to the Bay of Islands to study the Treaty of Waitangi, to Whangarei to watch the movie “Pearl Harbour”, and to visit the District Court, to Auckland to visit the Maritime Museum and the War Memorial Museum.

History- a visit to the museum in Waipu as part of a study on the early Waipu settlers.

Geography – traffic survey along Marsden Point Rd, visits to local dairy farms, studies of the local area to show the range of landscapes, a trip to Auckland where students went up the Sky Tower to observe zones within the central city and then a trip through a range of Auckland suburbs, and a beach study.

Plans are currently underway to extend the opportunities for senior students next year with History trips to the Bay of Islands and the Waikato, and a Geography/Tourism trip to the Gold Coast of Australia.



Getting along in English

To be honest, at first I hesitated to write something about the Japanese students studying at Bream Bay College because I didn't know them very well, even though I am Japanese and I also teach Japanese here. I have made up my mind to try anyway as I thought that writing this could be a good opportunity for me to get to know what they think and enjoy in New Zealand and to leave a message for them.

There are five Japanese students who studied at Bream Bay College this year. First of all, I asked them a simple question - Why did you come to New Zealand? Their answers were almost the same and simple - to learn English. Some of them find it hard to learn English here and to get along in English. That is undoubtedly what every non-speaker of English realises, including me. It is difficult for us to speak foreign languages and to communicate in them.

Japanese students are struggling with English every day, however they realise how happy they are when they are talking with Kiwis! Midori Matsumura, who is one of the Japanese students told me what makes her feel happy in her New Zealand life is just talking pleasantly

with the Kiwi students. She looks really happy after school as she often tells me "I had a good day today because I was able to speak English a lot with my friends and enjoy school."

Sometimes I see some of the Japanese students talking to each other in Japanese. Although it could be easily understood that they have difficulty speaking to Kiwi students in English but it is a real pity as they tend to speak Japanese rather than English here.

I would like them to remember their reason why they came here. They can learn English even in Japan but when they live a life actively in New Zealand, they can learn more than just the language - the Kiwi way of living, thinking and everything! It totally depends on them whether they make good use of such a great environment or not.

Also, I would like the Kiwi Students to talk a lot with the Japanese students in English, of course. Speaking to them will please and encourage them to learn English. I hope the Japanese students enjoy getting along in English here and mix in with the Kiwis well.

Finally, I'll show you Midori's last impression of New Zealand - "I like everything in New Zealand, People are kind and friendly and it's a really beautiful country here."

"I want to thank my parents and host family who have accepted me and my teachers for letting me study in such a wonderful environment."

I love New Zealand!!!

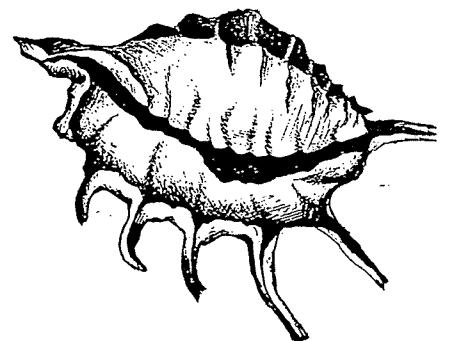

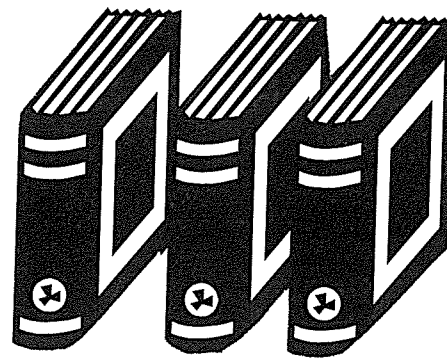

A new day has been born.

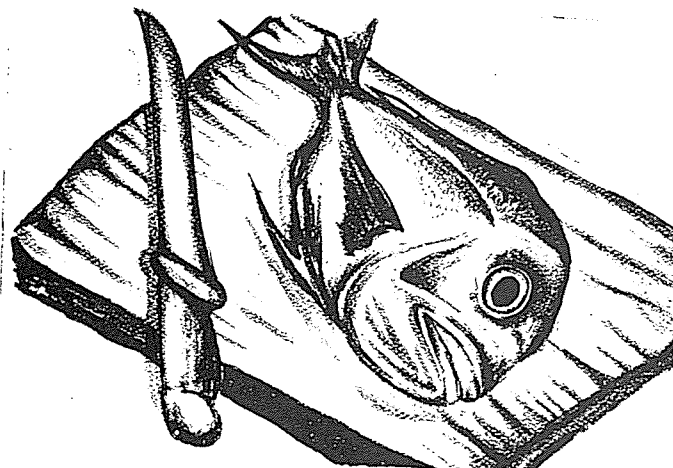
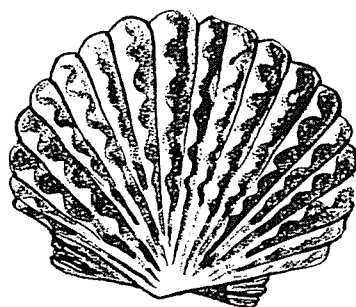

on tours to Matakoho, the Bushwacka Farm Experience, and to the Bay of Islands where they went to Waitangi and on the hole in the Rock cruise.

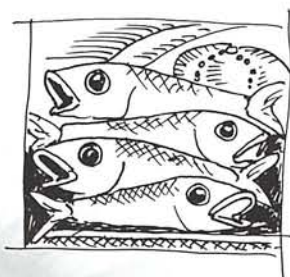
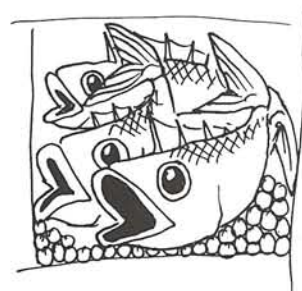
When at the college, students attended special English Language classes each morning, and then accompanied their host students were sports in the afternoon.

Special Education Department Report.

Perhaps a brief look at how the Special Education Department operates is appropriate at this point, as I often hear from parents and teachers alike, the need for more Teacher Aides.

As with all departments money is an issue.

At Bream Bay College we have students who because of academic or physical needs receive funding through the Special Education Services (SES) - Ongoing Resourcing Scheme (ORS) and the Accident Compensation Corporation.

These students have been assessed as having "very high" or "high" needs.

This funding is used to employ a teacher aide to work with the student as necessary and for the weekly period of time (hours), the money will stretch.

A Special Education Grant (SEG) is also used to employ teacher aides to work with those recognised as having "moderate" needs. These students have often been recommended to SES for ORS funding but declined.

I put in "... " the words very high, high and moderate, as this is the terminology used to identify student's positions, however for parents and teachers it is difficult to work within such definitions when we see children who we love and care for struggling to cope and keep up with their peers.

Ideally we would have resources to meet the needs of all students at all levels of achievement.

Ideally money would be there for the asking but in reality we all know it is not and therefore we have to work with what we are given.

To this end it is important to regularly review how we run our department and make alterations as necessary.

2001 has seen a few changes designed to assist the administrative side of the department running more efficiently. 2002 will see more in other areas.

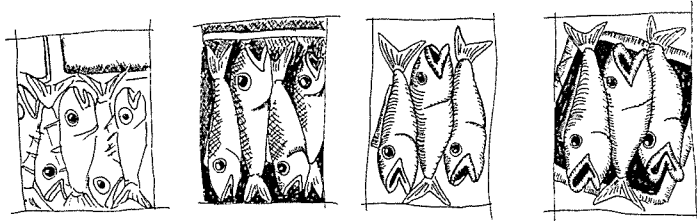
A staff of eight experienced teacher aides have been working with students independently and/or in small groups aiding them reach their potential.

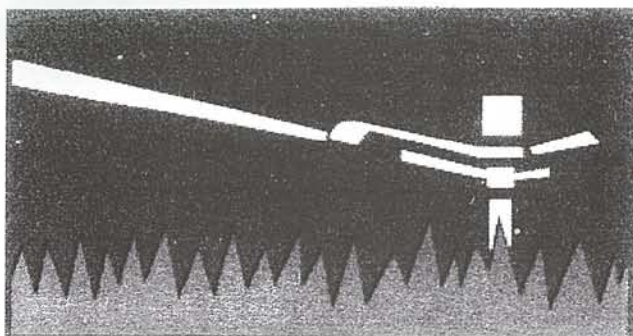
For ORS and ACC recipients regular meetings with SES personnel, parents, teachers and teacher aides have been held throughout the year to implement and review Individual Education Programmes (IEPs). Such programmes determine learning goals, both academic and social, and set in place strategies so they are successfully attained.

Again this year students have remained in mainstream classes as much as possible. They are only withdrawn if needs dictate in which case they continue with Correspondence or independent programmes.

Finally I would like to thank our Teacher Aides, Gaylene Weakley, Wendy Kake, Jocelyn Mudford, Donna Bell, Elise Hansen, Heather Sheilds, Tau Hita and Pat Levett, who have worked hard to assist a large number of students in a variety of areas and whose efforts are appreciated.

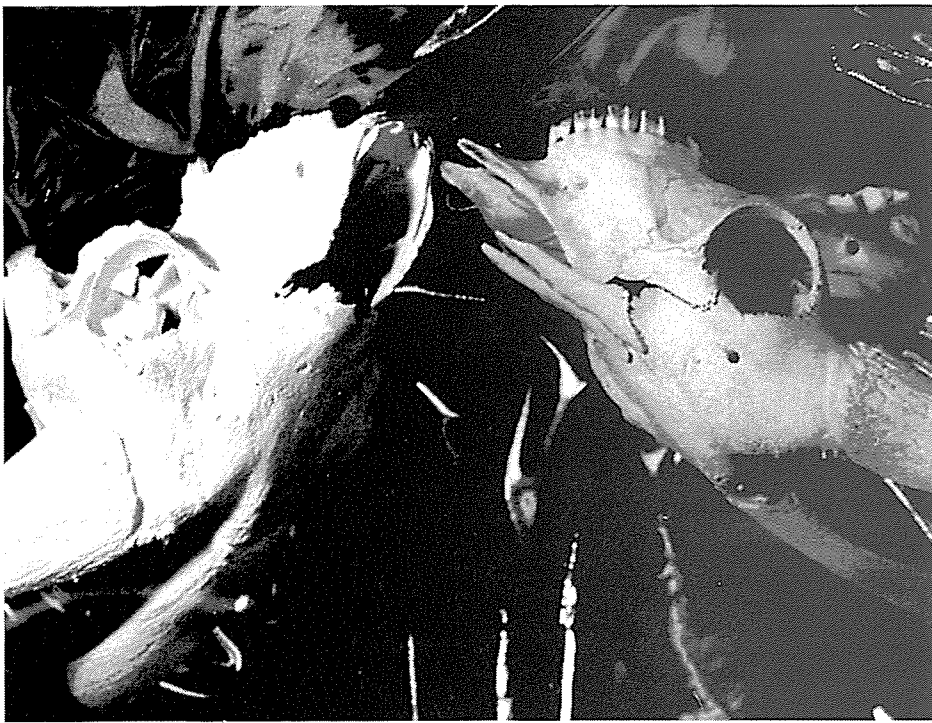
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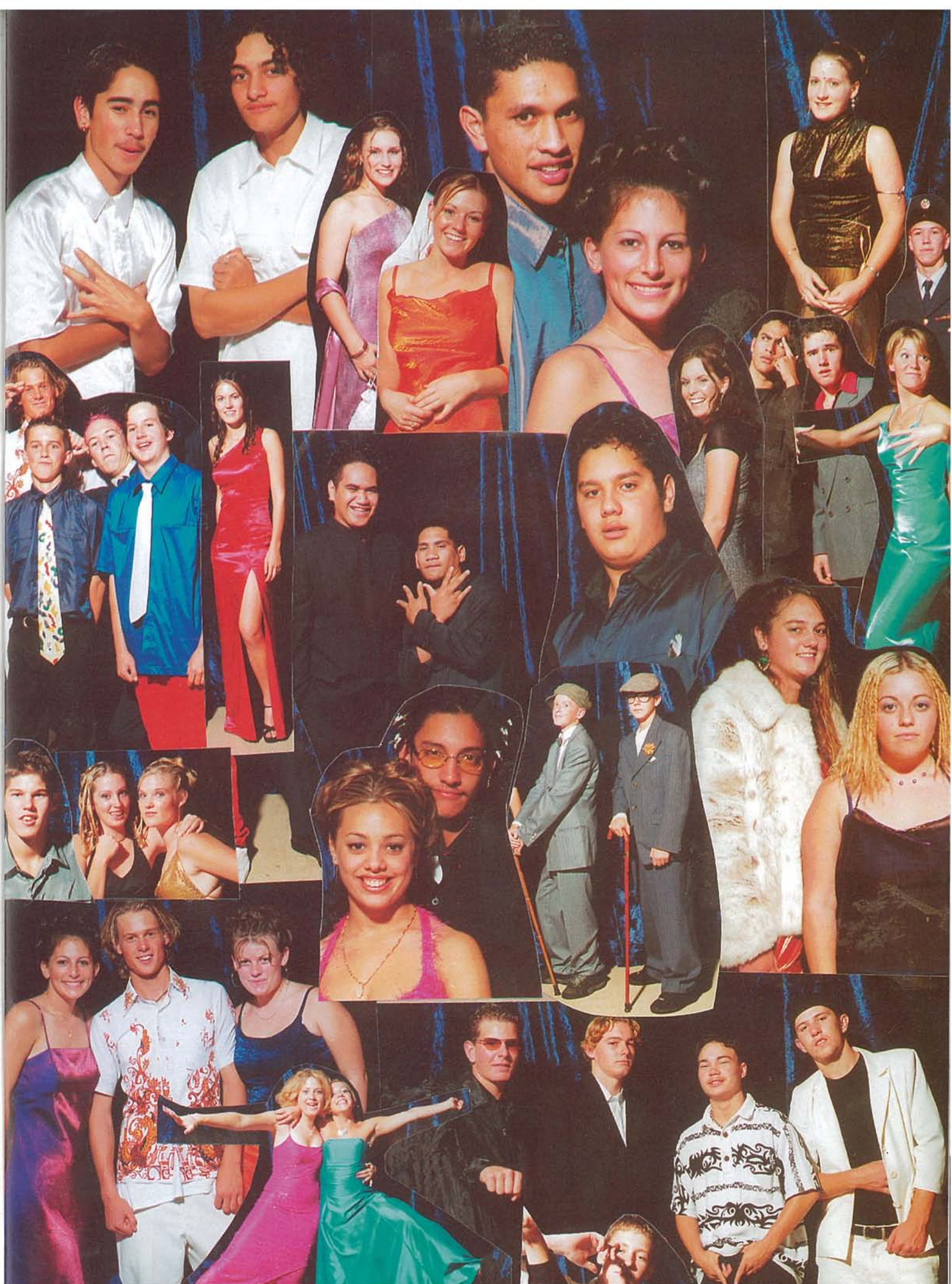
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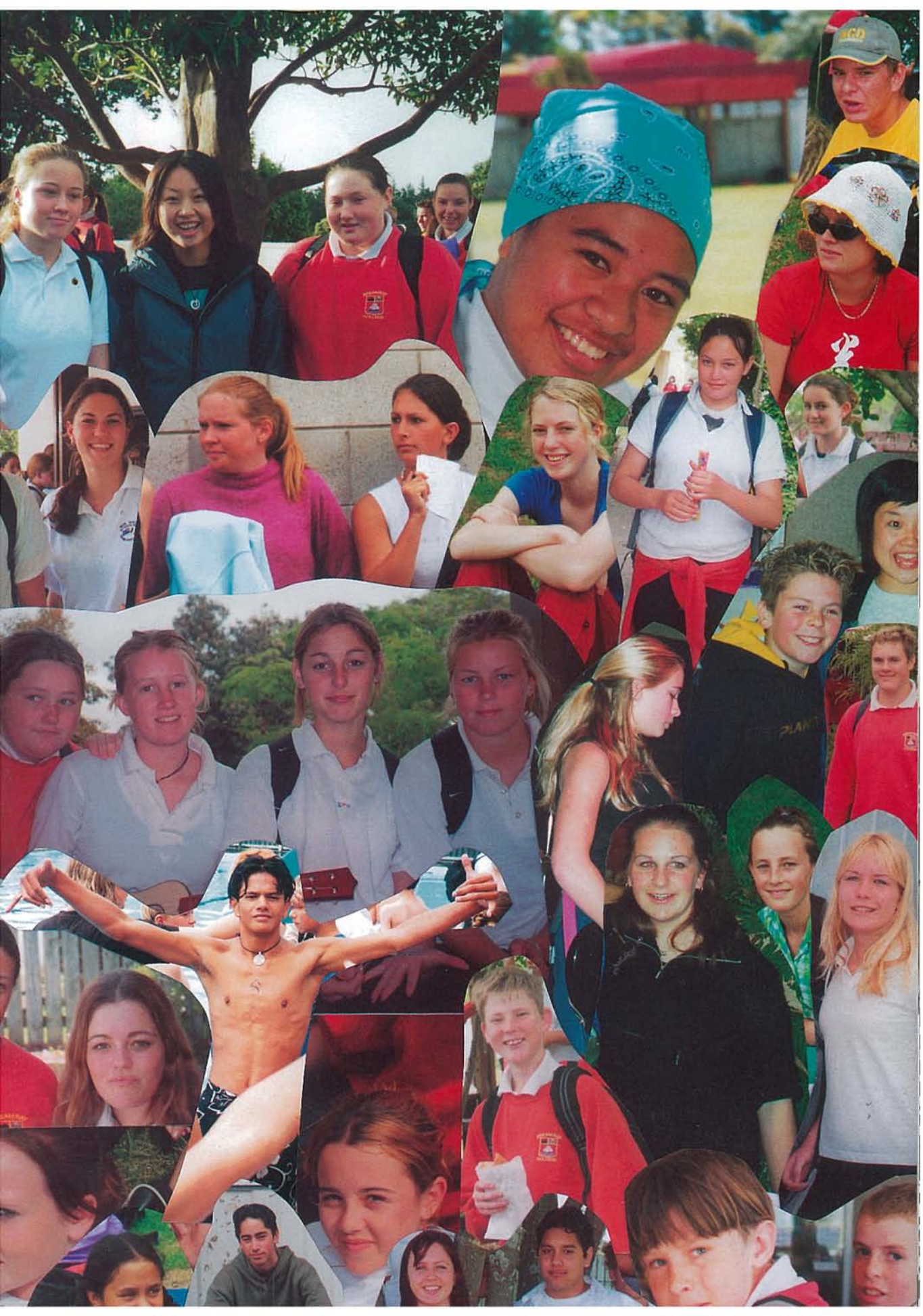
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Years 7 and 8

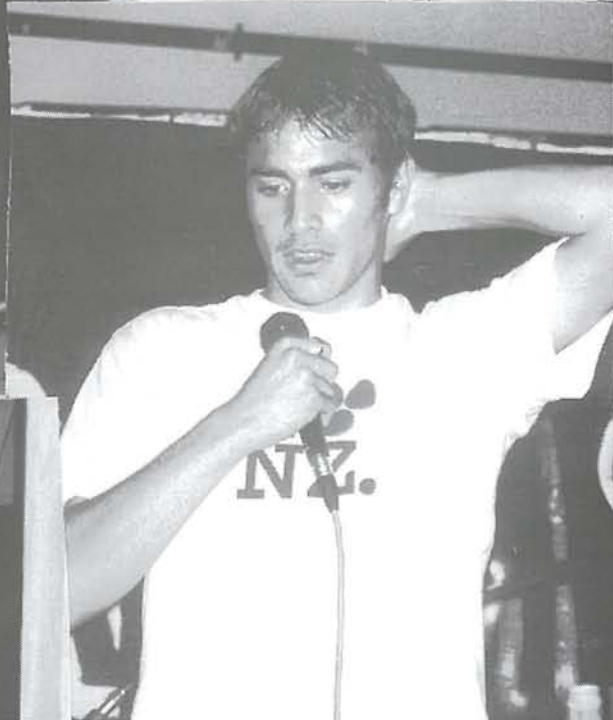
Music Report 2001

This year I have taken the liberty to reflect upon my 6 years here at Bream Bay College, Te Kura Tuarua o Whanga-a-Tamure as Teacher in Charge (TIC) and now as Head of Department Maori.

I remember when I was appointed as TIC Maori. This was sure an interesting yet demanding position. As a first year teacher I really didn't know what to expect nor what was really required. A freshy you might think. You are probably right. Nevertheless I arrived here with enthusiasm to work alongside our taitamatane and our taitamawahine.

The Maori Department – Staff

It is interesting to point out how many Maori Staff there were in 1996 in comparison

to 2001. On my appointment there were only 2 Maori Staff members – Vera Moulton and myself. Over the years numbers have multiplied. This year 2001, we have the following members in our department – Wendy Kake, Tau Hita, Lisa Lumsden, Joanne Hammond, Debbie Flavell, Francil Tarau, Jocelyn Mudford, Sue Matthews, Hannah Edge, Ngaire Tauhara-White and Tearani Cooper.

Curriculum

In my first year, senior students were taking Maori through Correspondence and as a result were having difficulties in learning Te Reo. This was soon rectified at a Hui where Kaumatua and kuia at that time outlined to the Principal the importance of Te Reo Maori. Since this time we have had not classes doing Maori through Correspondence.

This year Te Reo Maori was delivered to Years 7, 8, 9, 10, and 12. As a result tamariki have been exposed to various tikanga – marae, powhiri and whakatau manuhiri to name a few.

Kapa Haka

Every year the Kapa Haka group played an integral part of the Maori Department, the School and the Community. The Kapa Haka Group of 1996 competed in the Tai Tokerau – Waitangi

Cultural Competitions held in Whangarei. It was a really surprising fact that we won due to the fact that many people under estimated our potential. Quite surprisingly so, as we had 18 girls and 5 boys. Nevertheless we were a force to be reckoned with. From whence there has been a dedicated few who continued to compete in the Competitions with successes, I might add. Last year we received 2nd and 3rd placing.

Physical Education 2001

The department acknowledges with thanks the excellent input of Staff – Noeline Godinet, Hannah Edge, Lisa Lumsden, Debbie Flavelle, Tanya Petrov, Tracy Chapman, Joanne Hammon, Claire Sargeant and Kevin Pitts.

The major department objective of introducing variety in to the methodology of teaching in each module form(1-5) was a major challenge. Especially for the H.O.D who is a strong believer in the traditional elements of skill development through sequential progressions. Specifically the method used in the major modules were:

Aquatics - Total immersion and future dreaming concepts applied to the 4 strokes.

Athletics – Student self selection of target events process – Pre Test, Select events, Train, Post test.

Large Ball/ Pass – Games sense – the emphasis is on developing skill execution, tactical awareness and decision making via appreciation of the game form.

Large Ball/ Kick – skills sense – selection of specific kick skills that are developed

through peer review, instruction and practice.

Small Ball/Racquet – Student self selection of major game form after introduction of skill progression. Assessed on basis of application on application to the game.

Small Ball/ Striking – Sports Education – student exposure to the diversity of roles that are associated with sport – coaching, refereeing, selection, promotion, game emergency response, game management, records, fair play.

The modules were reviewed by students and staff and comments noted to achieve development in the Physical Education programme.

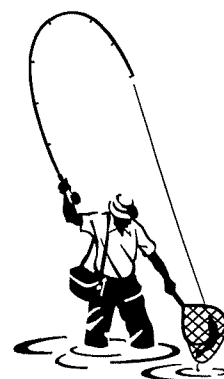
Bursary Physical Education – this subject is dedicated to the pursuit of performance. It provides the student with the enormous challenge of researching the concepts, developing and applying understanding and then incorporating the aspects into a practical, sequenced programme. This development is assessed in the Bream Bay College Human Performance Laboratory which is able to offer testing protocols usually only on offer at elite medical establishments. The new horizons of lactate

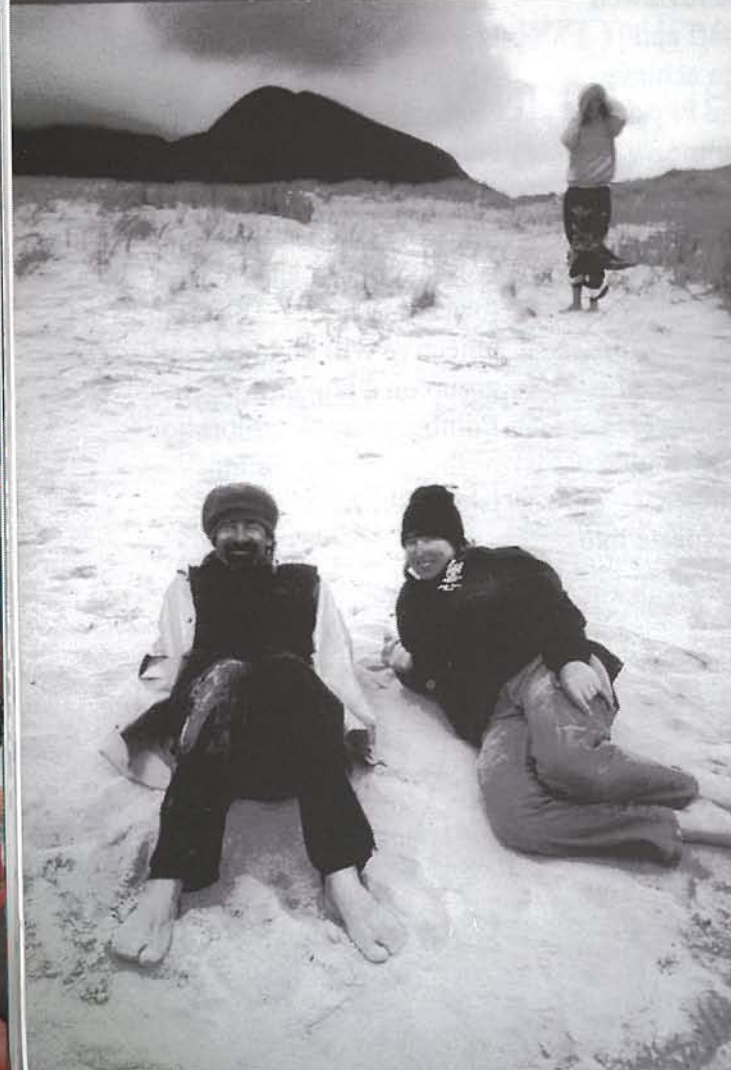
testing, computer review of workload and heart rate and body composition analysis are exciting horizons.

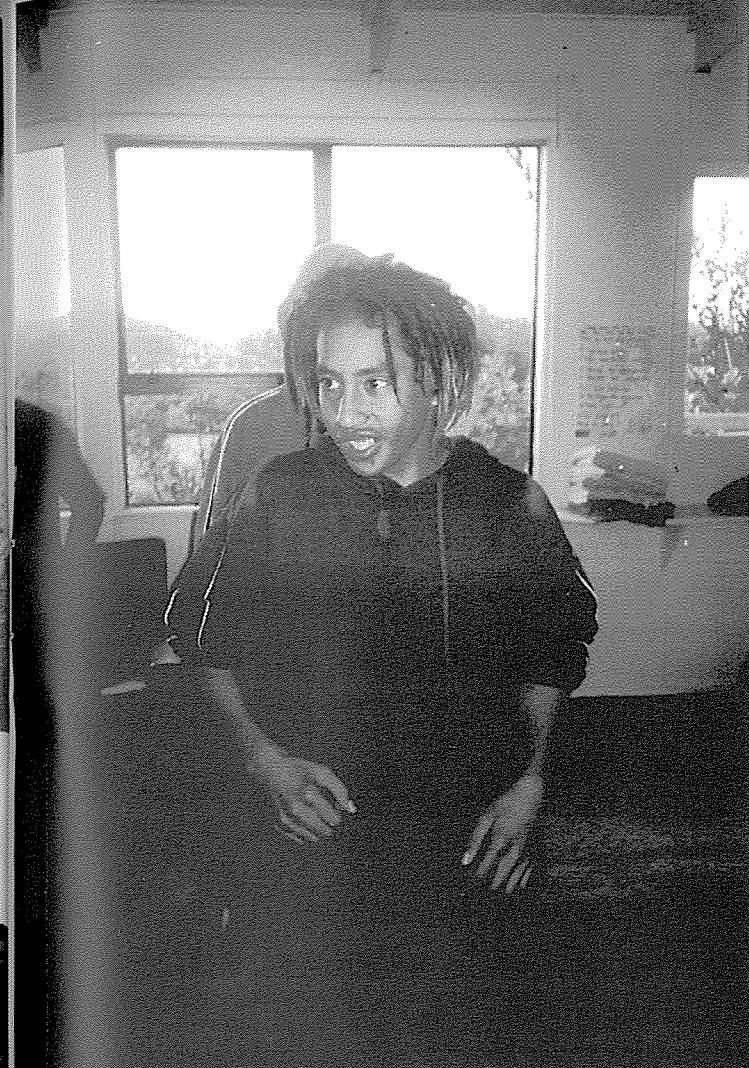
