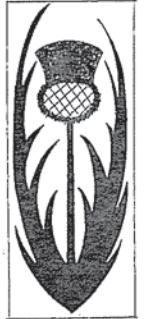
The Whale

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FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Nga mihi nui kia kotou katoa, Greetings everyone.

It is an honour and a privilege to present my second annual report.



2002 has been an unsettled year for our teaching staff. The tense industrial situation brought about by the failure of the government to address the issues facing secondary teachers had a significant impact on our school. The introduction of NCEA level one while this industrial dispute was raging added to the stresses. Although this dispute has impacted on our students learning, I wish to publicly thank our staff for their efforts and willingness to look outside the square to ensure that the disruption to our students was minimal.

The staffing situation in secondary education is tight. We continue to be able to attract well qualified teachers to permanent positions. 2003 will see the arrival of Jennifer Thornhill (PE), Brigitte Stemmet (Maths) and Karen Williams (Technology). We are in the process of making two more teaching appointments, a long term relieving position at year 7 and 8 for Mrs Gael McKay who is taking a years leave, and HOD Science position. Mrs Margo Wakelin has resigned as head of science but I am delighted to say will continue on at Bream Bay College in a part time position working with senior classes. Returning from a years leave in 2003 we have Lisa Lumsden, Joanne Hammon and Cali McKenzie. We thank Mrs Tearani Cooper and Hannah Edge for filling these positions for us. The third position was held by Rachel Adams who left to take up a permanent position at Tauraroa Area School. We thank Mr George Abraham for stepping in for two terms to cover this position. Mrs Katrina Hutton was away on maternity leave. We thank Mrs Beverley Buckland and Mr Russell Smith for covering this position. Mrs Carla Gordon joined us as Executive Officer in January. Mrs Anne McNamara left after nineteen years of service in the support staff area of the school. Anne was replaced for a short time by Judy Crean and now by Alisha Ritai. We have added to the staff the following part time positions for one year: Mr Huw Turner and Mrs Janet Ives - literacy initiatives, Mrs Penny Goodall - Maths tutoring, Ms Francil Tarau - Health Promoting Schools coordinator and Careers Assistant, Mr John Stanley - Automotive, Mr Des Tarau - grounds patrol, and finally Mrs Selma Murray - Work Coordinator.

We wish all staff who are leaving well in their new roles and thank them all for their contributions.

In term 2 the Education Review Office completed a supplementary review: They commented: "have made excellent progress, are developing good quality governance and management practices to support sustained school improvement." and "Trustees are positive that they can effectively sustain and build on their achievements. With the principal and staff, they have the capability to successfully manage change." We were pleased with their observations.

It was great to see the academic results of the school lift in the 2001 external examinations. The staff did a great job working with our senior students to ensure this happened. I am confident that our 2002 Bursary results will be very good. I am however concerned about our Year 11 results. This group of students has been

extremely hard to motivate. I hope parents, that you can assist us by ensuring that all our year 11 students study hard in the time that is left before their exams.

There is no room for complacency about the College's academic results. Our top students are doing well but our middle students are not performing as we would like. 2003 will see us focus on lifting further the performance and achievement of these middle students. We have tried numerous interventions and made some improvements but we are far from happy. The results of the literacy and numeracy interventions have been great. The effects of the working with horses' initiative, Mana Tane and Mana Wahine have been harder to assess. Having a homework centre operating at the College and Waipu has not been effective due to lack of student support. The breakfast club is too new to be evaluated yet. The drugs awareness week was an outstanding success. Guardian Angels, a programme receiving national attention, is up and running due to the voluntary work of Mrs Gloria Reid, Mrs Jenny Gibbs and Mrs Debbie Stone. We believe the combined effects of all these programmes are positive but as stated earlier we believe we have a way to go.

I have resisted the urge to make regular comments on uniform. A large number of our students wear our uniform with pride. The great bulk of our students who wear their uniform badly or have incorrect uniform are also underachieving or behaving poorly. Parents, it is worth insisting that your children wear their uniform correctly. If you do your child will be far less likely to have problems at school and will be more likely to be successful. For the above reasons you can expect the school to be a lot tougher on uniform in 2003.

The College continues to do well in competitions such as the Australian Science, Australian Mathematics, Australian English, the Commonwealth Essay competition and the Otago Mathematics Challenge. Students have achieved at all levels from participation through to distinction.

2002 saw a change to the way we placed students in our junior classes. We have introduced two accelerated learning classes in year 7 and 8. One is working hard to get students to a level where they can cope with progression to year 9 and the other is going wide in the curriculum to extend students whose learning level is already near year 9. We have also had some students take three years to complete year 7 and 8 and students repeat year 9 and 10. At year 9 and 10 we have streamed off one group of students and had two other mixed ability classes. We will adjust this system for 2003 at the year 10 level only, by having two mixed ability classes and one streamed class below them. This class will focus on reaching a level that will enable them to sit the alternate programmes in year 11 while the other two classes will focus on working towards NCEA level one. This change has the added advantage of remixing the student groupings from year 9 to year 10.

We have placed a higher importance on Year 7 and 8 this year. The budget for year 7 and 8 went from \$800 to \$8,000. We have added one more management unit to the position of head of year 7 and 8, shared by Mrs Debi Woodward and Mrs Marg Northey, taking it to the equivalent of an Assistant Principal position and finally the year 7 and 8 deans have joined the senior management team. Added to this has been an injection of text books, reading books and other resources. The team is working hard to improve what is already a very successful department. Year 7 and 8 singing

and the stripes system are visible examples of this. The literacy initiatives undertaken and the 2003 numeracy initiative are not quite so obvious but are progressing very well.

There have been some changes on the buildings front at Bream Bay College. The refurbishment and extension of the new gymnasium, the new playground, the removal of the pines around the boundary and the planting of the gardens in front of the Whare are obvious examples. The addition of ceiling fans to classrooms, new carpet to rooms and the revamp of parts of the admin block are other achievements. Some of these would not have been possible without the assistance given by the ASB Community Trust, Waipu Lions and Oxford Trust. It is appropriate that I register publicly our thanks for their support. I wish also to thank other major sponsors, the New Zealand Refinery Company, Northland Port Corp, Carter Holt Future Build along with the many other local businesses who support us so generously.

There have been many highlights this year. The Te Tuinga concert showcased the talents of our students in speech, modern dance, highland dance, drama, singing, food, kapa haka, brass and modern bands. It was a spectacular event. Mrs Smyth and her pupils winning the BP National Community Enterprise award for the seventh year in a row was a tremendous achievement. We are lucky enough to have an "I spy table" from last years winners in our library. We had five nominations at the ASB Secondary School Sports awards and three of them attained top in their fields.

The Culture group has brought great mana to the school this year through its wider participation in the community and at such functions as the Tai Tokerau Festival, the Powhiri for the Prime Minister Helen Clarke at the Port opening and the Powhiri and opening of NIWA. I must commend all those involved for rebuilding this important aspect of our school.

Looking ahead: 2003 is set to be a busy year.

NCEA level 2 and unit standards will be the assessment methods for our year 12 students.

We hope to make a start on revamping the insides of all the classrooms, repair the walkways, replace the admin block roof and design our performing arts block.

We will target the achievement of our average students through a literacy initiative. The pastoral system has been expanded by increasing the dean's time at all levels to enable us to involve parents proactively with poor behavioural and student work issues.

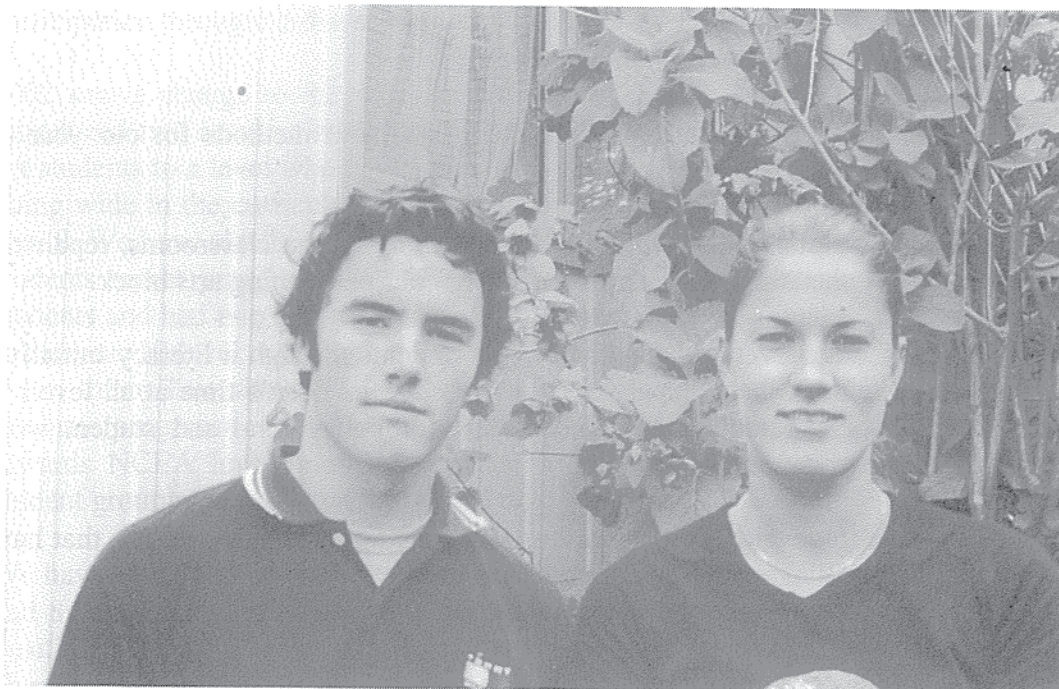
We will continue to develop closer working relationships with sports clubs that have students from the College playing in their teams.

Music Report 2002



There have been many new faces contributing to the teaching of music this year. First of all we have been fortunate to have Shelley Foster return and teach jazz instruments. Shelley was here some years ago then left to live in Auckland. This year she has travelled up each Thursday and stayed over to assist with jazz bands for students in Whangarei. We are lucky to have Shelley with her multi-skills. She is one of the few people who can teach all the jazz instruments and she is a trained teacher. I hope the group learning this year with Shelley will continue. It does take commitment like all things worth doing.

Absolutely lacking in good drummers this year we were pleased to have Jim Lawrie teach. Jim is a professional drummer and already we can see his influence on some of the young students he has taught. Many urban schools have lots of itinerant music teachers who charge privately. This was the situation Jim was in and accordingly numbers dwindled by the end of the year. Huge savings are made when this sort of service is supplied at schools but this is a new concept here.

Local singing teacher Lisa Abbott joined us and not only taught many students, especially seniors, singing skills but also took singing at junior assemblies. Her items at the concert were most professional and she has students waiting to join her lessons. It was great to hear the harmonies and see the concentration her groups showed whilst performing.

A bunch of merry enthusiasts joined us each Wednesday to keep the Scottish influence going in our school. Bain McGregor, local piper of renown, persuaded fellow musicians to assist

him teach piping and Scottish drumming. We are looking forward to having our own pipe band. A big thank you to the following: Pearson Hammond, Graham Ryken, Graham Pitts, Keith Aitken and Bain McGregor. Such commitment!

This year Gordon Lee took over most of the Core Music programme. 7 classes have been taught in a new space for us, Room 15, which was scrubbed up, carpeted and decked out with 15 new keyboards and guitars. With the assistance of the music advisor a new programme was devised to cover the new arts curriculum. It certainly made it easier to teach using the keyboards but few students displayed skills of Level 4 that they are supposed to have at this age. Next year we will teach Years 7&8 separately and this should assist this problem.

For Years 11, 12 and 13 musicians we offered a large selection of achievement standards, unit standards as well as 6th Form Certificate for the last time. We did this to cover the wide range of abilities we had with our students. Initially the students were confused (and the teachers!) but by the end of the year those remaining have ended up with many credits making their many years of music practise well worth the effort. All but one of the standards was internally assessed which fitted in well with our performance preference. Toby Burt and Gordon Lee ran this programme taking on different aspects of it to save confusion. We started off with 11 students but 6 left during the year. This probably made it more manageable but meant we lost students with years of music experience.

Consequently we had few bands to showcase. Next year we will be running Level 1 and 2 achievement

standards together as well as any unit standards which suit our students needs and skills.

2002 Rockquest.

Left without a drummer two weeks before the Rockquest Finals made it difficult for our senior boy's band *Eh Gringo*. Replacing the drummer with an electronic beat meant the drummer was always present but on the night a lack of experience in getting a sound check with the CD/drum-beat meant a dreadful sound. The boys coped well considering they could barely hear each other (why didn't the sound Tec's' turn it down?) and their two originals showed imagination. Judges noted their alternative sound. I agree. I thought their originals were very different to all the others. Lead singer Alex Rawhiti was awarded Best Male Singer. This was his first Rockquest so he was very pleased with his win. This band if they can find a good and committed drummer will be much better prepared for 2003 and with their two great singers and hot musicians should do well. It takes years of playing to win these days.

Our other band to make the finals was Simik and they performed well. Led by Gemma Taylor and well supported by Cass, Michael, and Marie, this band received good comments from the judges for their balanced sound and interesting originals.

This has been our first year we have not won the Northland Finals therefore we did not have to go through the usual post-final agony of performing the dreaded tasks imposed by the

judges. And they have changed the rules again! This year semi-finals in three regions were held for the first time. For the past seven years we have wished for this and the opportunity to compete against other bands. Oh well, such is life.

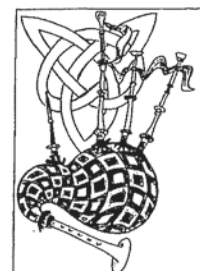
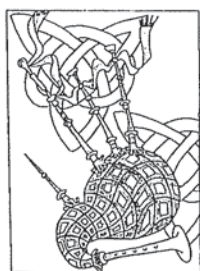
Cultural Concert.

A successful school Science Fair was held in June with 98 entries from students in years 7, 8, 9, 10, 12, and 13. Outside judges were invited to judge the event. Monetary prizes were donated by both Marsden and Waipu Lions Clubs. A big thankyou to these clubs for their continued support of our students' efforts.

13 projects were entered in the Genesis Energy Central Northland Science and Technology Fair. Of those, five were award winners:

Both Gregory Hemingway and Benjamin Dunn, Year 12, have applied for Genesis scholarship to attend a one week science course at Auckland University next January. Both were accepted by combined North and South Whangarei Rotary Clubs as worthy entrants and have been accepted as two of forty students by Rotary and the University of Auckland for this course.

In mid August we successfully hosted the Science and Technology Roadshow. All Year 7/8 students were able to get their hands on the fascinating exhibits along with students from One Tree Point, Waipu, and Poroti Primary School pupils.

Field Trips – EOTC

In November 2001 all Year 7/8 students were taken on a field trip to Winstone Otaika Quarry to hunt fossils and learn about the geology of the local area.

In February, Year 13 Biology students studied the ecology of the mangrove at the Ruakaka River estuary. They returned again in August to survey the mud crab population. Both studies were for the internal assessment component of their Bursary examination.

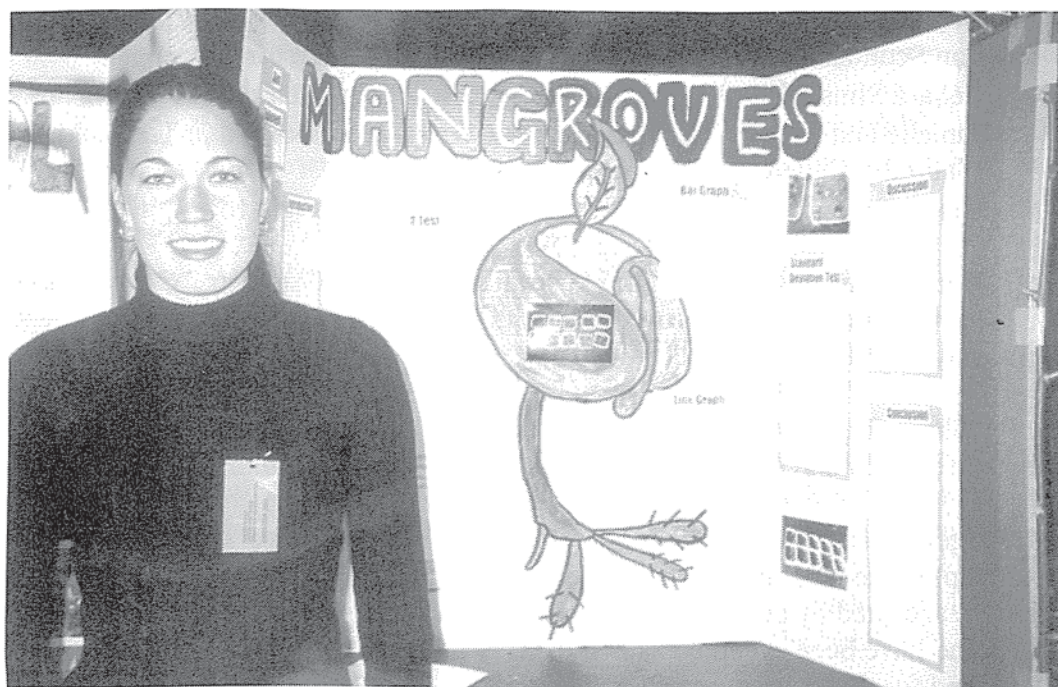

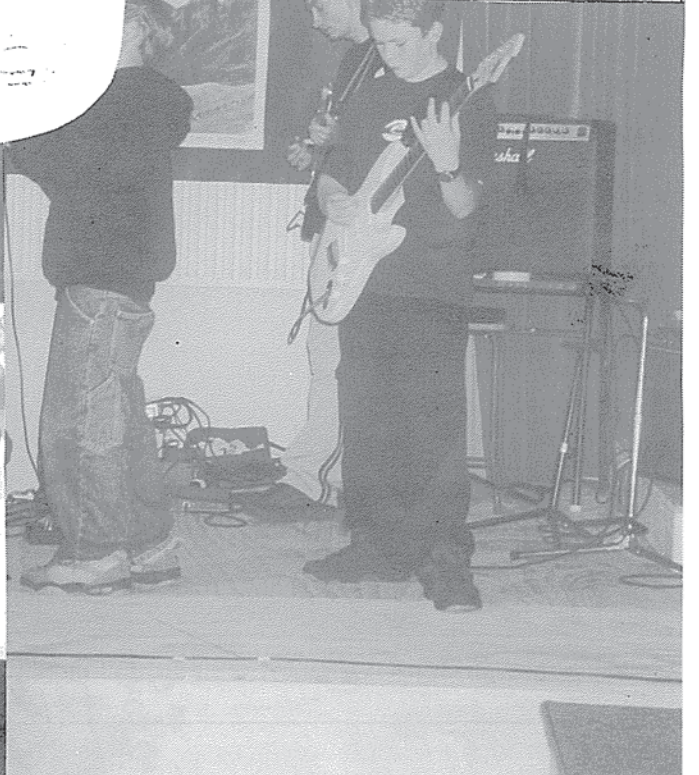
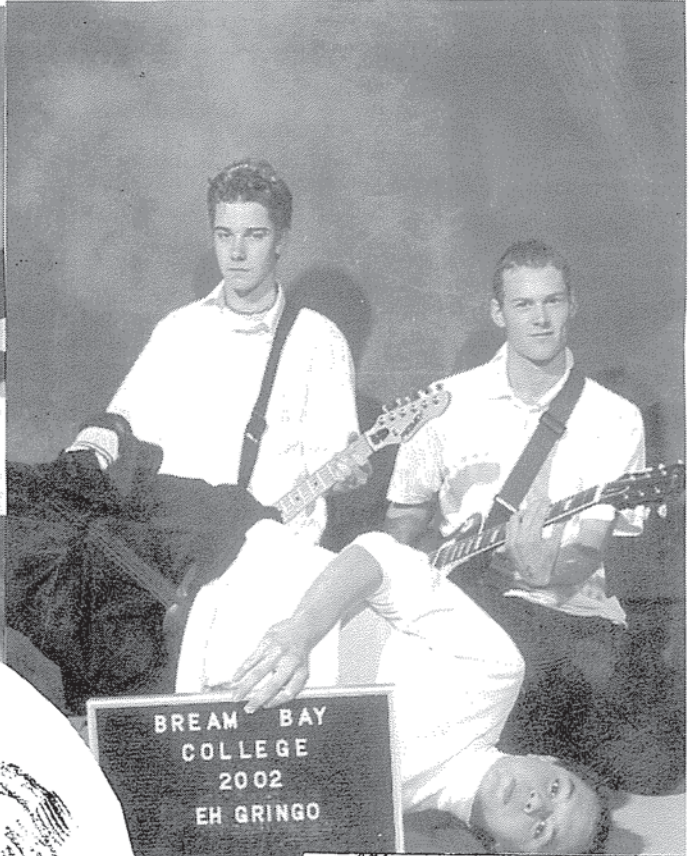
CHARLOTTE JONES-ROTARY SPEECH FINALIST

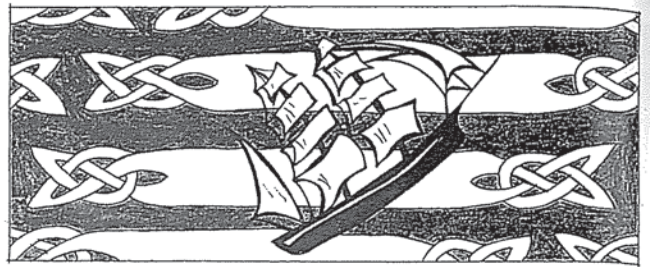

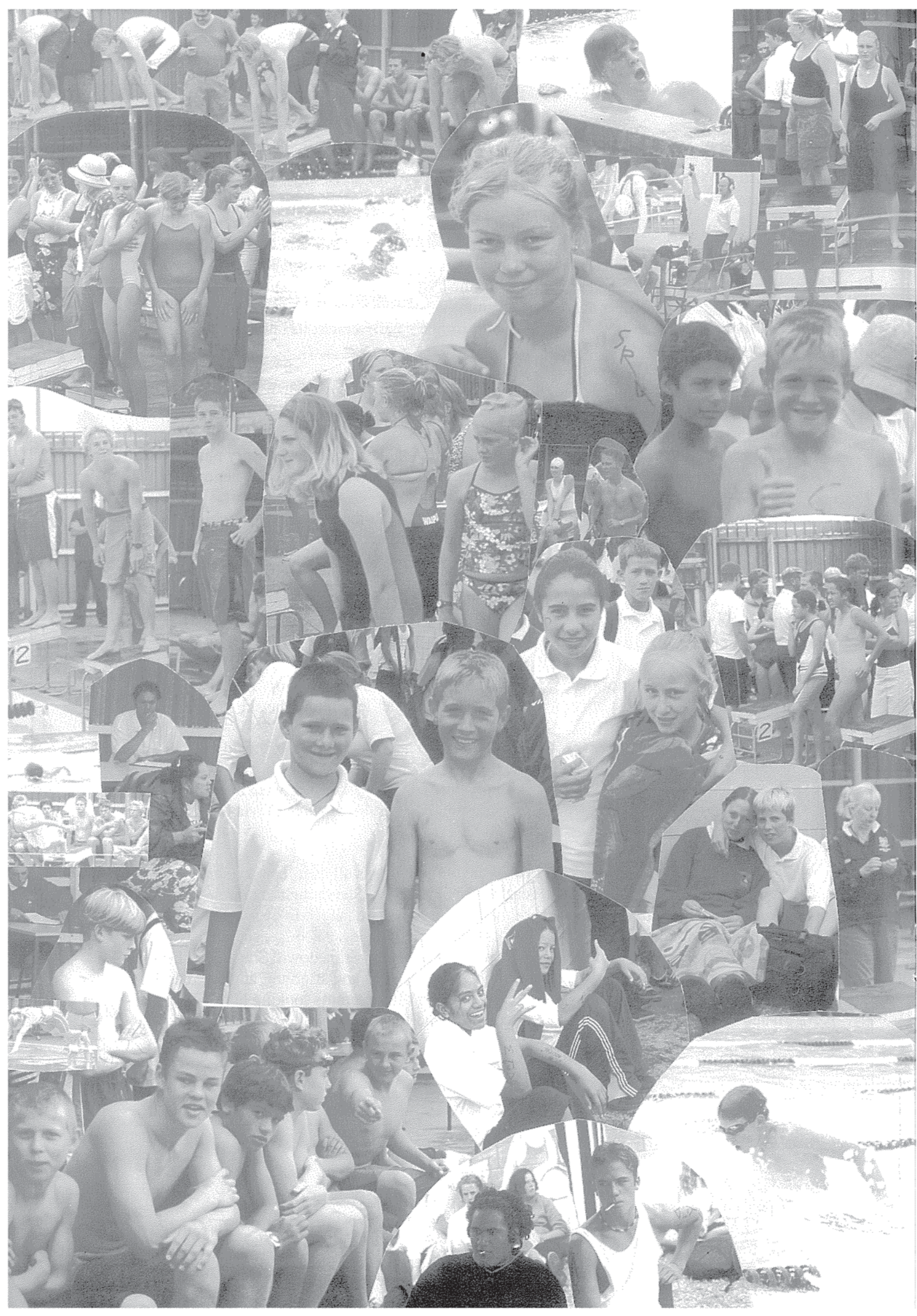
Olivia climbed on top of the cold toilet seat then climbed on to the top of the cubicle then she pushed the topmost window open and squeezed her legs out of the skinny window.

Life went on, he had to take 13 tablets three times daily. After about one month every week he went to the hospital to get 1.5 litres drained off his lungs. He had a big bulge out the side of his hip. After three months I had to leave him and go and live at my Nan's. We went and visited him every fortnight.

Mum and Dad got married, that was a sad day because Nan had to sing the wedding song, the name was "The Wedding Song". Nan's good at singing because she used to be in a country singing club. Just about everyone started to cry.

Nine months later he passed away at 1.30, three days after mum's birthday, age 31. My Dad was 49 years old. There may be a big age difference, but they were meant to be together.

As always at this stage in the year our senior students are putting final touches to folio's for external assessments, for NCEA level 1, and bursary design, painting, photography and sculpture, as well as a self-generated folio project by year twelve students.

Special Highlights



- Thanks to the Board of Trustees, a refurbished and very well equipped darkroom has replaced our tiny darkroom that we previously worked in. This means that we can now introduce photography to our younger students because there is far more workspace and equipment. Year ten students have already completed some work with photogram and pinhole photography.
- NCEA level 1 (year 11) students completed their first year of NCEA with no great problems. For the year's work we used the theme 'TIDELINE' and made two visits to the Ruakaka river estuary to draw, make sculptures and take photographs which were later used to develop ideas for folio artworks.



- Senior students visited the annual top bursary folio exhibition, which tours the country showing top folio's (over 90%) in design, painting, printmaking, photography and sculpture.
- Some students visited the Muka Print Exhibition in Whangarei. Unfortunately Frans Battens did not bring the prints to Bream Bay College this year. Due to illness he was forced to curtail his Northland tour to only one day.
- Ball decorations add fun for senior art students who are always very involved in this activity. This year's 'Mafia' theme made a great setting for the ball, especially with the help of Mrs Porteous's wonderful props and also Steve Jones's willingness to work till I can't remember what time!
- Finn Scott entered the Pacific Arts Awards national art competition and gained one of the top six places in the secondary school section of the competition. This is a high honor as it is a prestigious art competition which is entered by many top art students. Two groups of year ten students also competed with beautiful wire sculptures depicting Maori myths and local Maori legends. Although they did



not gain a placing, their works have been exhibited at the Pacific Business Trusts gallery in Auckland.

- Nicky Grimmer has designed the banners which will line Waipu's main street for their 150 years Scottish celebrations in January. She has also designed the cover for the Waipu Caledonian Society's Caledonian Games booklet 2003. Well done Nicky.
- Students have attended holiday and weekend workshops at school for NCEA and bursary art subjects. Many schools hold these art workshops for their students in the last term, and it is a golden opportunity for students to spread out folios and spend concentrated time working on them.

Art is very different from most other senior subjects, because the folio that is sent for external marking, is in fact the end-of-year external examination. It cannot be successfully 'swotted up' in the last term. It is literally a culmination of a year's work, and it requires previous artist research and investigation, exploration and development of own ideas, and finally some conclusive yet open-ended artworks on the last of four panels. The folio is an academic visual essay which must show evidence of the year's research exploration, analysis and development of ideas. So during the year an enormous amount of work goes into a successful end-of-year folio. For this reason the weekend workshops are invaluable for setting out folio's and fine-tuning work for optimum success, and so art students should attend them whenever possible.

People I should especially like to thank; the Board of Trustees for our new darkroom, Peter Davies for patiently teaching camera and darkroom skills to our budding photographers and also taking many photographs for sculpture students, and Penny Goodall, Hannah Edge and Debbie Flavell for their hard work with year seven and eight students.

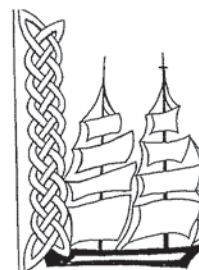
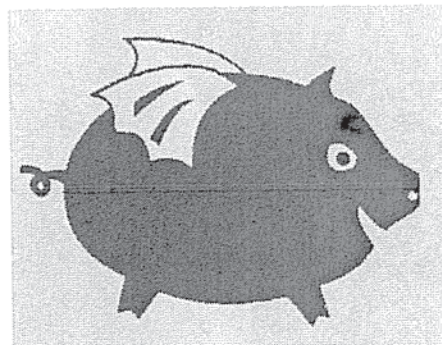
marketing ploys from previous events that we had been to with them...

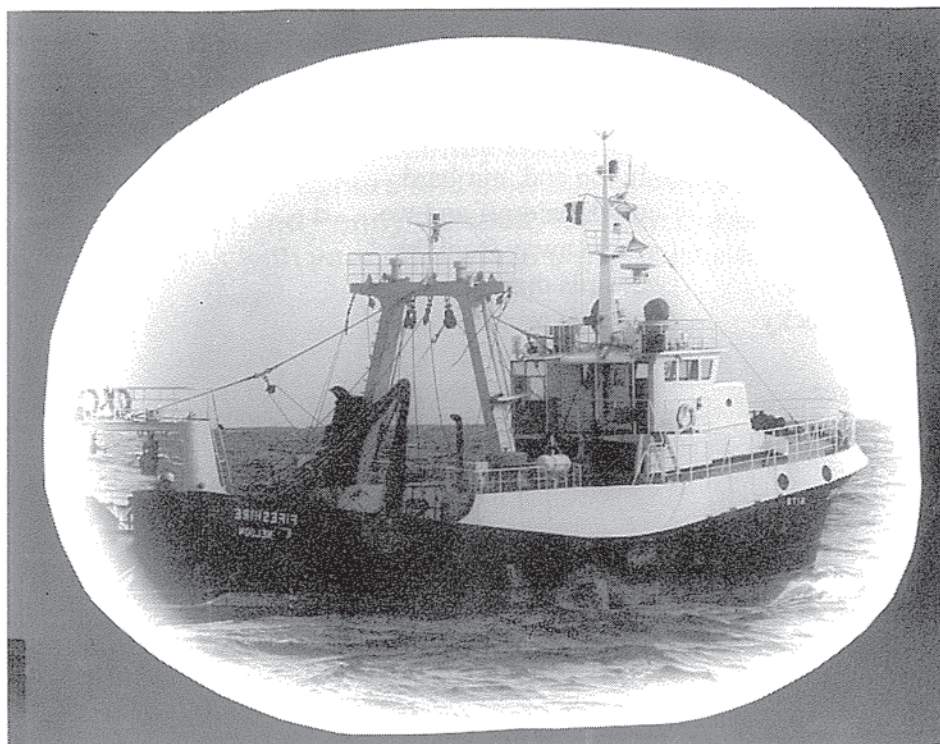
Year 12 Leadership Camp

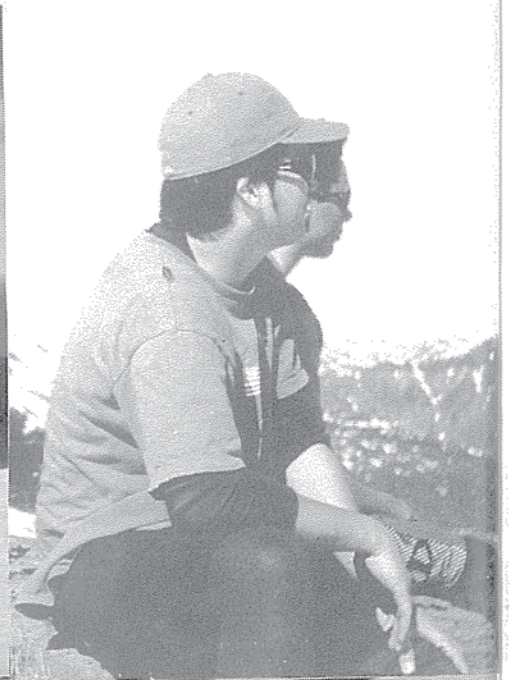

Physical Education 2002

Thanks to all staff for their positive and enthusiastic teaching – Ms. Woodward, Mrs. Northey, Ms. Edge, Ms. McKenzie, Ms. Flavelle, Ms. Tarau, and Mr. Duffield. Your input to this department was most appreciated.

Bursary Physical Education:

A diverse range of students participated in this subject. As their focus was not on using the Human Performance Lactate Testing methodology the completion of a multi sport adventure race (the Primal Quest – a search for the origin of being!!!) the concept of Strength Endurance was explored in many training variations. The Outdoor Education module involved the Alpine Ski/Snowboard trip to Mount Ruapehu. This trip also allowed the Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award students to complete their expedition requirements: Triple Summit - mountaineering the three volcanoes Ruapehu, Ngauruhoe, and Tongariro.

NCEA Level 1 Physical Education:

This subject was introduced this year and despite the well documented deficiencies of this system, the positive quality that it certainly develops and reinforces is that of self organisation. The challenge of consistent preparedness will be valuable in allowing students to achieve in whatever aspiration.

Curriculum Review:

The TEAM Physical Education expert, Ms. A. McKay was employed by Mr. Buckland to review the scheme and make suggestions relating to improved delivery. Despite sitting galaxies apart in thinking (Bunting - skill acquisition, physical activity, and acceptance of challenge; McKay – cerebral analysis, evaluation, inner development) the experience was positive in that a different perspective was presented and appreciated. It will be valuable to students when Ms. McKay is able to forward her suggestions and the Physical Education department can trial these ideas with Bream Bay College students.

Junior Physical Education:

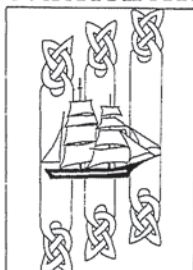

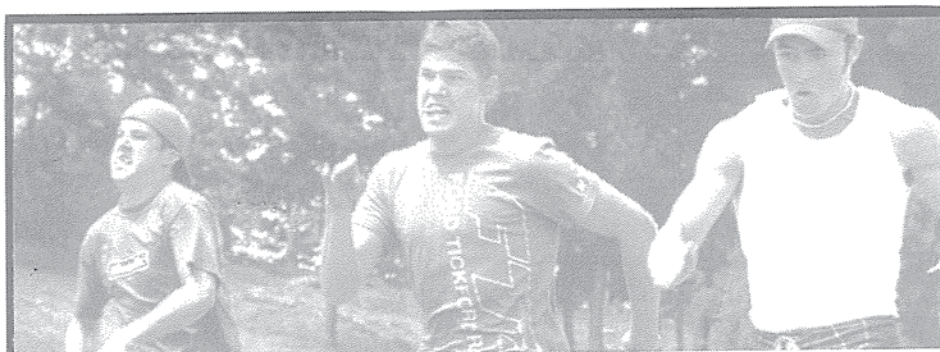

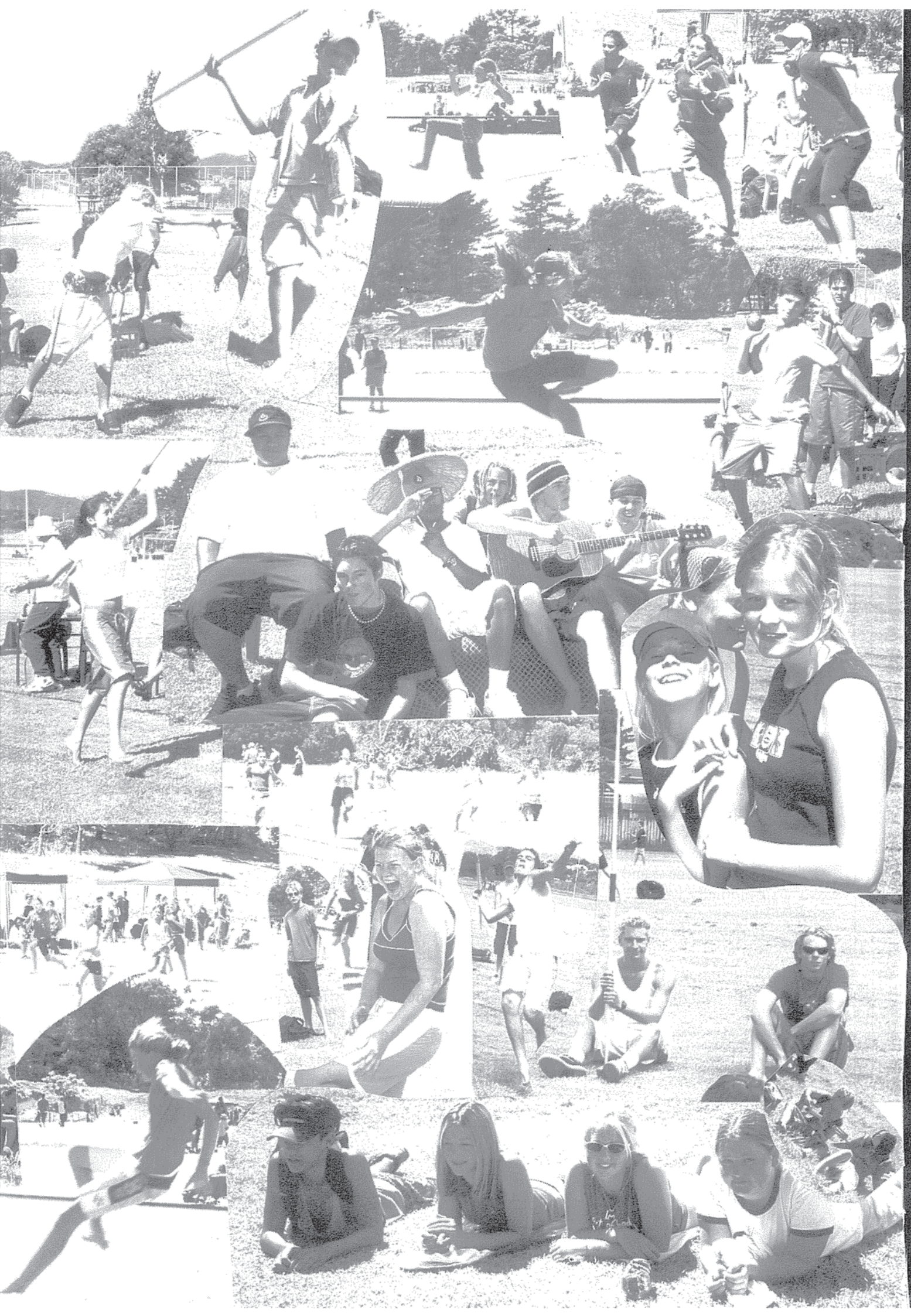

In the last week of Term 3 our Form 1-4 team played against Otamatea, and ran out convincing winners by 5-2.

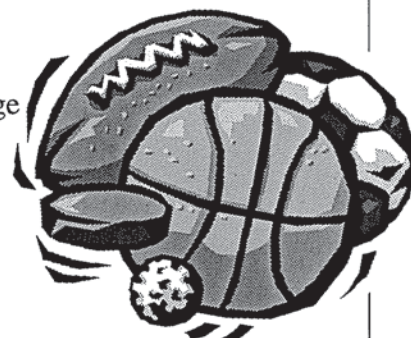
