

Mrs Marie Smyth began two terms of study leave at the beginning of Term 2. She rejoined the staff at the beginning of Term 4.





FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Prizegiving Speech 2003

Hi mihi nui kia koutou katoua I nga iwi I nga reo I nga mana Nau mai Haire mai

Bream Bay College has continued on its road to being one of the top schools in New Zealand. This year has certainly been eventful and full of new exciting challenges. Our students bring a diverse range of talents and skills to our school. Educating to succeed is about providing pathways for all students to reach their potential and ensuring that when our students leave school they have choices about what course they would like to do or which job they would like to take. I have broken my report into five areas: Curriculum, Cultural, Pastoral Staffing and where to in 2004 for ease of reading.

Curriculum

Well done the senior students and staff of Bream Bay College 2002 in the external examinations. It was good to see how well our results stacked up against other local schools in Northland and throughout the country.

Our teachers have done a great job in ensuring that our students' results are in the top quarter overall for Northland.

The College's enterprising culture has been further extended in 2003 by our joining the Young Entrepreneur Program (YEP). We have awarded certificates and badges to students for their enterprising activities as a result of this new initiative. We wish to thank Northpower for providing the ongoing funding to pay a management unit to Marie Smyth to oversee this programme.

Our year 7 and 8 department joined the pilot numeracy project for intermediate age students. This has meant a total rethink on how mathematics is taught in the junior levels of the College. We are looking forward to the gains when these students reach the examination levels.

Electronic reporting has come of age in the College. This change has enabled us to make better use of report data and to provide reports more often to parents. We hope that by providing cumulative reports we have enabled parents, staff and students to all

work together towards common end points, thus ensuring that all our students achieve. We will cement in the new reporting process in 2004.

The introduction of laptops for teachers is set to greatly increase the educational outcomes of our students. Each teacher who is eligible for a laptop has set a personal goal to improve the performance of underachieving students with the aide of their new ICT friend. These laptops will also assist our teachers with the large number of administration tasks that need to be done.

Literacy has been at the forefront of our thinking this year. A very successful Peer assisted reading programme was put in place during term one and taken a step further in term 3. In term 4 we have had a teacher Gael McKay devoted full time to improving students' literacy levels. It has been heartening to see students welcoming the assistance and striving to make a difference.

In term 3 and 4 we have focused on "the basics" with our students. These are; being on time, having the correct gear, taking and keeping notes and finally showing respect for their teachers. We were disappointed at the number of students who were not completing these simple tasks and therefore were at risk of failing at school. These four ingredients "mixed well," will result in a very successful student.

Sports

Our students have continued to perform well in a variety of sporting codes. Most of our sports are taken care of by clubs. We have added a Tuesday assembly report back on the results and have been more proactive in promoting students' participation with the clubs. At the College the swimming sports was a day filled with atmosphere and participation, so much so, that the participation prevented us from completing the full swimming programme. Again in the Athletics sports it was great to see so many students participating and having a good time. The Cross Country was also a great success.

Our year 7 and 8 students have benefited from lunchtime inter-class competitions run by our sports coordinator and the inter-whanau competition has been keenly contested.

Pastoral

2003 saw the implementation of a revised deans' structure with more time allocated for them to work with students whose performance was in question. We will add an additional dean to the year 9 level for 2004.

Late in term 3 we did a stock take on the amount of time wasted dealing with uniform issues. To solve the uniform problem we have purchased a good stock of uniform and we issue it to students or if necessary give it to them. Uniform in the College has been very good since and will continue to be this way from now on. There are no excuses left for not having the correct uniform.

The Drugs and Alcohol week was a great success. Drug testing, fatal vision driving, handouts, giveaways, a crash demonstration by the ambulance service and the fire service and a parents evening were some of the events. Special thanks to Jenny Gibbs

and Gloria Reid for their great work in organizing the activities and to all the outside agencies that assisted during the week.

We continued on our journey from using retribution to correct behaviour to restoration for the harm done. Margaret Thorsborne from Australia completed further training with our Senior Managers and Deans in the use of Restorative Practices along with an introductory session for the staff. We will continue with training for the staff in 2004 to enable us to make the full transition to being a restorative school.

Cultural

The year started on the cultural front with the kapa haka roopu assisting with the Waipu 150th Celebrations. Their participation in the event brought great mana to the College. The organisation done by our whanau support group that led to the waka taking part in the pageant and our students having an opportunity to paddle it was appreciated by everyone. This event will be talked about for many years to come. Our kapa haka roopu has continued throughout the year to be strong and has competed with distinction in the local competitions.

The College has a strong tradition of musical success. This year a group of 60 students entered the Big Sing competition under the tuition of Mrs Lisa Abbott. They had a great time and performed well. We had a very successful Music Night. The talent of our students never fails to amaze, along with the skills of our teachers who coach them to professional standards.

"Te Tuinga" ran again and was very successful. It showcased our acting, speaking, kapa haka, dance and some musical aspects of the College. Our staff and students could be proud of the professional concert they put on.

We entered the Stage-challenge for the first time in 2003. Ms Sargent's enthusiasm and skills along with a dedicated group of students saw us placed first in the small groups section of the local competition. We look forward to the performance in 2004.

Our students have continued to organise very successful socials throughout the year. This year's ball was a great success with students enjoying the "Pacific Paradise" theme. The student council has made good use of the profits from mufti days and has been responsible for the replanting of the central gardens that form the photo backdrop for our prizegiving certificates this year.

Staffing

Staffing in 2003 has not been easy. While we have been able to find very capable people to fill positions, the large number of changes has unsettled the school. We hope 2004 will see less changes of staff as the year progresses.

Firstly we had a late addition to the 2002 leavers. Mrs Marg Northey left us in the 2002 holidays to take up a position of English teacher at Whangarei Girls' High School. We wished her well at an assembly at the start of this year. As one of the coheads of year 7 and 8, her contribution to the school throughout her 10 years service has been significant.

Six new staff joined us at the start of 2003. Jenny Thornhill in the Physical Education / Health department, Brigitte Stemmet in Mathematics, Victoria Burrows in food

technology and then at the end of term 1 as a homeroom teacher, Karen Williams in Technology and Graphics, Andrea Chase as HOD Science and Pam Bowering for term 1 as Guidance Counsellor. Joanne Gibson in food technology joined us at the end of term 1. Lisa Watson (nee Lumsden) returned from her study/maternity leave and left at the end of term 1. Lisa was replaced by Katie Frost. Joanne Hammon returned from a years leave to teach year 7 and 8. Hannah Edge filled in for Gael McKay who was on a years leave and is returning next year. Des Tarau returned for term one to assist with grounds' patrol and mentoring at breaks and lunchtimes. Debbie Woodward left at the end of term 1 on maternity leave and was replaced by Victoria Burrows. Marie Smyth began her two terms study leave at the start of term 2 and was replaced by Wendy McCumber and then Paula Salmon. Rowan Toia joined us at the start of term 3 as the new Co Head of Year 7 and 8. Sue Howden joined us for term 3 as a relieving guidance counsellor and in term 4 Sean Davision joined us to take on the permanent role of guidance counsellor for the College. Andrea Chase went on maternity at the start of term 4 and was replaced by Elizabeth Haines with Margo Wakelin picking up the HOD duties. And finally Sarah-Jane Kidd has joined us in term 4 while Ian Bunting was away due to his bike accident.

Changes to our support staff saw Carla Gordon leave to become a real estate agent. Carla was replaced by Jacqui Leonard. Leanne Allen joined us as a teacher aide in the year 7 and 8 in term 2 and Val Whittaker mid term 3.

We have some very good applicants applying for these positions and will be appointing staff in two weeks time.

I wish to formally acknowledge the contributions made by all our staff who are leaving as they all are significant. We wish them well in their new positions. We will spend time individually to fare well them at the end of the year staff function.



14th National Rockquest

This was held on August 16 in Forum North and although I see the organisers called it the 16th Rockquest it is 14 years since it has been a national event and we have been involved in all of them. We first competed in Auckland and had bands in every regional final where our students had the exciting experience of playing in venues such as the Logan Campbell Centre, the Downtown Convention Centre, the St James Theatre and the Auckland Town Hall. Since 1996 Northland has had its own regional final and although I don't really miss the business of filling supporters' buses plus getting the bands down to Auckland, we did have some exciting times which past students still talk about.

This year we had 3 bands in the finals plus a solo performer and it was a thoroughly enjoyable night. Our students were excited, organised and determined to enjoy themselves on the stage and they did!

Gemma Taylor was our first contestant (on second) and she was great. Her two original songs were well received and she is an accomplished guitar player. To complement her performance she used house-music backing tracks created by music teacher Toby Burt.

On fourth were the Year 9 band Whiplash (with a Year 8 drummer who learns from itinerant drum teacher Jim Laurie). This young band rocked. Singer Rory Taylor worked the crowd up in the mosh pit which was full of Bream Bay College students singing along to their original 'Caesar'. Mitchell Webb on guitar, Gary Smyth on bass and Michael Humphries on drums all seemed totally at ease on stage despite their youth. We were very proud of their performance. Our next band was Archers of 44 and they too were determined to have a great time. At one stage I fully expected lead guitarist Evan Delautour to leap into the crowd because he was having so much fun. Bass player Troy Rudman played riffs, and the crowd and drummer Doyle Crooks managed to keep it all together. Lead singer Alex Rawhiti rapped and danced and for many in the crowd this was their favourite band simply because of the boys' sheer exuberance.

Our last band on in the 14 finalists was *Illicit*. Whilst the other musicians had been assisted by Toby Burt *Illicit* did it all themselves. Using a drummer from Kamo High School (William Neal) meant their practices had to always be held after school and during weekends. Lead singer and guitarist Finn Scott was the driving force in this band writing the songs and organising the rest of the musicians. He and Bass player Cass Mitchell have played in Whangarei student jazz groups for years, Finn as a trumpet player.

This effort from the students and their families in taking part in extra music experiences meant their musicianship stood out. Cass Mitchell has studied piano for some years and is also currently having bass lessons from a visiting German bass player who is residing in Whangarei for the year. Lead guitar player Scott Brown has played guitar for many years also. This dedication is needed for success. Whilst we do our best at school to foster interest, instruments and lessons in music, family commitment is usually necessary for excellence.

So how did this band go? I was confident they would make the final three (but you never know in a competition) and we were all thrilled with their **Second Place** which meant they had the chance to be picked (out of $40 \, 1^{st}$ and 2^{nd} finalists) for the top 12 bands in the country.

The other win of the night was for Cass Mitchell for **Best Female Musician**. Good judging! Cass is the first female bass player I have seen to play 'slap' bass at the Rockquest. She supplied backing vocals also.

The rules have changed again and thank goodness we do not have to complete the many tasks that were required in the past. The band's main task was to send a video of their music to the judges within two weeks. (That's more like it; instead of concerts in other schools, recording sessions in studios, posters, budgets....etc.)

Of course the rockquest organisers were hoping for bands who have been playing together for years and who plan to make music their career. Our students have other careers in mind but they still want to play music at school. We also have a small school population to choose from and when students leave we have to start again. We also don't know how good the rest of the competition is.

However we have done it before and the members of *Illicit* will be continuing their efforts in the next few weeks. You just never know!

Mathematics Departmental Report

As we see another year come and go I wish to report what a busy year we have had this year. This year saw the start of NCEA level 2 along with NCEA level 1. Next year we will be doing levels 1 to 3.

Tertiary Education Pre-requisites.

This year the tertiary educators informed us that it would be compulsory for all students to have a minimum of 14 level 1 maths credits as a pre-requisite for any course. This meant that we had to adapt the scheme to suit unit standards as well as NCEA achievement standards. During the year we advised parents of the best route for their child to achieve these credits and I think we have had a great deal of success with the help of parents and guardians. Whilst we are thanking people I would like to thank my department Peter Northey, Clinton Dearlove and our new teacher this year Brigitte Stemmet and additional thanks to Beverly Buckland for her input this year.

Homework

This year saw all years 9 to 13 with homework books, working on the principle of 1 chapter a week. Next year we hope to individualise the homework scheme to suit the NCES course of unit standards. We are currently promoting 15mins to 30 minutes night homework depending on year level.




Several directors left school during the year and at the end Steven Smyth and Rachael Walker remained.


Jacquie Howe joined us in June 2001. Also Leanne Allen replaced Pat in May 2003, and Val Whittaker came on board in July 2003.


So when another door closes another always opens.

YR9&10 DEBATING







The night was a definite success with tired but happy students leaving with fond





Day 7: Queenstown – Franz Josef. Departed Queenstown for the West Coast, via the Haast Pass. Morning tea was at Wanaka where everyone enjoyed visiting Puzzling World. This was an attraction based around a number of optical illusions.

Halfway through the Gorge was the 110 metre long Buller Swingbridge. Several members of the group ventured across this bridge, with some of the more adventurous students deciding to return across the 160 metre long flying fox.

Nelson provided glorious weather, and an opportunity to walk around the Nelson Market.

The route chosen to Picton for several of the vans took them through the hills alongside Queen Charlotte Sound.

Day 10: Picton – Kaikoura. This was the only day when rain affected the activities. After driving around the winemaking area of Blenheim and touring the Montana Winery, we travelled down to Kaikoura. Heavy rain meant that there was no possibility of whale watching, and the afternoon was instead spent playing cards or watching TV.

Day 11:Kaikoura – Christchurch – Auckland – Bream Bay. Heavy overnight snow had closed many of the inland roads, so we opted to follow SH1 along the coast to Christchurch. The narrow road twisted its way around the coast, and through two tunnels. The first 30 km was right along the coast where spray from the waves crashing metres from the road covered the windscreens.

Upon reaching the Canterbury Plains, we were met with a winter-like scene with the rolling farmland covered in a blanket of snow.

Arriving back in Christchurch provided an opportunity for a last look around the city before the vans were returned to the depot. On average. The vans had covered approximately 2400 km over the 10 days. The drivers were driven back to the airport where we connected with our 4.20 pm flight back to Auckland and the bus to take us back to Bream Bay.

ART DEPARTMENT

This year we have been so busy in our department that there seems to have been little time for extra activities. Junior and senior art students have produced some fine art works in both two and three dimensions. In the junior department we have had five different teachers who have worked very hard with their classes to develop skills and ideas using pencil, Indian ink, charcoal, crayon, pastel, mixed media, paint and assemblage as well as three dimensional sculptures, and pinhole camera work with year ten students.

They then chose from lithography at the Whangarei craft Trust with Mr. Jamie Shields, flax weaving with Mrs. Sue Mathews, or pinhole camera with Mr. Peter Davies, and they really enjoyed these options.

At level two NCEA (year twelve) we offered painting, photography and sculpture and most of our art students had a very successful year with eight painters, four sculptors and fourteen photographers participating in the course.


Next year bursary art will no longer exist, and in our school students will choose from painting, photography or sculpture at NCEA level three.

All NCEA art levels now have a strong research component. This gives students a better understanding of contemporary artists and their works and includes some relevant art history along with the artist models to be studied. This will also apply to the level three courses.

Photography students will continue to have Mr. Peter Davies' able tuition, and we are very grateful for his professional input this year.



Paeroa Honetana who owned the land where the building is today (B) was given possession of the previous school site(C). Tautohe Paki gave the two acres across the road (A), thus the second site of the school had two sections. Maori Land Court Record WH52-188

Education-wise there was a general focus on manual training. However academic success was always a priority, with many pupils receiving scholarships to continue their secondary education. For years the roll was consistently high. In 1933 numbers fluxuated from 16-60, and eventually a prefab and portacom were added to facilitate for the growth. The school became the centre of the community, a meeting place and concert venue. Les Pirihi, ex-pupil explains, "We did more there than at the Marae". The school had a minority number of pakeha students, and nearly all Maori pupils were related.

By the 1930's views on Maori education were changing, with the inspiration of Sir Apirana Ngata. Selected elements of Maori culture were officially introduced into the curriculum, but the Department of Education still decided what was to be considered valid Maori Values, despite not being Maori themselves. In 1947 the term 'native' was replaced with 'Maori', and a common curriculum for all schools was developed. In 1959 Takahiwai became a 'Maori School', and by 1969 all Maori School's were transferred to the public school's system.

The school continued to educate until 1973 when it closed due to diminishing numbers, the result of the urban drift, and opening's of One Tree Point Primary, and Bream Bay College. The school was closed with a roll of only 5 pupils. Juanita Hool


was one of these five. She echoes the same sentiments of many other ex pupils. "In my opinion it was beneficial to have the school within the small community of Takahiwai. Those who attended were mostly all whänau... For me personally there were activities like Maori culture that we weren't able to do at Ruakaka. There were no disadvantages in attending the school".

In 1974 the site and main buildings of the school were reinvested in the Takahiwai Marae Committee, who now administer it. In the past it has been used as an office for Patuharakeke Te Iwi Trust, and has now been converted into a three-bedroom home, and is leased out too family members. The land in front of the school accommodates three kaumätua flats, and the land across the road is leased as farmland.

For much of its existence the school was as important as the Marae. It extended links of whanaungatanga and communal identity, and its locality ensured a basic education for all. Although the Native School System is generally criticised, the ex-pupils of Takahiwai, who I have interviewed looked back on the school with fond memories. They believed the school was a privilege, and the only disadvantage—"having to spend half of Friday cleaning the school"!

Mr. Wilson stretched out his paws, licked his long white fur clean and purred at the thought of a nice big bowl of delicious jelly meat.





CARVING

This carving tells a story of the blending of two cultures in the arena of sport at our school Whanga a Tamure (Bream Bay College). At the top of the carving is Manaia the moana (mountain) for our area. It sits proudly above all the people beneath it. On the top left and right are two manu (birds) they represent Rua (two) kaka (type of bird) The wings of the kaka stretch out under Mania to represent the roof of the whare (gym). Beneath this we have the tangata whenua Patuharakiki on the left and the other cultures on the right represented by the Scottish thistle. The spiralling wheels that represent the birth of life and well-being are included to represent the development of sport, health and well-being in the two cultures. In the middle are two figures, one a basketball player and the other a rock climber. The patterns around these figures and elsewhere as background represent the tamariki (children) of the college. At the bottom on the left and right is the whenua (land) and in the middle is the moana (coast).
