

THE PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Excerpts from the Principal's address at Senior Prize Giving

Bream Bay College is a very good school. It has quality staff, good students and a very supportive community. It is a 'Springboard to Success' and today you will see the students who have bounced on the springboard to achieve highly. These achievements are the result of the efforts of everyone involved in our school. To be successful could mean many things to many people. We consider ourselves successful if our students leave as good citizens to the job of their choice, the course of their choice or able to start up their own business.

The Future Roll

The Bream Bay College roll has remained stationary despite the growth in our area. The buoyant economy and plentiful supply of jobs has resulted in more students leaving school earlier than expected. They have left to jobs that are well suited to them. We are very conscious of the need to prepare all our students for what is called the knowledge economy. The skills required to work well in the knowledge field are derived in the last years of secondary school. Leaving to a trade is fine but doing it too soon will cut down future job options.

Buildings/Grounds

We have had the inner courtyard finished off. What a difference it makes to the feel of the school. We are still sorting out how to spend the \$8000 given to us by the PTA to provide seating and a sculpture.

The College has employed a painter for two days per week. He has been working his way around the school repairing joinery and repainting buildings. The art rooms and cooking room modernisation was completed on time with minimal disruption. We look forward to

better learning as a result in the new environments.

The plans to replace the library roof are nearly ready to go to tender. We look forward to this area of our school being tidied up. Our caretakers have focused more on the grounds this year with many gardens having been re-barked and plants replaced.

Academic Achievement

NCEA was a hot topic in the media throughout the year. As a school we are more than happy with our teachers' ability to teach and assess the internal standards.

Our biggest barrier to improved results is the lack of academic urgency shown by many of our NCEA students.

This year sees the introduction of a Junior Diploma for years 7 and 8, and another for years 9 and 10. Students gain an equal number of credits from their curriculum knowledge and from the key competencies each year. For a student to graduate they will need 240 credits in total over the two years of the diploma. The diplomas were introduced so that the focus would be changed to learning rather than behaviour management in the junior school. They also provide better tracking of progress and allow us to ensure that students passing from one year level to the next have the required skills, knowledge and work habits.

For the third year running we have run a peer assisted reading programme. The gains made to our students' reading ages have been dramatic over the last three years. We have added to this programme by offering specialist reading help in terms 2 and 3 along with a home reading programme.

The College Mathematics teachers were impressed with the results of our peer assisted literacy interventions and have put a lot of t i m e a n d e f f o r t into an exciting programme of peer assisted numeracy activities which they predicted would

Improve the levels of numeracy for all of our students.

Bream Bay College formed an information and communication technology (ICT) cluster with Tikipunga High School, Pompallier College and Tauraroa Area School to apply for professional development funding for 2006, 2007 and 2008. We have been successful and as a result the schools will have \$120,000 between them to up skill staff in the use of ICT with the focus on enhancing learning.

Enterprise

Bream Bay College students have again had an enterprising and worthwhile year. Our Young Enterprise students received the Northland Polytechnic Award for the best business plan. At the end of year YES awards they were third in three categories: innovation, business leadership and communication.

A group of our Year 10 students were placed second nationally in the hotly contested BP Community Enterprise Project with a well prepared business plan for a new playground at the Waipu Presbyterian Church. This year there was a brand new section to this competition: the BP Innovation Project which we won. As a result the students received a \$1000 prize.

Cultural

Our Kapahaka Roopu performed with distinction at the Tai Tokerau Festival. Special thanks must go to our tutors and parents who have helped out at all the wananga and practices. A very stirring performance organised by the students was put on at the Stage Challenge dress rehearsal in memory of Wendy Kake.

The Ball was a great success with over 150 students dressed impeccably, behaving impeccably and having a great time. The food, decorations and smooth running of the evening made for a memorable event in our own "glow worm grotto".

The Socials have been a great success with most events getting over a third of the students and often nearly half of our students attending. The parent helpers who have assisted with supervision have been greatly appreciated.

This year's Stage Challenge entry was entirely organised by the students. We look forward to many more similar performances in the years to come.

Bream Bay College rocked again this year at the Northland Rockquest finals taking out third place and best female vocalist. The term 4 Music Night was once again a great success with two and a half hours of performances from more that eighty students performing in twenty three different acts. The acts were polished and the night ran smoothly. Our junior band DMH treated the audience to their original song "Remember Me" that was placed 11th out of 320 entries in the national "Play it Strange" original music competition.

Vocal groups have been running successfully now for the last two years. This year's vocal group entered the "Big Sing" taking out the most entertaining award. They also won the local singing competition and performed with distinction at the Te Tuinga concert and the Music Night.

Students this year have been treated to performances by outside groups such as the Ugly Shakespeare Company, Excel performing arts group and My Life Story.

We were treated to another outstanding set of performances by our students at our Te Tuinga concert (the coming together of the cultures) held in term 3. Performances included dancing, singing, kapahaka, poetry, highland dancing and the college Pipe Band.

The art department has continued its tradition of showcasing our students' art work by displaying it on the walls of the auditorium during all public performances thus adding to the ambience of the functions.

Sports

The combined efforts of the staff, under the guidance of our sports coordination teacher and with the help of our sports coordination assistant, has seen the profile of sport in the College lifted once again. The inter-house competition has been intense. Exchanges have run smoothly and we have been well represented in NSSSA events. We had the largest teams in the zone athletics and zone cross country events. Five of our students competed at the national level in the codes of swimming, triathlon, squash, karate and body boarding. We came 1st in the boys' zone soccer competition and 3rd in the NSSSA competition. Our NSSSA triathlon results were outstanding with three first places. Added to this we have had 12 students complete netball and hockey refereeing badges.

The increased levels of motivation and participation have been supported by the introduction of \$8000 worth of new uniforms which has improved the overall appearance of our teams.

We have set up a Memorandum of Understanding with the Swimming Club and are in the process of setting up a similar document with the Bream Bay Hockey Club. We would like to make progress with similar agreements with Waipu Rugby Club and the Waipu Netball Club. As part of another push to integrate college sport with the community we have been working on getting a hockey turf sited at the College.

Student Welfare

In all schools incidents will occur. In a restorative school when an incident happens we seek to use a restorative process to repair the harm. Where an offender refuses to take responsibility or ownership for their part in the incident we fall back to a punitive based system. Our aim is to prepare all students in a way that enables them to better cope with incidents in their future. Restorative processes teach emotional intelligence and resilience. We are well set to continue further down this path in 2006 with improvements to our current systems and further

As part of a proactive restorative based process we now have student councils operating at three different levels with their money coming from the proceeds of socials and mufti days. This year they will have raised in excess of \$7000 to spend on improvements to the school that they feel directly benefit students. Our three tier system of mediators

is now in its second year. It has been noticeable that the number of mediations in the College is declining which is a good long term trend.

Other student based groups include our PSST (peer sexuality support) team, the SADD team, our senior prefects and our junior prefects who operate at the end of each year. We continue to link closely with many external health agencies. An area of concern this year has been the level of preventative work required to be done by our dental technicians. The doctor in school programme has continued to be a success along with our sexual health counsellor.

The Respect weeks and Peace week have continued to be a feature of the school along with the 10 week awesome workers cycle. This year, paper cranes were made as part of peace week and were delivered to Hiroshima in Japan by our students on the Japanese trip.

AN INTERVIEW WITH MR FRED OGILVIE

At the end of Term 1, Mr Fred Ogilvie retired as the caretaker of Bream Bay College after 21 years of service.

When did you first start work at Bream Bay College?

I started on the 18th April 1984

How many principals have you served under?

Principals have been; Warwick Aston, Jules Flight, Linda Fox, John Fitzgerald/Sue Crawford, Murray Lints, and now Wayne Buckland.

What did you used to do before becoming caretaker?

At 17½, I joined the Royal Air Force in England as an airframe mechanic. After leaving the Air Force, I migrated in 1968 to NZ where I farmed sheep and cattle.

How has your wife, Dot, been involved at the College?

Dot worked at the College as a cleaner for 16 years, and also as a gardener for several years.

I understand that you have been involved in coaching several sports. Could you tell me about these sports?

I helped Kevin Ficker coach the Girls Cricket Team for 11 years, and then took over as coach when Kevin left in 1996.

I have also organised indoor bowls at the College since 1999. The College has been very successful in this sport, with the highlight being 2 girls who went to the Nationals finishing 11th out of 16 in the pairs section.

I was also involved in the 1995 outdoor bowls team with Jill Billyeald when the team won the inaugural cup.

I have also been a keen supporter of the 1st XV rugby team over the years.

What community organisations have you belonged to in Bream Bay?

I have been a member of the Waipu Outdoor and Ruakaka Indoor Bowling Clubs for 21 years, president of the Waipu club from 1994 to 1996 and president of the Ruakaka indoor club for 12 years on and off during this time.


contemplation and enjoyment of the environment

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

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
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

HIGASHI EXCHANGE

Over the September holidays, a group of 22 students, staff and parents journeyed to Japan to visit our sister school, Osaka Higashi Senior High School. This exchange programme dates back to 1994, with Higashi and Bream Bay College exchanging visits on alternate years.

Day 1: Departed from Bream Bay College at 9.30am after a blessing from Rev Dunn. Travelled by bus to Auckland Airport. Our flight departed at 2.15pm a 10 hour flight in a Boeing 747 to Singapore. For many of the students, this was their first time out of New Zealand. The long flight was made bearable by the personal entertainment system for each passenger, where they had access to 60 movies and TV programmes and a range of computer games.

Arrived in Singapore at 8.00pm (local time). During the 4 hour stop in transit, most had a hot shower in the transit hotel, and then went looking through the numerous shops. Met up with Dion Gee's parents, who had arrived in Singapore on a later flight.

Day 2: Departed Singapore just after midnight on a Boeing 777 for a 6 hour flight to Osaka. Most took the opportunity to try to get some sleep.

After breakfast, the plane landed at Kansai Airport at 8.30 am, where we were met by two Higashi teachers who escorted us by train to the school. The first thing we noticed was the heat it was already 26 degrees, and it later rose to 31 degrees. The train trip took 1 hour to reach Kyobashi Station, our destination. A group of students met us with luggage trolleys to take our suitcases to the school, which was a 5 minute walk away.



We were taken to the Meeting Room where the first of our Japanese style meals was provided for us. The Higashi students arrived just after 1.00pm. After a welcome ceremony, students were introduced to their hosts, and departed for home.

Day 3 & 4: With homestay families for the weekend. A range of activities and sites visited included Universal Studies, Himeji Castle, the Osaka Aquarium, and sightseeing trips to Kyoto and Kobe.

Day 5: Monday, and the first day of school. The BBC staff were introduced at the Higashi staff meeting, where Mr Buckland made a short speech. Students went off to class. Periods 2 - 4

were spent learning about Japanese culture, including lessons in calligraphy. During periods 6-7, students were given lessons in basic Japanese.

After school, staff and students participated in a Japanese Tea Ceremony. After watching Japanese students perform the ceremony, all our students and staff were given the opportunity to make the tea themselves, and have it served to other members of the group.

Day 6: Period 1 practice of cultural items. A few startled heads appeared from windows when Grant practised his bagpipe tunes. The concert was held at lunchtime in the courtyard. The students filed into the courtyard behind Grant, who played a

Mr Hansen had to take careful note of the route as he had to lead the students back without the escorting teacher. Kids Plaza Osaka was 3 storeys of hands-on science activities. While it was aimed at younger children, the students had fun spending the morning interacting with the various displays. After lunch in a large room with over 100

primary school students, the group headed back to Higashi.

On the way over, they had spotted a long shopping arcade (it was the longest in Japan), and they spent the afternoon looking through a range of shops and having their photos taken in the photo booths.

Mrs Smyth, Mr Simons and Mrs Gibson had spent the day at Hiroshima. They had travelled down by Shinkansen (the bullet train), and met Mr Sato, the Japanese teacher who had taught at Bream Bay College last year. He took them to the Peace Memorial Park the site under which the nuclear bomb exploded. Mrs Smyth placed some of the paper cranes folded by BBC students during Peace Week at the base of the Peace Monument.

Day 8: While students attended classes in the morning, the teachers went by train to the Osaka Ceramics Museum.

After lunch, the group walked to Peace Osaka, in the grounds of nearby Osaka Castle. This was a museum showing the effects of the bombing of Osaka in World War 2, and the effects of other conflicts since 1945.

Day 9: Day trip to Nara. Met at school and travelled by train to Nara. Much of the journey was in a long tunnel that went under a mountain range. At Nara, we walked to the temple complex. Here there were a large number of deer wandering around the complex. Bags of rice cakes could be purchased and fed by hand to the deer. The first stop was at Kofuku-ji Temple, with its 5 storey pagoda that dates back to 1426. The pagoda was built entirely without nails. After a Japanese style lunch, we walked across to Todai-ji Temple. This temple houses a 16 metre high statue of Buddha, and dates back to 752. We then

walked back to Nara station and returned by train to Higashi.

Day 10: Along with 15,000 Japanese students, we attended the Osaka City Sports Day for senior high schools. The opening ceremony was like an Olympic opening ceremony, with a march past of the teams of the 21 schools attending, followed by displays from the massed brass bands, cheerleaders, dancers, and baton twirlers.

At lunchtime, non-competing students were allowed to leave. Most of the host students took the BBC students to Osaka Castle for a tour through the complex.

Day 11: The group met at 7.00am at Kyobashi station to depart for the airport. Farewells to the Higashi staff and families. Also, a farewell to Paula Cullen, who was staying on at Higashi for a 3 month exchange. Caught the train to Kansai Airport. Several of the homestay families travelled out with us. A final farewell before going through Immigration.

Coming in to land at Singapore, the plane flew in from the north, providing a good view of the Malaysian jungle. After transferring to our hotel, the group walked up to the Night Market at nearby Bugis Street for the first taste of shopping in Singapore.

Day 12: Walked down to Chinatown with its cheap clothes and electronics. Mr Buckland found a tailor and was measured for a new suit. Caught the free Singapore Stopover bus and travelled up to Orchard Rd, and more shops. Had lunch, and caught the Singapore Stopover bus back to the Singapore River, near Chinatown. Here we boarded two boats that took us on a tour down the Singapore River.


After dinner, we took a bus to the Night Safari. Here we boarded a tram and went for a 45 minute trip around the zoo, looking at all the nocturnal animals. Music is clearly in good shape at Bream Bay College, roll on next year!





Overall the judges felt the standard of speech was very high and other topics ranged from Harry Potter to Hip-hop.










In addition, swimmers also received 17 second places and 17 third places. It was great to see so many of our students participating in a competitive environment and performing well.



PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Thanks to the 2005 staff: Jenny Thornhill, Sarah-Jane Kidd, and Gemma Jackson, for their superb contributions to the Phys Ed programme. Their efforts have far reaching consequences in the development of a positive life long approach to participation in activity. The misconception that competitive success is the sole justification for involvement in activity represents a challenge. However, this PE Department is committed to the philosophy that involvement is everything.

The Physical Education Department is looking forward to the challenges of 2006, and wishes all students success in the pursuit of their personal endeavours.

2005 Highlights

Year 7 10 Programme: The Aquatics programme was structured around two concepts; GATE and Total Immersion. GATE is a programme that offers students the opportunity to achieve their potential. Total Immersion is an Aquatics programme that is based on balance, streamlining the Aquatic shape, and Kinetics. The dominant swim coaches use this principle and it was received with a mixture of confusion and enthusiasm by BBC students. I can only encourage students to structure their swim pursuits around this concept.

NCEALevel 1 Programme: 2005 was the first year that a full 24 credit course was offered. The academic requirements were not embraced with a high level of enthusiasm! The opportunity that method, structure, and organisation play in the pursuit of any performance goal, was not seen as a valued goal. To be fair to the students, I believe that it is a

difficult transitional step from Year 10 to NCEA Level 1 essentially a move from play to structure. But the course offers much more than 24 credits. I would encourage future students of this course to study the BBC Curriculum Booklet to gain a detailed understanding of the dynamics and requirements of senior PE.

NCEA Level 2 Programme: The highlight of this course would have to be the assessment associated with the trip to the Outdoor Pursuits centre in August. Miss Thornhill communicated OPC had offered experiences in line with the original concept - the belief that an outdoor activity is of value when the participant is taken beyond perceived boundaries; essentially out of one's comfort zone. Summiting Mount Ruapehu and sleeping in snow caves were challenges that definitely extended the students involved. The essence of embracing challenge is not a curriculum requirement but certainly a positive life skill. The contribution that Miss Thornhill has made is an ideal example of the positives in Education extending beyond the curriculum.

NCEA Level 3 Programme:

The course was based around three elements: 1)Aquatics using the Arthur Lydiard approach to performance development;

2) Cycling with a focus on personal well being and the promotion of Female only Sport (the event was titled 'Be Sarah Ulmer' a 25km time trial); 3) the Public Health Issue of Obesity (population comparison of body mass index and percent body fat as reliable predictors of this condition)

A major benefit of having a small, quality class was the opportunity to discuss a range of philosophies associate with diverse topics. This represented the real privilege of teaching for me.

Bay of Islands Fieldtrip

On Tuesday 22nd March, a group of 85 Year 9 students, along with Mr Hansen, Mrs Chapman, Miss Frost, and Mrs Macartney, travelled to the Bay of Islands. As part of their study on the Treaty of Waitangi, students visited the grounds of the Waitangi Trust. Here the students watched the AV display in the Visitor's Centre, walked in the footsteps of Governor Hobson to the site where the Treaty was signed, and visited the Treaty House.

At Paihia, the group boarded the ferry for a trip across the Bay to Russell (formally known as Kororareka), the site of New Zealand's first capital. Here the group split into two groups; half visited the DOC information centre, while the other half went to Christ Church New Zealand's oldest surviving church. It was outside this church that fighting took place between British troops and Maori warriors the bullet holes can still be seen in the church walls.

After the groups swapped, they walked through Russell and up Flagstaff Hill, to the site of the flagpole that was chopped down by Hone Heke.

The objective of this trip was to take students to important historic places that they had been studying for the previous few weeks. There, they could gain a firsthand experience of being in those locations and further their knowledge on events that occurred at that time.

Taranaki Fieldtrip

On April 10th, forty-five Year 10 students commenced a three day fieldtrip to Taranaki entitled 'The Road to Parihaka'. The purpose of the fieldtrip was to enhance students' understanding of land issues that arose after the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi.

After passing through Auckland, the bus followed the route taken by the invading British troops. Travelling down beside the Great South Rd, the bus crossed over the Mangatawhiri Stream and past the battle sites of Meremere, Rangiriri, and Orakau

Lunch was at Te Awamutu, formally a frontier town on the edge of the King Country.

After lunch, the bus continued on to Taranaki, and the motorcamp at New Plymouth.

On the second day, the group travelled south to Hawera, another area of fighting between Government and Maori forces. Sites visited there were the battle

sites of Turuturu Mokai, and the Tawhiti Museum.

From Hawera, the bus followed the route taken by government forces as they moved around the coast to attack Parihaka

At Parihaka, after a powhiri, the students were addressed by kaumatua Mr Rukuwai, a great grandson of Te Whiti o Rongomai. He was able to provide a Maori perspective to the passive resistance movement that was led by Te Whiti at Parihaka. Students also had the opportunity of looking through the famous and historic settlement.

On the way back to the motorcamp, the group stopped at Puke Ariki (the museum in New Plymouth), where there were further displays on the Land Wars and Parihaka.

On the third day, the students packed up and made the 10 hour return journey to Bream Bay. A detour was made at Otorahonga so that students could visit the site of the Alexandra Redoubt at Pirongia. A further stop was made at Rangiriri where students were able to walk over a section of the Pa where the battle was fought. By using maps and diagrams drawn at that time, students were better able to visualise the events that occurred at the site.

It was a weary, but much enlightened group that arrived back at Bream Bay at 7.30pm that night.


Auckland Fieldtrip
