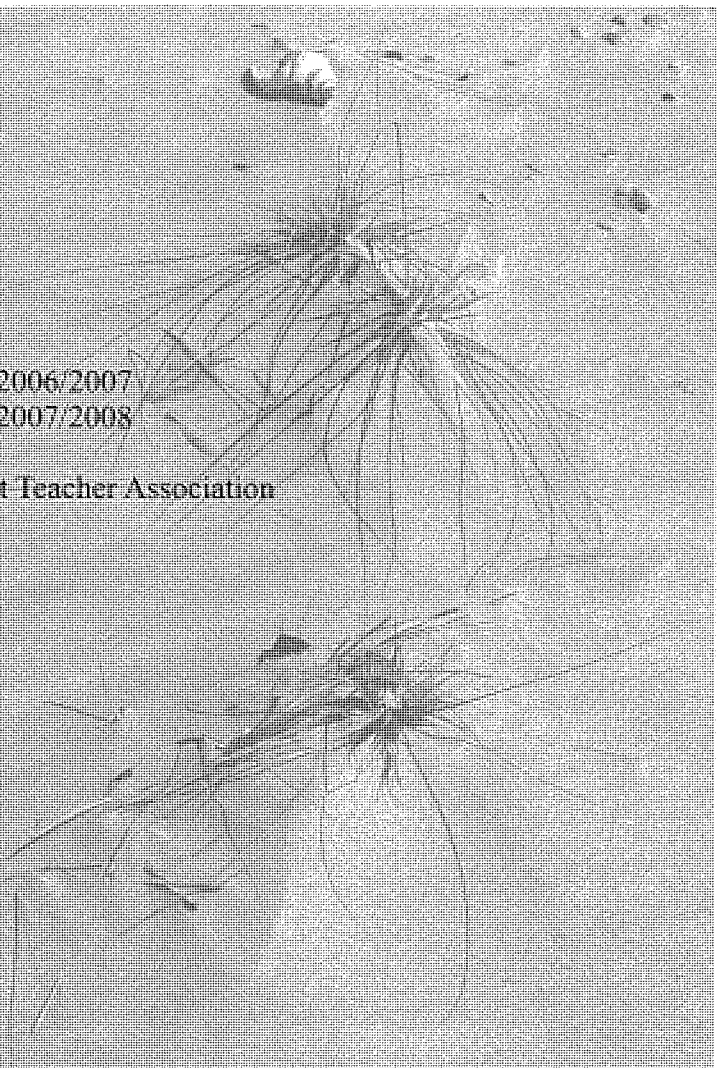

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Principals Address

He mihi nui kia koutou katoa

Everybody likes it when a plan comes together and they all get to enjoy the fruits of their labour. 2007 has been one of those years for the students, staff and Bream Bay Community.

Our students are excelling. Our 2006 NCEA results were well above the national average at levels 1, 2 and 3. Our students' sporting accomplishments are outstanding. The cultural performances are of a high standard and have been enjoyable and varied. Our students continue to develop high quality leadership skills and enjoy the range of academic activities normally associated with a much larger school.

2007 Focus

2007 was the second year of the College being involved in an Information Communication Technology (ICT) contract with Pompallier College, Tikipunga High School and Tauraroa Area School. The College's computing capabilities have grown significantly and the involvement of ICT in learning situations continues to grow. It is often said that knowledge is power. As part of the contract we have aimed to empower the parents and students by providing them with open access to their own and subject information in real time. The provision of course outlines, assessment information, links to web sites and homework information through 'myclasses' has been available to all students for 3 terms. Access to the College's School Administration System through a web product called 'Spider' has been available to parents and students since mid term 3.

The Tai Tokerau Festival in term one was an opportunity for our community to celebrate our Maori heritage. The students, staff and community rallied behind the event and created a festival that will be remembered for many years.

The brand new NZ Curriculum was released in November. You will be pleased to know that

almost all of the changes required to implement this curriculum have been made prior to its release and three years ahead of the compulsory change deadline. Your sons and daughters as a result have had more opportunities to be developed holistically and you will see and hear of some of their accomplishments today.

2007 was the second year of our full participation in the national Numeracy contract. All of our junior students are assessed for their numeracy skills and these are developed as they progress through the College. The style of learning and individual student focused development has helped lift the level of mathematical achievement above the national averages, improve our students' logic and reasoning skills and prepare them for a world that is immersed in numbers.

The College has received both National and International recognition for its implementation of Restorative Practices. It is easy to get acknowledgement that the punitive system that works around the concept that "punishing offenders changes their behaviour and by doing this the victim is taken care of" does not work. It is also easy to get people to acknowledge that a system that focuses on finding out how a victim has been harmed both physically and emotionally and then sets about restoring the victim is much better. The restorative system does this. Not only are victims the focus but offenders gain understanding of how they harmed others and get an opportunity to repair the harm done. Re-offence rates are much lower. However, whenever something significant happens due to years of conditioning, the first thought often is still one of punishment by the system rather than resolution of the problem. It is heartening that most secondary schools in New Zealand have realised that Restorative Practices are a better way of ensuring good behaviour. The unnecessary laying to waste of many of our young's lives by exclusion, suspension or stand-downs as a result is reducing and as a country we are set to reap the benefits for many years to come.

The biggest disappointment of 2007 has been the inability of the College to build its Performing Arts block. We have \$1.2 million approved but can not spend it as it is not enough. You can not build a building that requires around \$3000 per square metre when

you are being funded at a rate of \$2250 per square metre. We continue to work with the Ministry of Education to try and find a solution but the obvious answer of providing an appropriate amount of money seems to elude them. To proceed and build a smaller area than we have been allocated would disadvantage all future students at the college.

On the brighter side the Library upgrade has provided our students with access to the best library in Northland and the new "5 Year Property Agreement" money of \$1,220,000 will allow us to upgrade the insides of all of our classrooms as well as the tennis courts.

Where to in 2008

We expect to lift the levels of academic attainment of all of our students yet again. As part of doing this you can expect further developments in the ICT fields and in our Restorative Practices model. We will continue with the peer assisted Numeracy and Literacy Initiatives and bring back our Drugs Awareness Week. Most importantly we will continue to attract and retain high quality staff who relate well to students.

The role of a school is finally changing from the industrial model where classes of 40 plus students sat in rows, were controlled by fear of punishment and were taught knowledge to an environment where learning takes place, relationships are paramount, compliance is through understanding and the skills of learning are more important than the knowledge. Being a lifelong learner is now a norm in the school. Today is about acknowledging the success of our students but it is appropriate at this time for all of us to consider the successes of the College staff (support and teaching). They are all now lifetime learners. The skills and knowledge that they have not only had to come to grips with in the last 5 years but then had to use to deliver high quality learning experiences is vast. They all deserve a certificate and yes, each of their certificates would be diverse and full of commendations. Thank you for all your work, for being the change agents, for being prepared to take a risk and try again tomorrow even if it didn't work today. To those staff who are leaving I wish you well in your futures and for all staff I thank you for your contributions.

I wish to publicly acknowledge the Board of the school. They are totally focused on Bream Bay College being at the forefront of education so that our students are participating in the latest of learning and are achieving highly. The Board is willing to challenge all aspects of how a school operates and pushes for constant improvement. You have all given yourselves freely to this task and we all thank you for this.

Knowledge is power, knowledge is the key to success, sharing knowledge makes us all feel included and makes all of us successful.

Board of Trustees Report

This year the Board has worked well as a cohesive unit with a shared vision and goals. The vision remains that Bream Bay College be the first choice secondary school in our community through our academic, sporting, and social success. Mr Buckland will tell you how far we have advanced in achieving this vision. Our goals remain centred around each student achieving to their potential in any year that they attend Bream Bay College, and to reach these goals we are mindful of many strands that encompass our students, staff, campus environment, health and safety, discipline and addressing social issues we have as the result of being one part of a dynamic Bream Bay Community.

This year has seen a number of changes to the Board through resignations and triennial elections. The present board members are Stuart Abercrombie (Vice Chair), Wayne Buckland (Principal), Glenice Andrews, Alisha Castle (Student Trustee), Lee Chase, Dave Cullen, Peter Dunn (Chair), Mick Gadd, and Katrina Sandford. The new trustees that came on the Board at election time were Glenice and Katrina. Alisha replaced Jared Gravatt as Student Trustee. I wish to acknowledge Jared's contribution during the year. Anne Ruxton resigned as the Staff Trustee as she is leaving the college at the end of the year and an election for a replacement is pending. Again, I would acknowledge her contribution to the board. At the election Gavin Sims stood down after being co-opted by the Board for a year. We also have attending our Board meetings Beverley Webb as Secretary, and Jacqui Leonard as Executive Officer.

I am required to report to you on the finances of the school. For the 2006 year our audited accounts reported a deficit of \$38,148, including a figure for depreciation of \$127,000. This year we are heading for a similar result. Over the last six years of reporting to you I have been indicating that government funding for a school such as ours is becoming increasingly inadequate. The deficit of last year was one we budgeted for. This year is the same. I need to inform you that for the 2008 budget we are predicting a deficit of \$106,220. This includes a depreciation sum of \$134,000. This is despite the board running a lean system that in many support areas is barely adequate. For next year's budget we have maintained curriculum expenditure to our preferred level of 20% of income, but have

trimmed some areas of professional development, guidance, whanau support, pastoral and Deaning budgets. Some good news - our deficit would be \$50,000 worse, or substantial cuts would have been made this year to services, if we had not been regraded as a Decile 4 school from Decile 5.

To tell it like it is. Financially, we are up against it. We have no fat left in the system. We believe we can live with a large deficit for 2008. But when we set the budget for 2009, we are going to have to make significant cuts that will reduce what we can offer to students. We are frustrated and perplexed by this. This means that your parent contributions are not the cream on top but have become an important component in our operational funding. This means that this time next year we may be asking the community for significant financial help to maintain what we have.

Last year I said to you that by now you would be sitting in a refurbished building with a brand new four room state of the art performing arts block attached behind me. The plans are drawn, in fact two sets of them, the second set to reduce costs. We have been promised funding at \$2,250m², but we know from building industry figures that the cost is \$3,000m². We can't afford to build but are working on it. In the meantime we remain under code for classrooms.

Our plans to build new classrooms, along with similar plans by Otamatea High School, triggered the Ministry of Education to require us to have an enrolment scheme which will come into effect next year. The Ministry kindly drew the scheme boundaries for us. The Board made suggestions to reduce them because in some areas they went over the catchment areas of our contributing Primary Schools, past where historically and culturally we have drawn our pupils from as a Bream Bay school network. Some of the boundaries were adjusted back to a more realistic

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location. At the moment all but one of our neighbouring schools and those in town with scheme boundaries that intersect ours have signed off on the scheme. However, Otamatea High School has a different view to the Ministry. While we are basing our boundaries on the catchment area of Waipu Primary School in the south which goes to the top of the Brynderwyn's, Otamatea is wanting the boundary at the halfway point between the two schools, just north of Glenmohr Rd on SH1. This halfway point boundary is used by the Ministry to determine bus transport and funding. The Board's position is that we do not mind where the Ministry sets the boundary in the end but our preference is that it aligns with the boundaries of our contributing Primary Schools. Our college bus runs are funded to the halfway point, no matter what. Because the four Bream Bay schools operate a bulk funded transport system for both primary and secondary students, we have the advantage of being able to use all our runs for any student who goes to a Bream Bay school. As long as Otamatea High School can fund the extension from the halfway point into Waipu, they will not be affected either. However, if Bream Bay College reaches its student capacity and you live outside the enrolment scheme boundary, then you will only be able to enrol if there is space at the time and at the discretion of the board.

There is much more I could say about lots of things. But I'm not. I would like to finish by saying that the board is beginning to see real concrete and testable evidence that Bream Bay College is definitely on the up. The College, through the dedication and hard work of the staff, has come to grips with what it means to be successful educators. This College is going to go from strength to strength. In another three years we are going to be not just above average in academic achievement. I estimate we are going to be in the top 20% and the top 10%. Wayne, you are proving to be an extraordinary educational leader. Bream Bay staff, you are hitting your stride. Thank you very much. To my Board, my thanks to you. You are intelligent, knowledgeable and really sharp. It has been a privilege to lead you this year.

Lindsey has also been involved with the conversion of the Library software system to a new module.

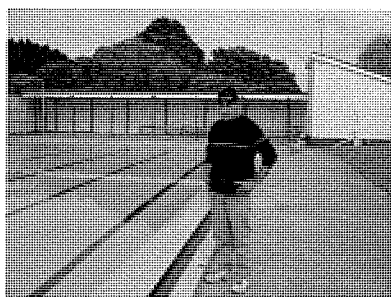

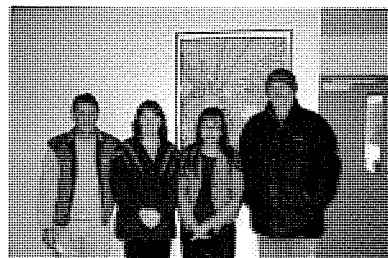

A very important role within the school is that of Teacher Aides, offering specialist help and support to classrooms and individual students.

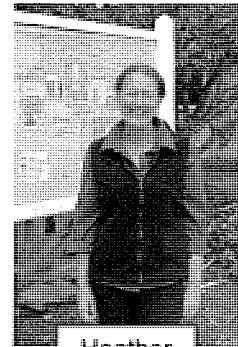

After 12 months of planning, Bream Bay College was at its best in late July as it hosted the annual Northland Wide MATHEX competition. This mathematical extravaganza pits teams of four from schools across Northland in a frantic, exciting competition. It was a huge challenge to get everything ready. Acknowledgement must go to Whangarei Boys High School who have successfully hosted the competition for the last 14 years.



The organisation for this was huge with over 40 schools invited to take part from Warkworth to Kaitaia. Eventually 135 teams, 540 students plus teachers, parents and supporters came to Bream Bay to watch and take part.

The college auditorium was decorated to a mathematical theme with students from Years 7 to 10 contributing their ideas. Senior students helped on the day to get the auditorium ready and by 3.15pm when the first teams arrived for the Year 7 competition, the place was looking fantastic. 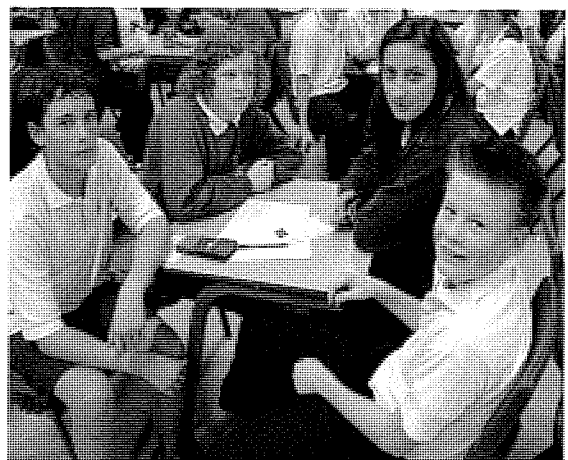
The competitions were very tight for each year group, especially for Year 7 & 8 which ended in tiebreakers. Eventual winners for each age group were:

Where the Yr 7, 8 & 9's can be safe, including myself

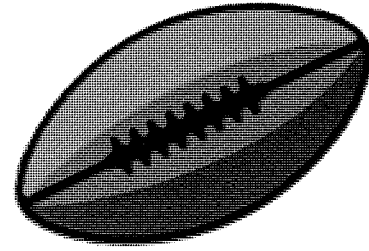
A place where I can have good and healthy food

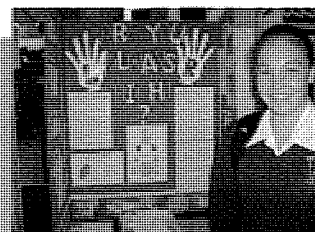

Field trips always form a memorable part of the school year. Year 13 Biology will fondly remember their trip to the estuary to survey and collect mangroves for their plant study. They also spent time at Auckland University going to lectures on current biological issues and Auckland Zoo studying the animals as part of their preparation for Level 3 NCEA.

Year 12 collected data at Mussell Rock, Waipu before completing the write up of the information collected at the beach. A lovely day was enjoyed by all. Mr Bignall took this years senior Physics students to study force and motion at Rainbow's End. They had fun with their accelerometers. The physical education students tagged along with the Phys Ed staff.

As part of the co-curricular opportunities offered to intermediate students in 2007, a small group had the opportunity to attend an open day at the Waikato University Campus.

Students were able to look around the university campus and had access to the educational facilities, workshops and other organised activities.

The group left Bream Bay early in the morning and arrived at approximately 11 am. We proceeded to tour around the Earth Science Department which included going into the labs. The students then went to the physics and engineering laboratories to experiment with equipment. The next stop was the Chemistry Department where the students watched displays and then had an opportunity to blow stuff up and watch projectiles with combustible chemicals fly down the lab. Students were kitted out in full safety gear.

After a breather it was down to the design engineering workshops..... projects on view there were the self vacuuming water tank, dairy milk drying machine, hull design, and the smelting of melt alloys. The students had a go operating the flow channel and the wind tunnel. The last activity was where the students had a go at injection moulding of plastic.

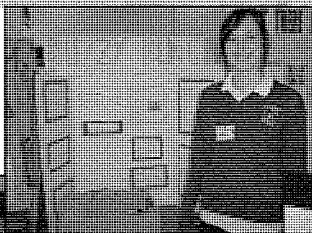
After a short break, students toured the Mathematics Department and then went on to computer science. The highlight from the students at this point was the gaming lab where they were able to match their gaming skill against computers... the games dated between 1962-2006.

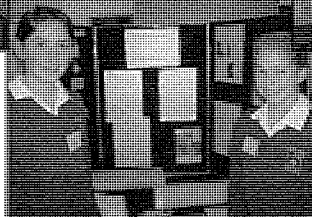

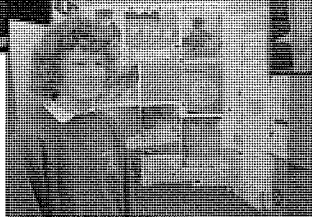

SAND DUNE PLANTING 9Y

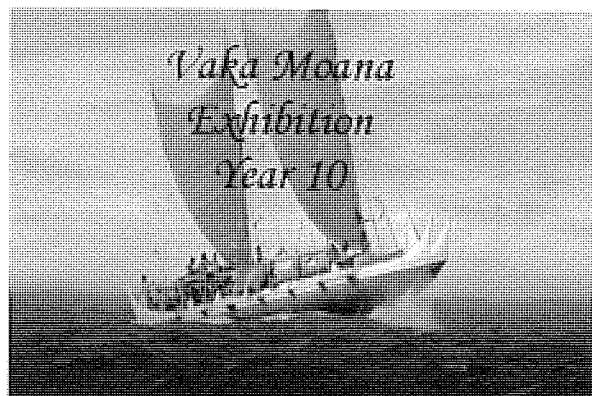
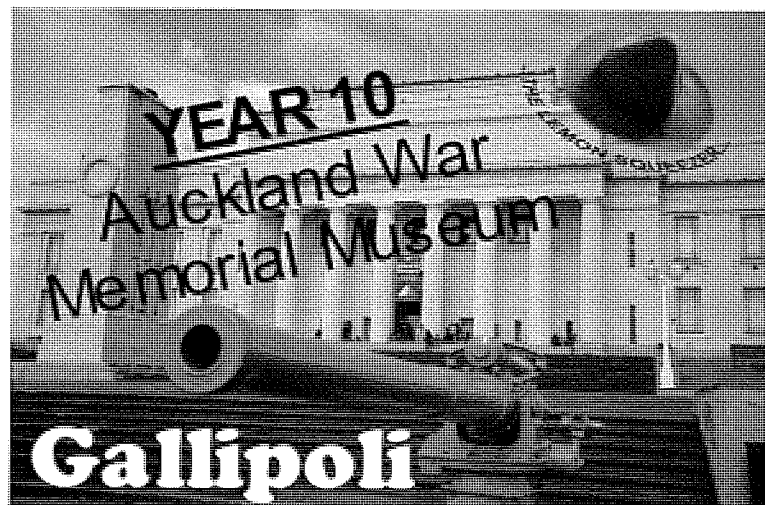
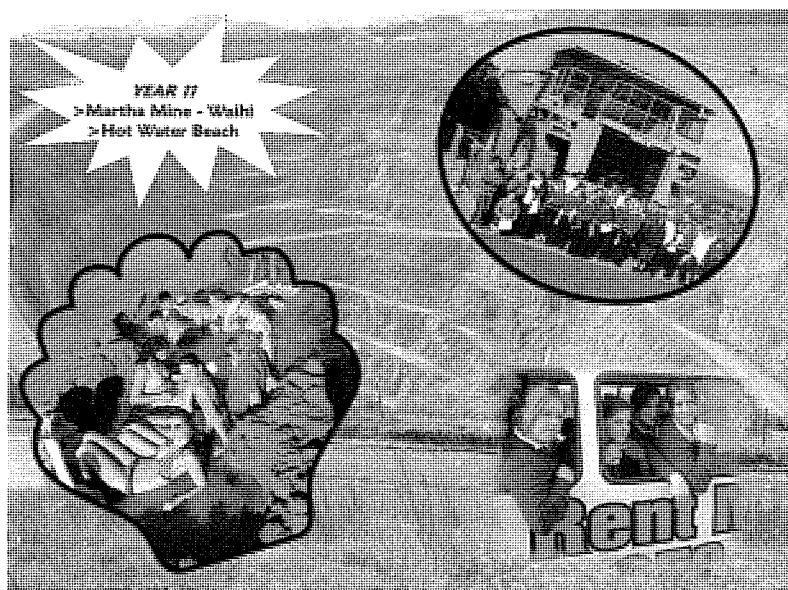

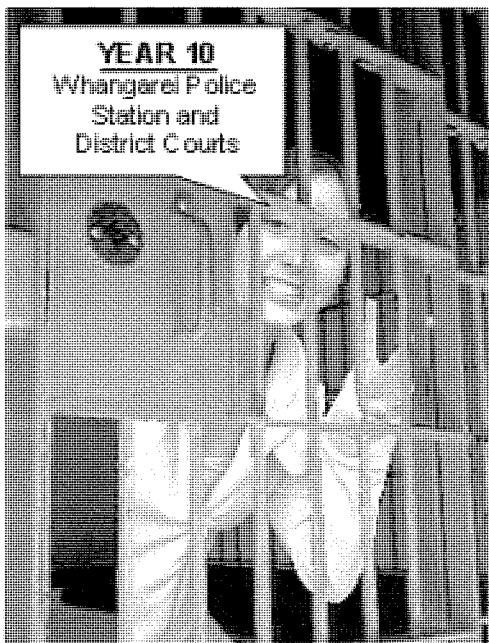
dune will protect the land and buildings behind from the sea. After all our work we were able to have a muffin and glass of punch. It was delicious and we had loads of fun planting.

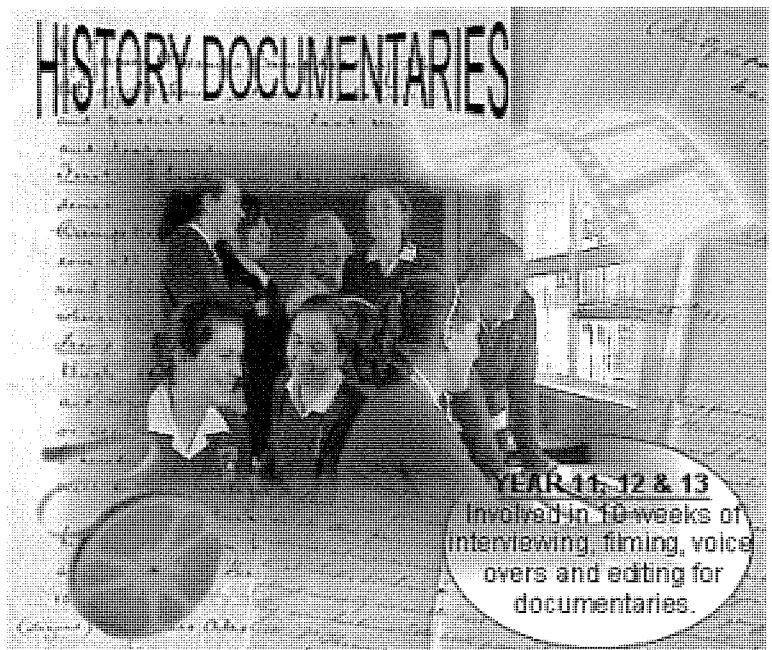

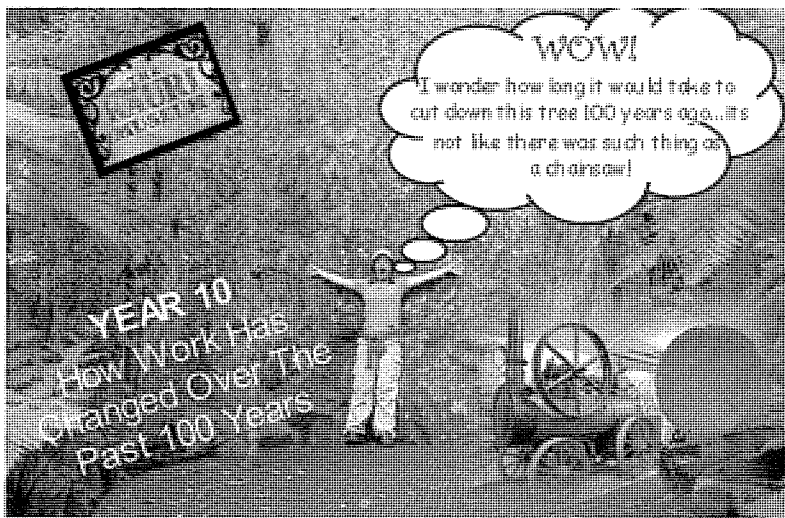

Whangarei Police Station and District Courts

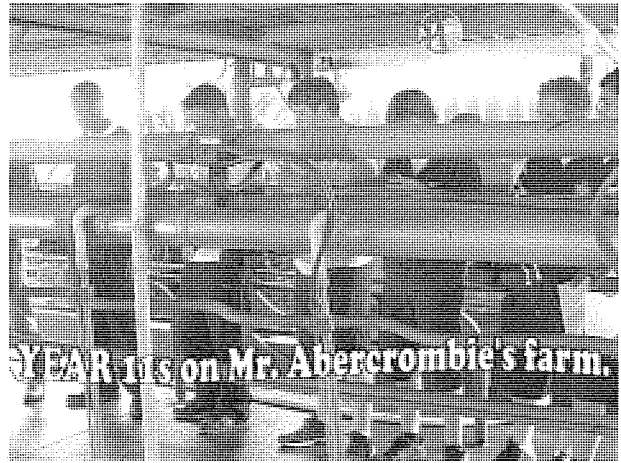

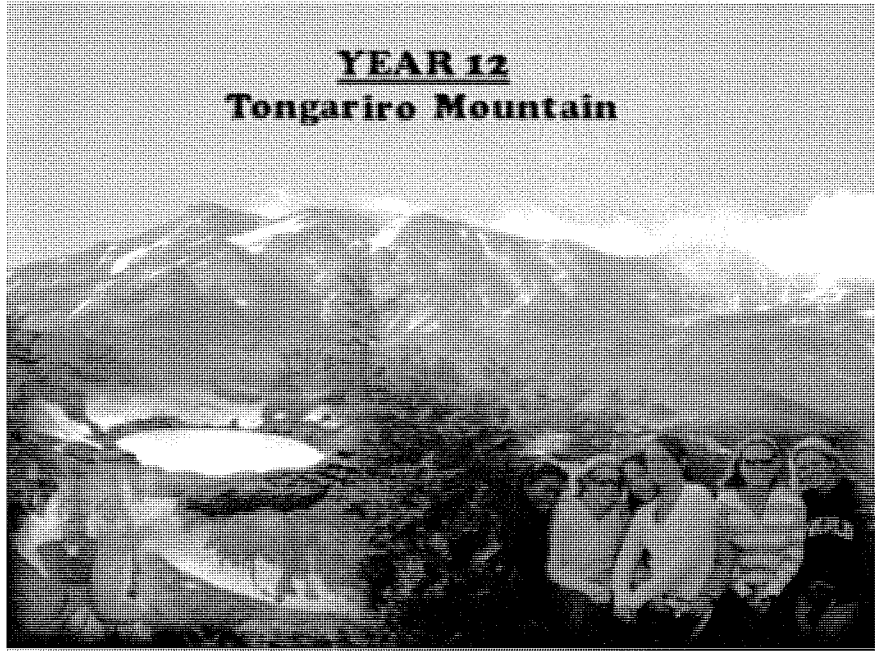

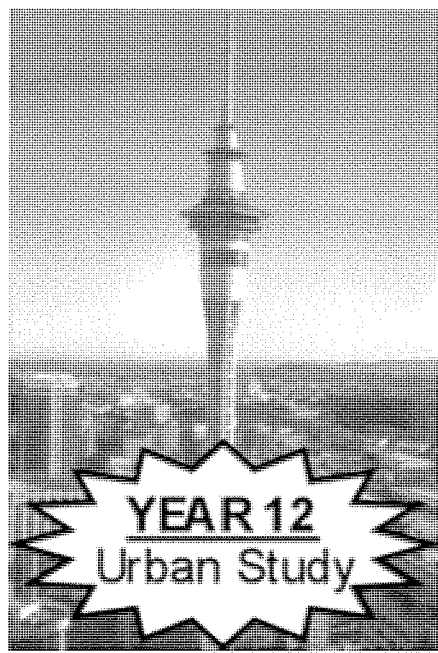

TECHNOLOGY

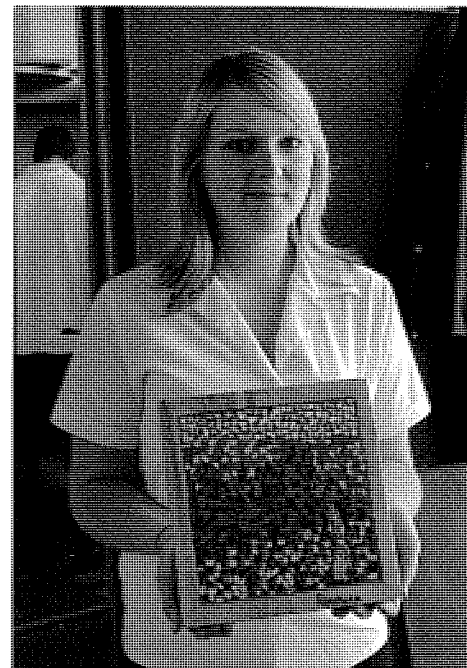


2007 has been a very busy year in the Technology Department.

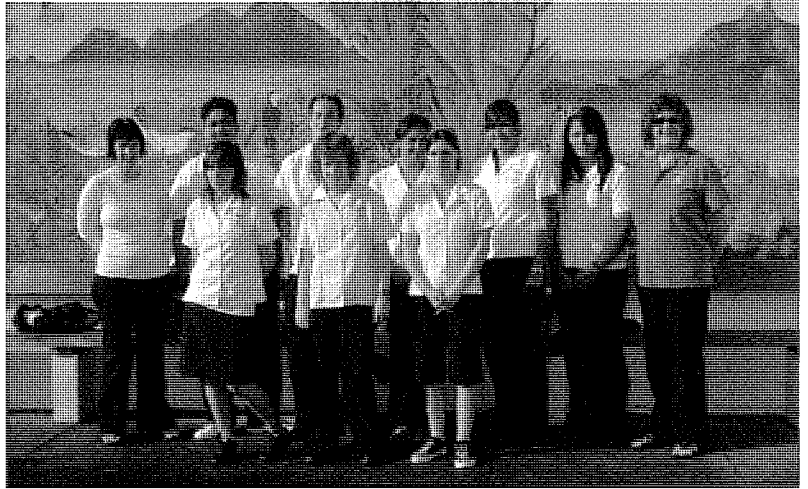

EXCITOR - ECONOMICS TRIP TO THE HOLE IN THE ROCK



Islands to complete an economic investigation concerning price and non price competition. As it was early spring, we were unsure as to what weather would greet us on the morning of our departure. We were pleased to find that the sun was out, the wind was virtually non existent and there was not a rain cloud in the sky. In addition to completing the Achievement Standard, the class took the opportunity to take a tour around the Bay of Islands in an 18 metre fibre glassed boat called the Excitor. With 2 x 800bhp turbo inter-cooled CAT engines, it could push 54 passengers through the water at a maximum speed of 45 knots (83 kmph). Words used by the students to describe the experience of the boat travelling through the famous 'Hole in the rock' included "awesome", "cool" and "amazing".

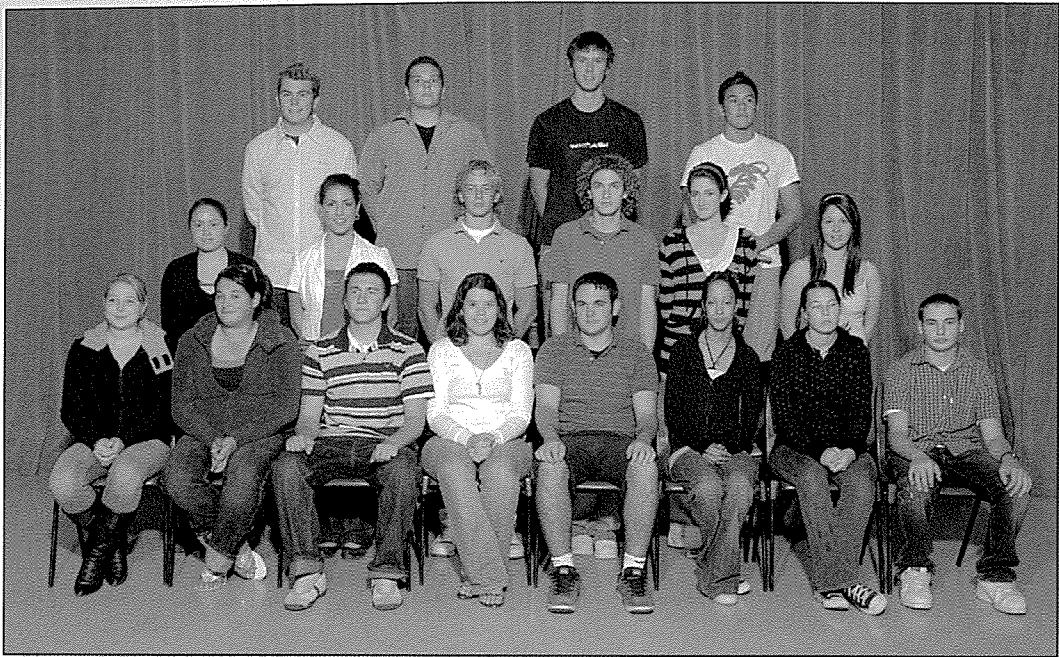
Despite being tired from the day's outing the students thoroughly enjoyed themselves and would particularly recommend the experience on the Excitor to others.

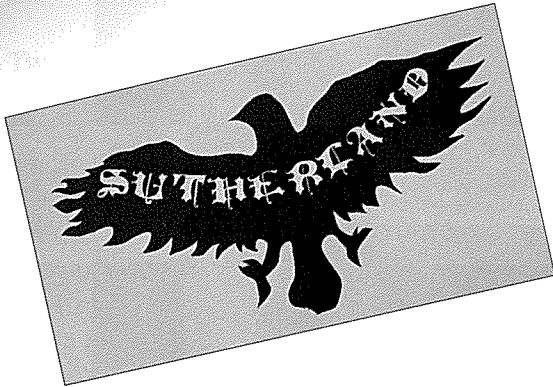
The year 10 ski trip was awesome, so much fun, and definitely a trip most students will be keen to go on next year.

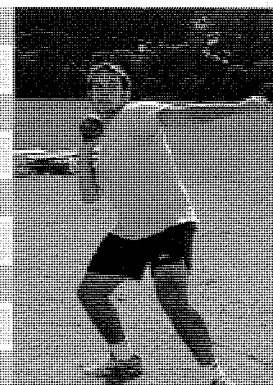


ATHLETICS

Blair Young - Rugby League

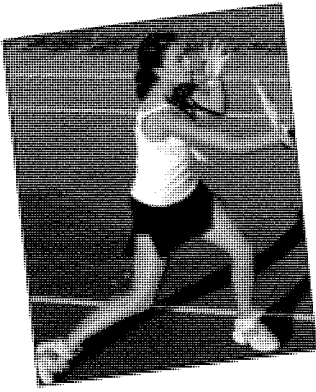

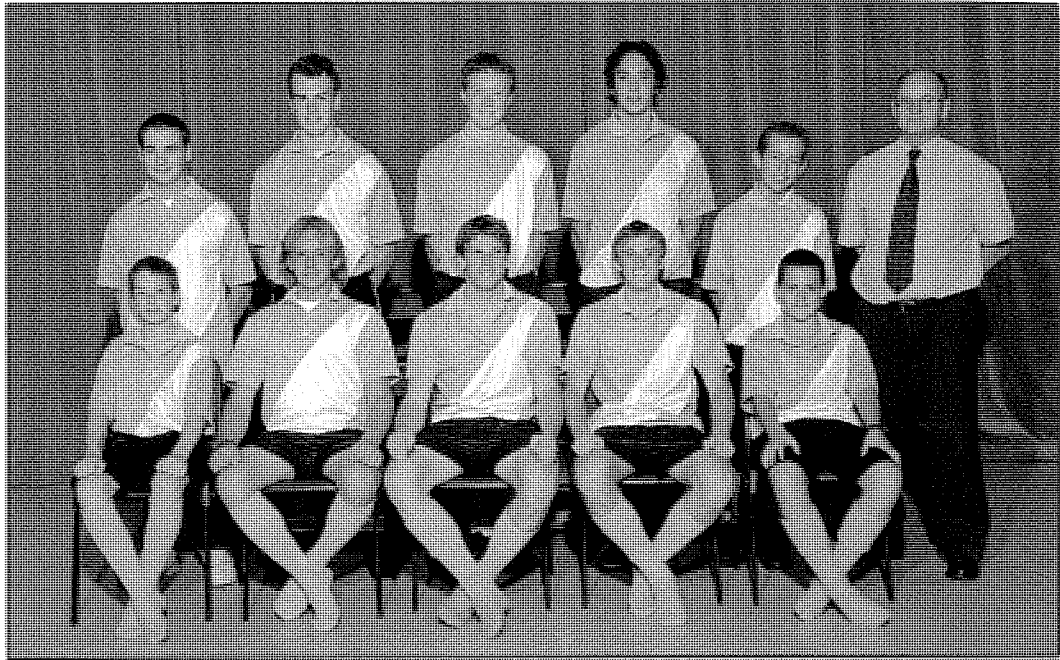
