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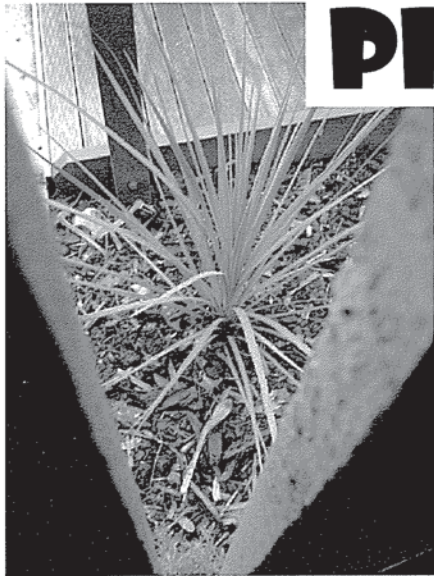
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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Principal's 2009 Prizegiving Report

2009 has been a very successful year. Our students have continued to impress in all areas and the College is proud to be on a road of continual improvement.

The 2008 external academic results were well above the national average with the Level 2 results being outstanding. Our junior school results are a mixed bag although the level of grounding is sufficient to keep our NCEA results at a high level, we have still not found the answer to getting a higher level of engagement for a number of our students at Years 9 and 10. Year 7 and 8 continues to progress well.

On the sporting front the college has continued with high levels of participation in all the inter-house and inter-class activities. These competitions add heart and spirit to the College. Our students have continued to achieve highly in Northland competitions and our elite athletes are competing at the highest national and international levels.

The cultural heart of the College is enjoying its new found base in the Performing Arts area. It is definitely not the most quiet place in the school but a place with ample vibes of busy and creative endeavour. The levels of participation have increased and most notably there was an increase in the number of boys participating in the last Music night. The Year 7 and 8 Production was a great success along with the Te Tuinga concert.

Our Kapahaka Roopu has continued to perform throughout the year under the tutelage of Hemi Tahī Peni and our Maori teachers. Manu Tu day was a great success and our bilingual class at Year 7 and 8 is a corner stone of things Maori in the college.

There are a large number of leadership opportunities in our college. Our students are reaping the benefits of taking on these rolls and making a difference to others. The number of students being recognised in our special awards is impressive as is the list of activities they have been involved in.

Our students are very good at getting involved with good causes. Things such as Collections, Whacky Hair Day, Daffodil Day, Surf Club, St Johns and the Fire Service all feature as activities that our students willingly participate in. It is pleasing to see the current generation being so willing to give back and support others.

The major part of our building programme is complete until our new funding arrives in the 2012. We have spent \$1,105,499 of our 5 year property maintenance budget of \$1,227,974 along with another \$1,400,000 on the Performing Arts Block behind us. The College buildings are looking good and the new block is living up to expectations. We still need to purchase stage curtains and upgrade the stage lighting system to complete all areas of the Performing Arts Block to 'state of the art'. We are currently working a shade for the external courtyard. This should be completed by the start of 2010.

The college's financial position is sound. This has been helped by the way in which we are running our local Transport Network where we provide a better service than a Ministry funded setup at a much better price. We are currently considering purchasing a new transit van for the college on top of the usual capital purchases.

Having good enthusiastic staff is essential to the effective learning of our students. The college continues to attract well qualified staff who are enthusiastic and committed to our students success. 2009 sees a number of our staff leaving or taking refreshment leave. We have appointed a new HOD English, a new Year 7 and 8 teacher and are in the process of advertising or appointing for other positions. We wish to acknowledge the contributions of all of our staff especially those who are leaving us. I would like to publically acknowledge staff who are leaving permanently for there service: Mr Ian Duffield in excess of 20 years at BBC, Mrs Margo Wakelin 11 years service and Mrs Pengelly 3 years as HoD English, Hemi Tahī Peni and Ellen Turanga Community Liaison and Kapahaka.

The 2010 year is shaping up well. A key word for staff will be providing a high level of service by consistency of practice. As a school we will take a very good look at all we say and do and ensure that all staff have the training and support to make this happen. We are fortunate that the Board has agreed to the employment of a Project DP for the 2010 year to assist with this. We expect to complete up to three years progress in one year as a result of this extra resource.

Thank you to the board for continuing to provide the direction for the College, to the staff for all of your work and for inspiring our students to be successful and to the parents for involving yourselves in your student's education. Lastly I wish to thank the students for being willing to participate fully in all that is offered at their college and through their actions making Bream Bay College what it is today.

Together as a community Bream Bay College will continue to go from strength to strength.

Board of Trustees Chairperson Report 2009

Today we celebrate the many achievements of Bream Bay College for this year. Naturally, these achievements centre around two groups of people. Firstly, our senior students, secondly, our staff who have been behind the success of the students. The success of one mirrors the other. Last year's NCEA results had Bream Bay College ranking in the top three in Northland, putting us in the top 25% of all state schools in New Zealand. This is an enormous achievement for a rural school like ours and we are expecting similar results this year. The Board acknowledges that this level of achievement brings pressure on staff and to improve and sustain it over time will take enormous commitment. Bream Bay College by vision and policy is an all round school where we seek to excel academically, in the sports arena, socially and culturally. Our aim is to educate students who when they leave this sheltered environment will be equipped to make it in a competitive and often unforgiving world. As you listen to the accolades given to our senior students, celebrate with us.

This year has seen the completion of the new Performing Arts Block. We have also undertaken a number of classroom refits. ICT has been a major initiative this year with every classroom fitted out with computers and data projectors, adding to the capacity of the computer suite completed last year. We have also replaced laptops for all the teachers.

Financially the College is in a sound position. Last year we carried forward a working capital deficit of about \$30,000. The forecast for this year is a surplus in excess of \$50,000. This has been helped by the way in which we are running our local transport network where we provide a better service than a Ministry-funded setup at a much better price. The network operates with a cash surplus that is distributed among the contributing schools, Waipu, Ruakaka and One Tree Point Primary Schools, and us. This enables us to fund a number of extras. Currently we are considering purchasing a new transit van for the College on top of the usual capital purchases.

Being a Board member can be a very satisfying role. It has been for me personally. This is my ninth Chairperson's report at Bream Bay College following on from eight years as Chairperson at Waipu Primary. As a Board member, you are able to influence collectively the direction and tone of the school through the policies and procedures that the Board develops. You learn a new language called 'educationese'. You learn the difference between governance and management. As a Board, you have a vision of a school that runs perfectly where there are no issues. You find that a College like ours is a clearinghouse for many of the social issues of the community. You learn about the pastoral care of students and staff. You learn that very little is black and white, issues are always complex. You learn that with this Board our policy is to keep students at school unless every intervention and avenue of support has been exhausted and the Board has to make the always heart wrenching decision to exclude a student because we can do no more as a College.

Our exclusion rate is about the lowest in New Zealand. I am proud of the fact that Bream Bay College was an early adopter of Restorative Justice practices and the first to engage with the Rubicon project to assist students found to be taking drugs. The old method of dealing with drugs in the College was to exclude almost automatically. Now, with the cooperation of students, caregivers, the College and Police we seek to deal with this social problem and set the students free to learn and succeed. The thing that sets a good Board aside from the rest is to have student's education at the centre, staff welfare at the centre, and being able to manage through senior management who are committed to the cause the incidents in people's lives that roll on week by week.

I would like to pay tribute to our Principal Wayne Buckland who continues to drive and challenge us. Our Deputy Principals Mark Bayer, Eric Hansen and Rose Nathan who did an excellent job in taking their opportunity to be acting Principal while Wayne was on sabbatical earlier in the year. The Board has great confidence in your abilities.

To my Board, Stuart Abercrombie (vice-chairperson), Glenice Andrews, Dave Cullen, Lee Chase, Mick Gadd, Bowen and Rose Milner all community elected or Board appointed trustees, Rose Waerea the Staff Trustee, Emma Carran the Student Trustee, Wayne Buckland (Principal), Beverley Webb our Secretary and Annmarie Woods our Financial Officer, a big thank you for your commitment this year.

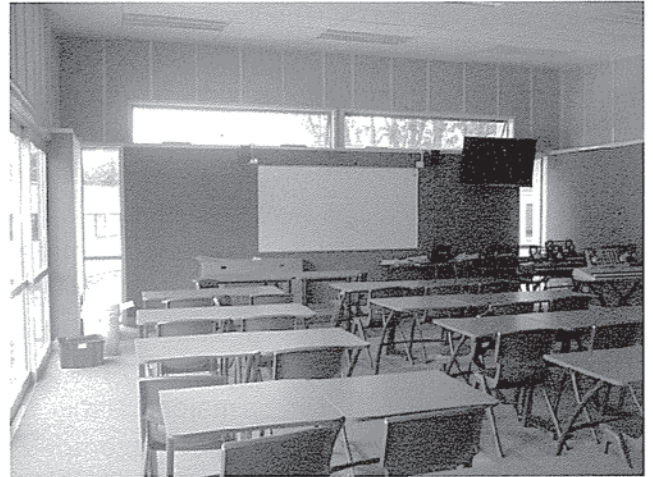
At our November meeting, we welcomed Demi Mitchell as the new Student Trustee for the next year.

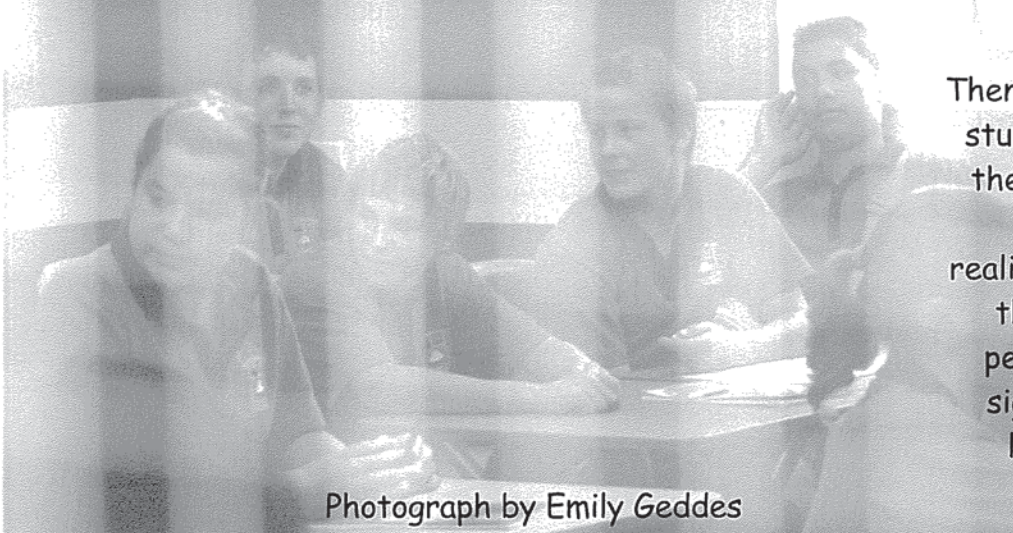
Mrs Algie sat in her squishy chair at the front of the class, scrutinising each student before commanding them to write their name, classroom, form and the date on the back of the paper.

I became a stream.

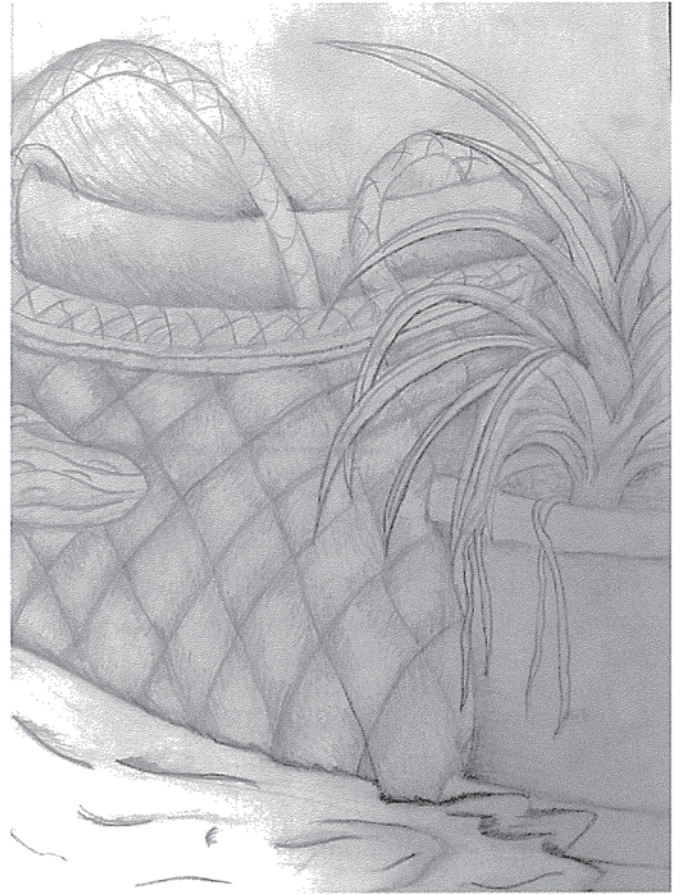

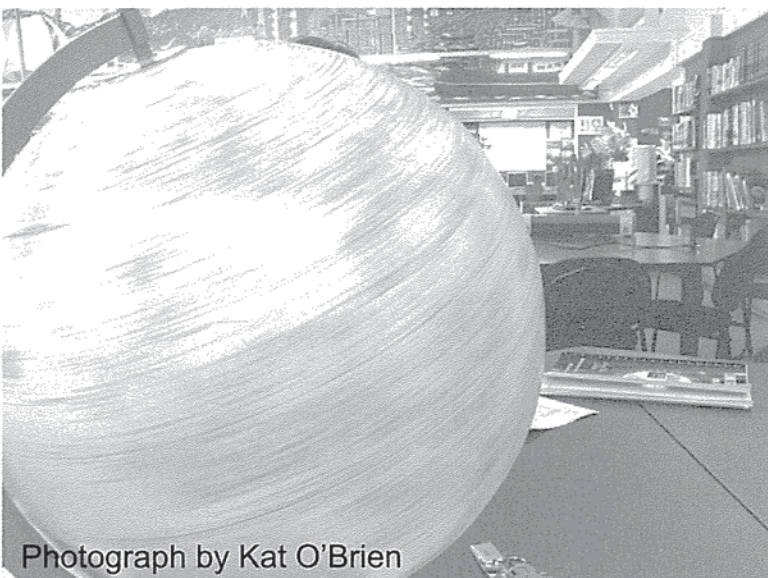

and it is as shiny as a freshly polished car.

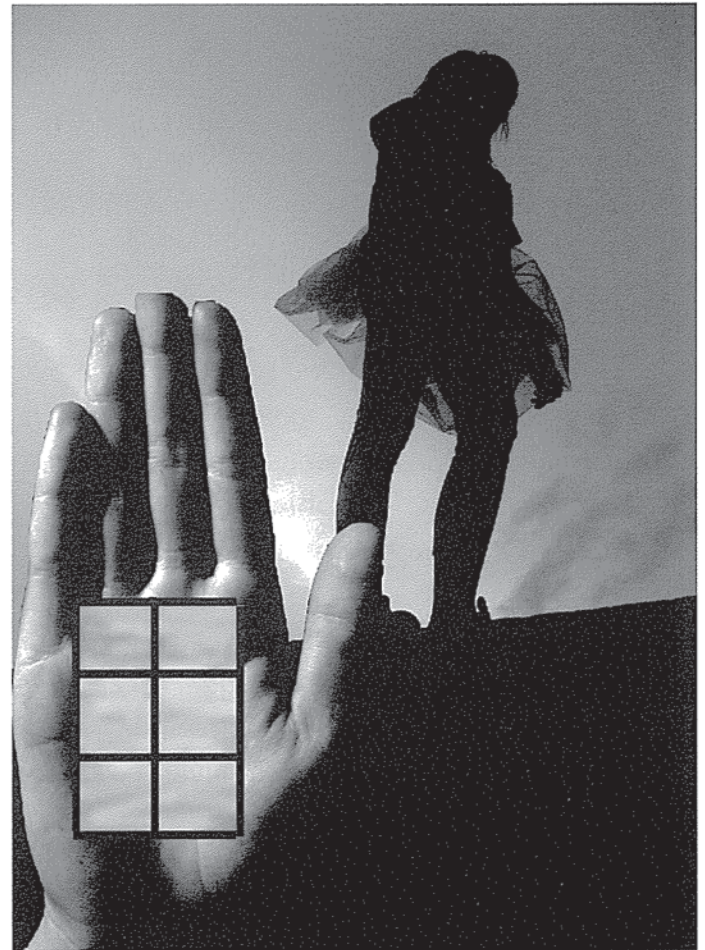
The path ahead of me lies

up and down the hills.

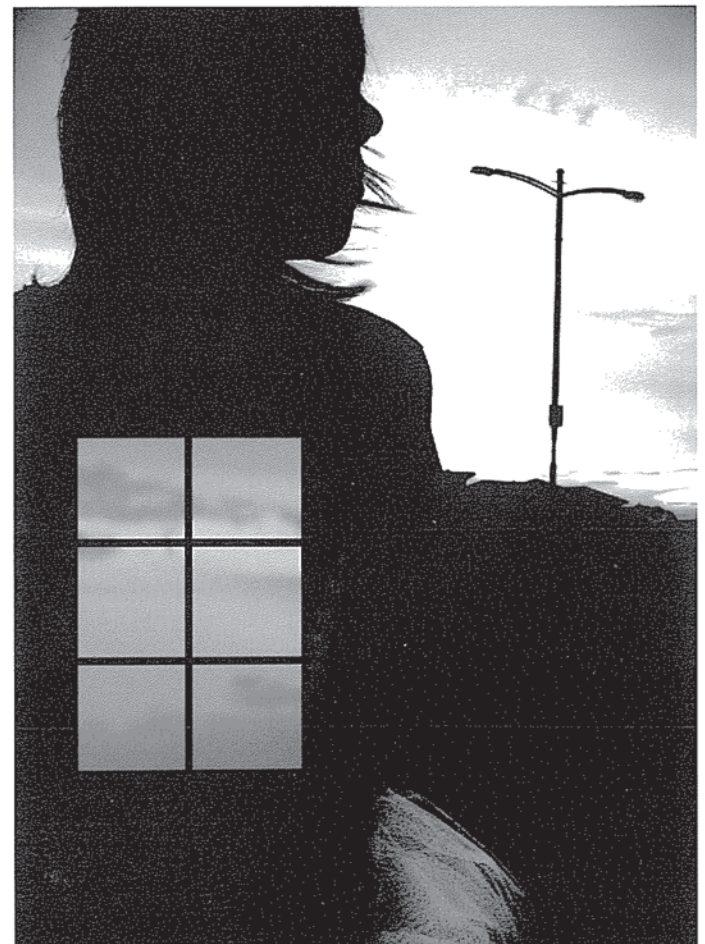
I've had plenty of spills and I'll have plenty

completely in control of the wheels.

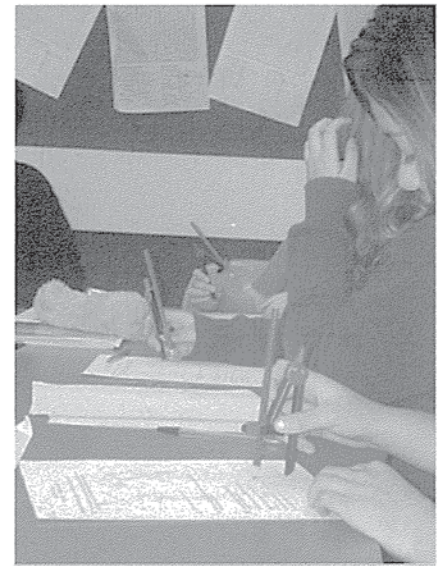
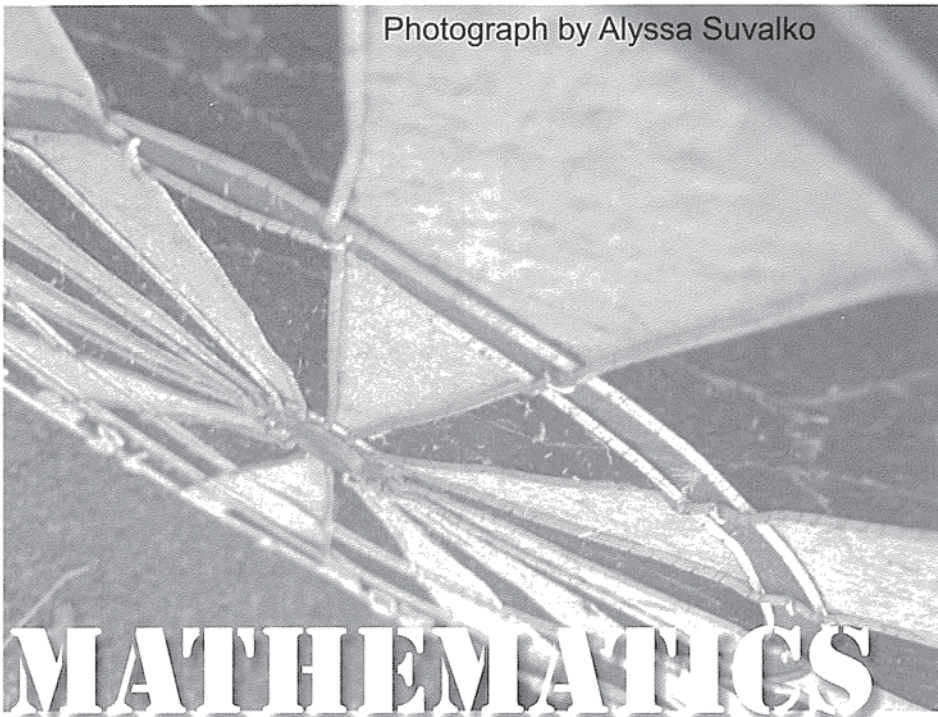

Year 12 Biology - American Miniature Mediterranean Donkeys

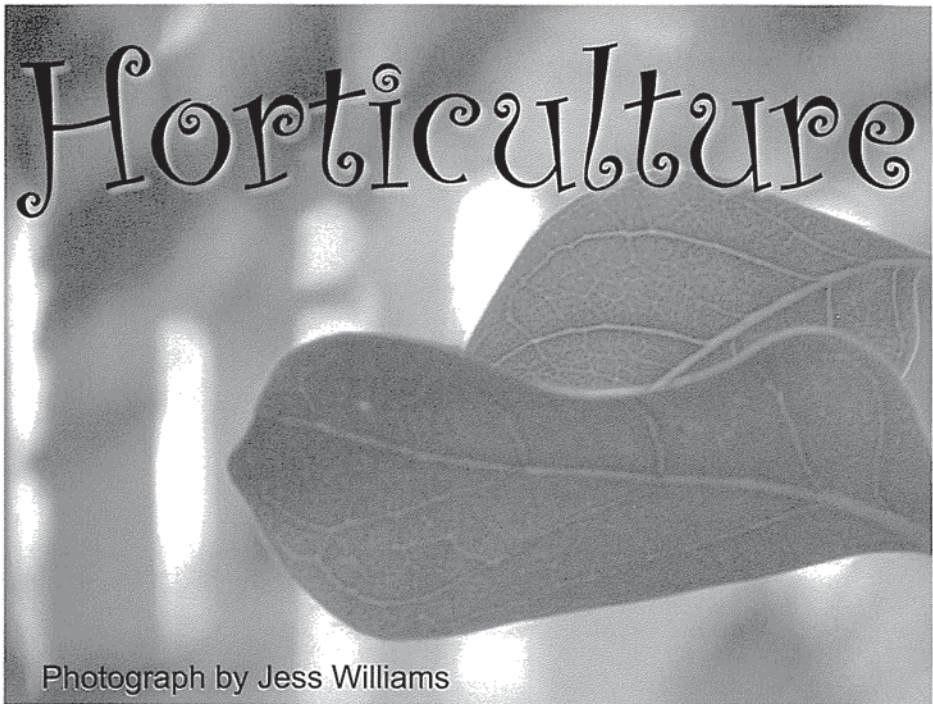
In August, the year 12 Biology class went on a field trip to visit two American Miniature Mediterranean donkeys at Maungatapere, named Trios and Tiffany. They are locally owned and exclusive to Northland.

Going to see the donkeys was beneficial to our class as we learnt that these miniature donkeys are not true genetically dwarfed animals. They originate from Sicily and Sardinia which are small islands in the Mediterranean. Biologists say that these donkeys naturally shrunk in size due to their genetics being isolated from other donkeys. Being smaller in size was a benefit as their access to food was limited. The 'survival of the fittest' is a concept that we have been learning in class which is relevant to how this species of donkey evolved.
