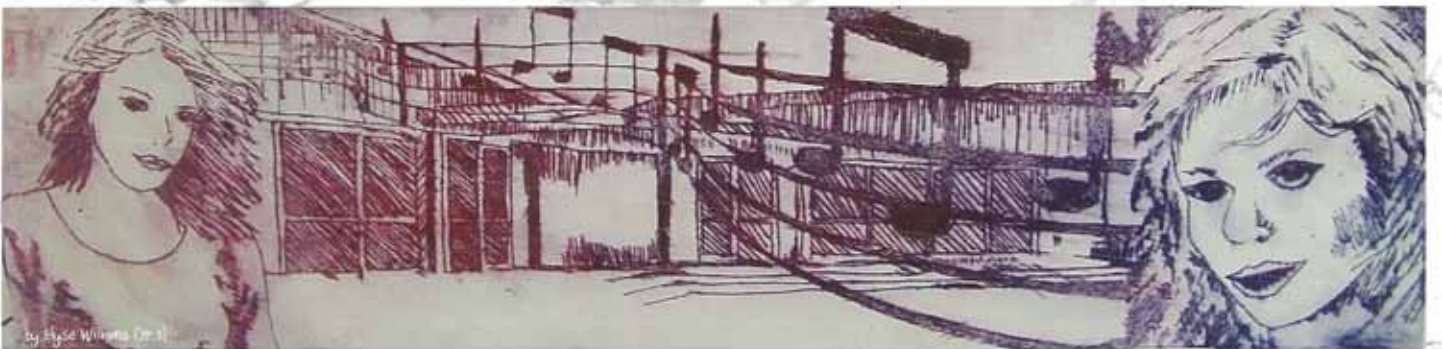

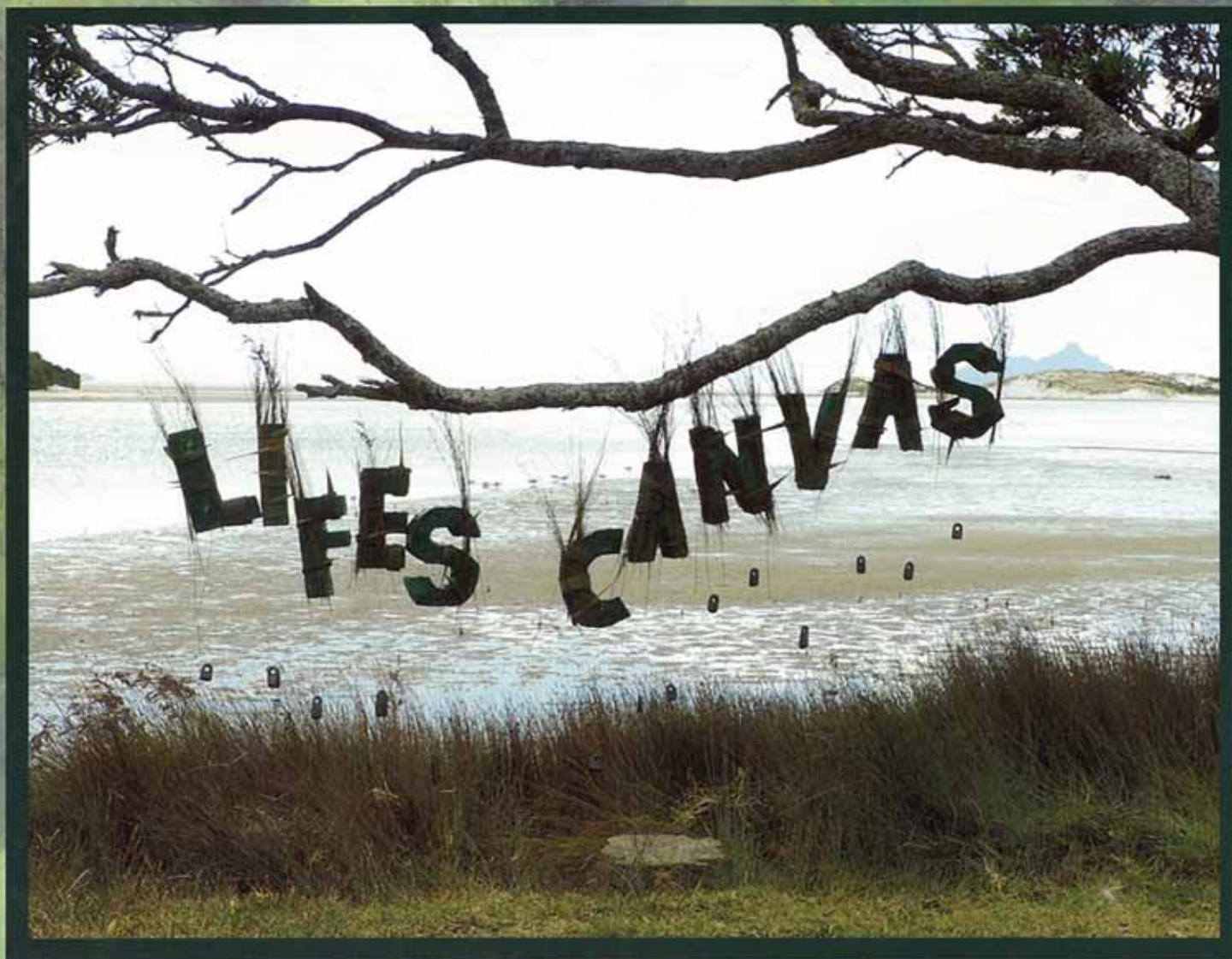

Principal's Report

He mihi nui kia koutou katoa.

The college is in good shape and good heart. It has continued to make progress in all areas. Today you are witness to the multitude of successes that our students have achieved. They are a great bunch of young men and women. We are proud to call them Bream Bay College students and we are sure that they wear this badge with pride wherever their future takes them.



Participation levels in sport in college remain high. We achieved 4 nominations in the ASB sports awards and were successful in winning the code area in Karate (Nicky Roberts) and Nicky won the top prize of "Sports Woman" of the year. The interhouse competition is becoming more intense each year and the differences between the houses less and less. The Haka competition sent chills down your spine while the atmosphere was electric in the new Quiz format.

A corner stone of the college is the Whanau system. Our students refer to their other Whanau members as their Whanau brothers and sisters. Whanau teachers are integral parts of making sure that all students achieve to their potential. For 2011 we are changing the way we do things in the college to ensure that the Whanau teacher has all the information on a child. Each DP will take on an oversight role of a House and the existing deans will now work from year 7 to 13 in Houses rather than by year level. Students will now have the same Whanau teacher, Dean or DP as reference points throughout their schooling. We are looking to see an improved transition for our students through the school especially in the year 9 and 10 areas.

Our kapa haka roopu continues to be in good heart and performed with distinction at the Tai Tokerau festival. The bilingual class continues to provide an opportunity for an education at the college in a culturally appropriate context. We are still endeavouring to get the government to recognise Bilingual Education at years 9 and 10 in the same ways as at years 7 and 8 so that we may extend this opportunity for our Maori students.

The academic results of 2009 put the college significantly above the national average in all NCEA levels. NCEA level 2 is the recognised minimum. It is heartening to know that our pass rate was 82% and that our Maori pass rate was over 75% while the national average was 67%. In 2008 we were the top performing decile 4 school in New Zealand in NCEA level 2. We estimate from the data that we are in the top 10 to 15% of schools academically. Our results in 2009 are similar to the results in 2008 so we surmise that our position is the same or very similar. Our Maori students' performance is well above the national average for all students and over 20% ahead of the national average for Maori. We expect to continue to improve our academic performance.

I am pleased to report that the college continues to attract high quality staff and that our students are reaping the benefits. Our quality staff have a wide range of teaching styles that cater for the different styles preferred by our students. Our teachers and support staff all consistently go the extra mile for their students and are committed to each of them achieving. The school exists for the students but without such a dedicated, enthusiastic and committed bunch of professionals the students results would not be well above the national averages. I wish to thank all off the colleges' staff for their efforts and I am sure that they are enjoying the achievements we are celebrating today that they helped make possible for our students. Being at the forefront in the way you provide education has its challenges; one of which is up skilling new staff and keeping existing staff up to date. With this in mind we have set up a new specialist deputy principal portfolio area focused on staff induction, on-going training and Professional Development. We will report back on the progress in 2012.

Staffing always has its challenges. This year has seemed to have had more than its share with the passing away of Ginny Gardner and a number of personal health issues for staff. Ginny's legacy is huge and we were privileged to have been able to acknowledge it here publically this year with her present by renaming the Student Welfare building to the Reid Gardner Student Welfare building before she passed away due to cancer. Our new staff have all hit the ground running and have taken up the slack. I am pleased to report that we have been able to retain our new staff by moving many of them from long term relieving positions to permanent positions.

The College continues to be at the forefront of integrating ICT into Learning and Student Management. Our rooms are well resourced, all our teachers have laptops, students and parents can access their own information in the same way that Deans do. For 2011 we will look to liven up the system of texting for absences. The College's School Management system can be made to send texts to parents when a student misses classes or is late to school. Currently our broadband connection is struggling to cope with the needs of the college. We are trying to find a solution to lack of band width for our internet. Unfortunately we look to be well down the list of benefactors on the Government's fibre roll out over the next 5 years. In 2011 we will allow students to bring their own devices into the College for using the Internet. They will still have the College's filtering but students will not have to wait to access a computer.

The Performance areas of the college have been further invigorated by the recently opened Performing Arts area. Many parents commented at the consistently high standards of our performers at the Music nights, SmokefreeRockquest, Te Tuinga concert, and the Stage Challenge competition. Notably this year we managed 3rd place in the Stage Challenge competition beating Whangarei Girls High School who always put on an excellent performance.

Many would have forgotten that Bream Bay College was an original pilot of the Health Promoting Schools programme (HPS). So ingrained in the college is HPS that it runs without hype or fanfare but influences all that goes on. Our team of students, teachers and Health professionals meet once a month and ensure that the needs of our students are identified and addressed. We appreciate all of our outside provider's assistance and we know we could not achieve what we do with our students without their help.

2010 has been a quiet one on the buildings scene for the college. We started down the track of planning a new classroom block only to be told that the Ministry had made a mistake on their buildings tracking system. Continued role growth has been forecast and it is only a matter of time before we start this process again in earnest. This year we have completed the shade for the Performing Arts area and have added lights funded by the board with contributions of \$3000 from the PTA and \$3000 from the Hockey club on the turf and asphalt areas beside the gym to allow practices in the evenings in the Winter terms. Our new caretaker has been given the green light to break his budgets to address the many areas he saw as needing attention and as a result we are looking better and better daily.

Financially the College is in a very good position. We have been very careful to spend the money we have been given in a way that ensures the maximum gain for our students. The contribution of the current surpluses from the way we run the Bream Bay Transport Network has made this possible. Our innovative approach to running the Transport Network ensures that we provide a better service to our community than we would get under a Ministry of Education run model while producing a surplus. This contribution will tail off in the next 4 years but it has allowed us to get ahead.

Lastly I wish to acknowledge the parents of our community who have put their hands up and become members of the Board of Trustees. Each and every member has contributed to the successes of the college by ensuring all that what we do leads to higher academic achievement. As with the staff of the school when as principal I find a way to indulge each of their passions not only do they continue to do the basics well but they achieve things we never thought of as a bonus. The Board of Bream Bay College has allowed me to pursue areas of passion and interest with little restraint. This has been facilitated and checked on through the time and efforts of the Board chair Peter Dunn who has met with me every school week for 9 years and attended to the many board responsibilities that happen between meetings. His advice, guidance, willingness to tell us how it is, provision of feedback from the community, expertise and ability to raise the hard issues in a supportive way have allowed me with the staff of the college to do what we do best which is make learning fun and ensure all achieve in a progressive way. The college and Community owe Peter and the Board members a debt of gratitude for all they have done.

To conclude on behalf of all of the students, parents, teachers and support staff of the college I wish all of our seniors well in their exams. We look forward to sharing in your achievements just as we are sharing in your past achievements today.

Thank you to all of the staff, all of the students, parents and the Board of Bream Bay College for making it possible to stand here today with such a sense of pride in all that we have achieved.



Board of Trustees' Chairperson Report

It is my pleasure to present to the Bream Bay College Community this report from the Board of Trustees for 2010. This year has seen the triennial board elections come and go. As usual there was a lot of interest in standing for the seven community positions on the board. Two previous board members were elected, Glenice Andrews and myself. Five new members were elected. They are Chris Donald, Jenny Gibbs, Graham Hargreaves, Rick Stolwerk and Louise Wickham. Rose Waerea was re-elected as the staff trustee. Demi Mitchell served as the Student Trustee for 2010 with distinction, and in October Sam Ellis was elected as the Student Trustee for 2011. The new Board is coming up to speed with its governance responsibilities at secondary school level and I believe the College will be well led at this level for the next three years.

I would like to pay tribute to the previous board and the exiting members Stuart Abercrombie, Lee Chase, Dave Cullen and Mick Gadd. I have had a long involvement with Boards of Trustees and the present board is the seventh I have been a member of in the Bream Bay area. Board number six was a very good one that worked cohesively. It had vision and drive to continue the direction handed to it by previous boards to ensure that Bream Bay College becomes the first choice school of our community because it is a successful school academically, socially and culturally. Just as the board was being replaced we received a Ministry of Education report indicating that Bream Bay College was the top Decile 4 school in New Zealand at NCEA level 2 in 2008. There is a large lag in MOE reporting. The other NCEA levels are not far behind which places Bream Bay College in the top 15% of all state schools in the country. This is a very commendable result that the Principal will elaborate on in his speech.

Staying with NCEA level 2 result reporting, Bream Bay College has been one of fifteen Northland secondary schools participating in a project focused on raising Maori achievement. Raising Maori achievement has been a top priority of this College's boards in recent years. 40% of our students are Maori. Engaging Taitamariki in Learning (ETL) is funded by Te Puni Kokori and the Ministry of Social Development, a project of the Ngati Hine Health Trust. The context is ETL's analysis of Northland's 2006 results. 37% of Maori students gained NCEA level 2 compared with 62% of Pakeha students. In 2009 the achievement standard of Maori students attending Bream Bay College at NCEA level 2 was 71% compared with our general pass rate of 77%. This puts us right up there in Maori academic achievement with the target being a 75% pass rate. We are behind Taipa Area School who achieved an 85% pass rate, so we still have room for improvement.

Of course, the Board did not achieve these results, all they did was create the governance framework to allow this to happen along with the leadership of the Principal. All the credit has to go to our staff who are committed to educating our children. Our staff work hard. They face constant challenges through the pressures of curriculum delivery, the hours of preparation, student community and family issues that are always part of teaching. The challenge of students not engaging, the challenges of student discipline, the challenge of students having to balance academic and extra-curricular aspects of their education are all in the mix. But through all the challenges our staff have achieved to a high level, and I think it would be fair to say that the results of their students reflect their standing as a group in the NZ education system. Our staff stand shoulder to shoulder with, and in many cases ahead, of the big name schools. That is a cause for some celebration.

I have to report to you on the finances of the college. The finances are in a healthy position and for the 2010 school financial year that ends December 31 we will be carrying through a modest surplus. The audited accounts will be available early next year for anyone who wishes to see them. In 2011 the board will be busy. It will need to continue to come to terms with the systems of the school, complete the task of policy review, and at the same time set their direction for the next three years. A review of the strategic plan is on the agenda. ERO will be coming, and this time next year it will be working on the ramifications of the new 5 Year funding plan for buildings and maintenance that begins in 2012.

Finally, I have been Chairperson of now four Bream Bay College Boards over 9.5 years. I am a member of this board until the next triennial elections in 2013. But from my perspective it is time to step down as Chairperson and so at the February meeting of the board next year a new Chairperson will be elected. I have gained much from being in this position in terms of skills and friendships, the sense of collegiality that forms in the difficult times, and the sense of achievement when the board receives the outside analysis of the college's successes. I would like to thank Wayne Buckland for his education leadership of the school, and remembering always who is the boss in the school, the board. To past and present board members thank you. To the staff I have got to know over the years, a big thank you. As I say that I think of my children who have been students here, Judy, Benjamin, Alice and Tabitha, and of course Joshua who is still here. What this College has given them is priceless with each achieving in their chosen careers that makes their Dad proud. I remember daughter Alice commenting on a time when she was asked how she was coping at University with the study, freedoms and temptations. She said, "I went to Bream Bay and I'm OK".

IN MEMORY OF GINNY GARDNER

16TH NOVEMBER 1950 - 23RD JULY 2010



It is an honour to stand before you today as Principal of Bream Bay College and as a family friend to help farewell Virginia Gardner or as we often called her Gin, Ginny, Mrs G or one of the GEMs

Peter, Dirk, Melody, Lydia and whanau - all of our hearts go out to you. Your beautiful wife, mother, nana, daughter, sister, aunty, whaea, cousin, friend and our teacher will be missed dearly but remembered in all of our hearts and minds. She was a passionate Mother: She was so proud of you her children and her family and spoke of you often. Such was her capacity to mother that she has become like a mother figure to many of our students.

Ginny was a passionate and beloved teacher and an amazing colleague. To start to describe her requires words like energetic, vibrant, inspirational, creative, fun loving with time for everyone.

What a passionate hostess: You could be assured that if you visited the Gardner household for dinner that you would be treated to an amazing feed. Ginny loved cooking. Where ever there was food she was not far away. She helped cater for whole staff lunches and functions along with a number of our school balls. Her students remember the recipes she has taught them to this day.

Ginny's first association with the College was when it was Waipu District High School where she was a home economics teacher. Did you know that she can claim to have taught 3 generations of students in our area? It was while she worked at the District High School that she met her man, Peter Gardner.

After a period of teaching in Westland, having children and co-running a very successful business in Waipu called "L for Leather", Ginny returned to the College in 1990. She started by teaching Home Economics and then added clothing and textiles. She involved herself fully in the college and helped out with kapahaka.

In 1995 Ginny had a brush with cancer and had a kidney removed. She also lost her voice due to nodules which had to be surgically removed. They said it would affect her talking but nothing could hold our Ginny down.

In 1996 she declared to the Board that she had become restless and that if she was to remain at the College she wanted to take on a very particular job. She wanted to teach Health education as part of her home economics. She wanted to take on the role of Careers advisor, be the Counsellor, introduce Peer Sexuality Support educators, develop students work skills through work placements, introduce and oversee student councils, manage the Secondary Tertiary Alignment resource and learn and promote Maori culture.

The rest is history. Bream Bay College along with Whangarei Boys High School was a pilot school for the now nationally rolled out Health Promoting Schools initiative. The concepts of caring for our young in every way now pervades all aspects of the College. Her skills as a careers advisor are legendary as are the trips to Waikato and other universities that she took.

In 2001 I joined the College and as with all new staff my family and I were made to feel very welcome by Ginny and her family. It was a pleasure to be part of the appointment panel that appointed her to the position of assistant Principal in 2001. It was not a hard decision.

Ginny started her post graduate diploma in school management in 2002 and completed it in 2003. Ginny was appointed as a Deputy Principal in 2006 and became one of the GEMs.

I want to mention the areas that she worked in as they will all bring back special memories for those of you who worked with her. The health promoting schools team with its student reps and representatives from all the health fields, the implementation of the college's whanau system, becoming a restorative facilitator, overseeing the college's pastoral systems, careers advisor, Waikato uni trips, Sex Education classes, Mediator camps, Gateway overseer, Leadership camps, Japanese trip to Osaka, Kapahaka trip to Australia, Japanese home stays, Kapahaka and Student councils to name a few.

You may not be aware that such was Ginny's ability to care for others that she would turn up at home with a student who had lost their way and look after them with the help of Peter and the family. The longest stay by student was for 2 years.

Her creativity knew no limits, give her some cooking ingredients, some pieces of material, beads or any other craft and she produced amazing works of art.

Ginny was an inspiration and mentor to our new and young staff. She is responsible for some of our existing teachers going to training college and becoming teachers. They have many stories to tell.

In the end it was Ginny's love of children which connected her to all of us. To sum up their thoughts I want to read two quotes left for Ginny on her facebook tribute page. One is written by a current student and the other by an ex student:

"You were an angel in life, and now, even in death, you inspire us young to achieve and keep fighting that which is tough. So get on your wings young lady and fly, fly far away from here, to a place of peace and rest, because you ARE an angel and we love you dearly"

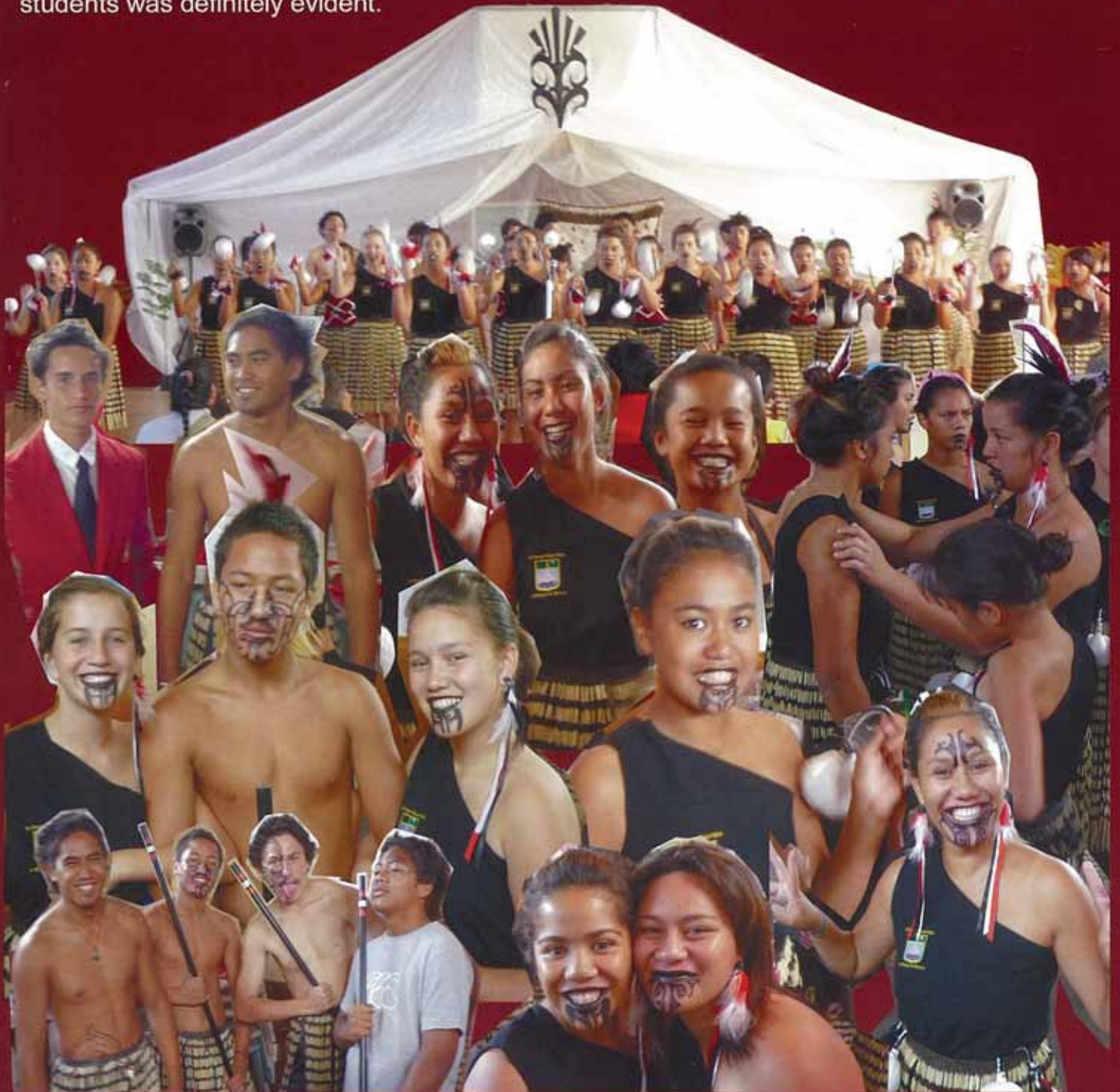

OPENING OF THE REID-GARDNER STUDENT WELFARE BUILDING

Our Board Chair, Rev Peter Dunn, was the MC and spoke of Ginny and Gloria's time at the college, while Demi Mitchell spoke on behalf of the students. In her address

Gloria spoke about why the name needed to be changed and Ginny replied eloquently as always. History was acknowledged and history was made.

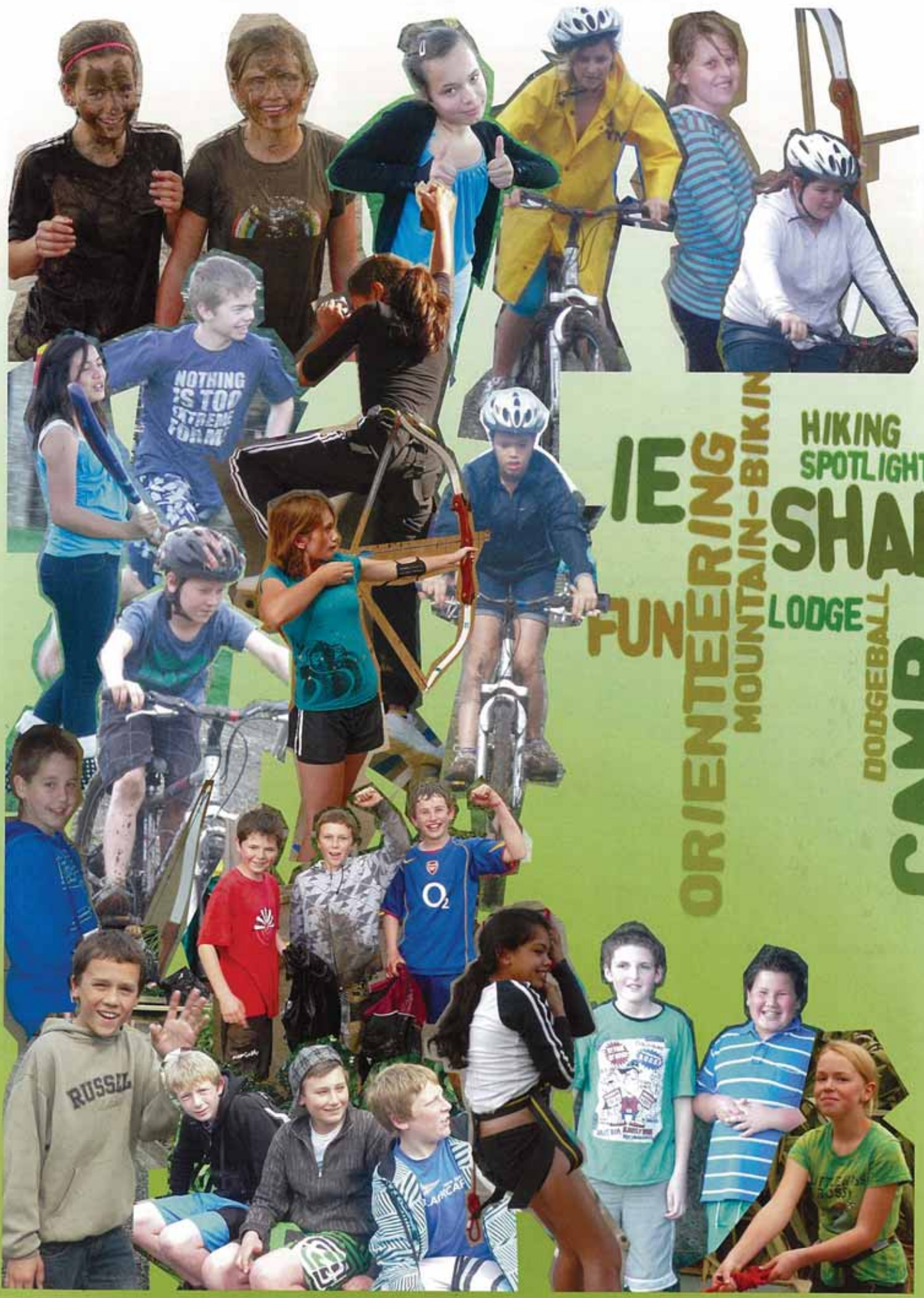



MUSIC NIGHT

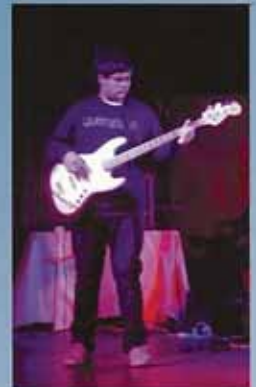

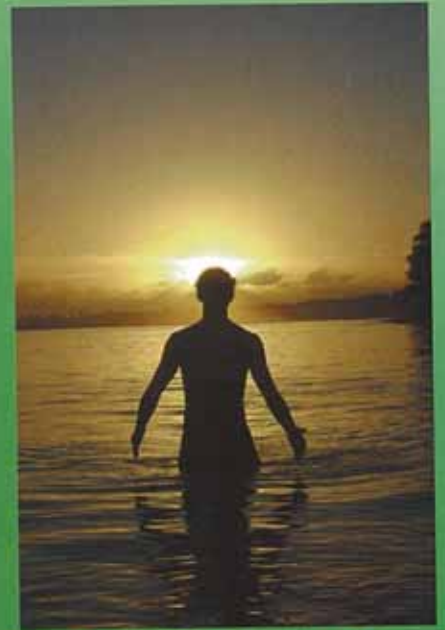
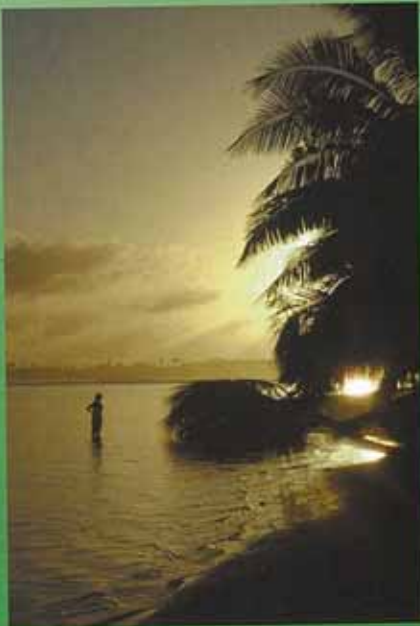
Our last day was spent in luxury at Aggie Grey's Resort, swimming up to the bar and ordering a drink, swimming, kayaking and pedal boats.

JUNIOR SCIENCE

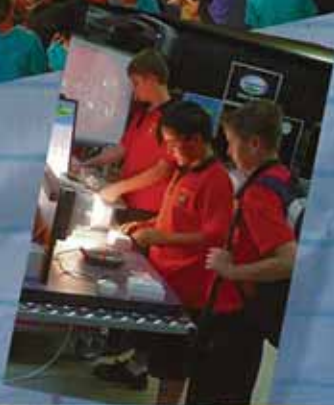

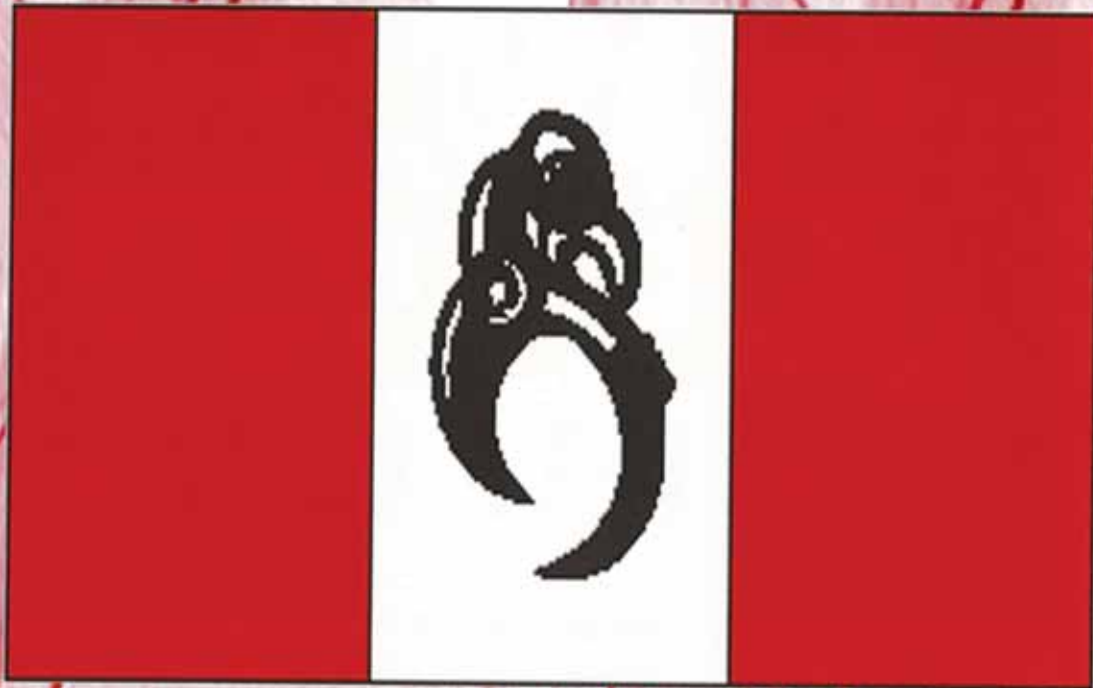
