PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



He mihi nui kia koutou katoa

It is a great pleasure to present my 10th Annual Report for Bream Bay College. 2011 has been another exciting year.

Academic

The College's NCEA results for 2010 were better than other decile 4 schools but were not above the national averages for all schools as in 2008 and 2009. We were disappointed about this and as a result we have kept a very close eye on academic achievement throughout 2011. There were a number of reasons for the lower results in 2010, such as the college not withdrawing all students who had left which affected our averages. On a high note, for 2010, our number of Merit diplomas at Level 1 and 2 were above national averages and our number of Excellence diplomas at Level 1 were above the national average also. You will be pleased to know that we are expecting very good NCEA results for 2011. Currently we have 6 NCEA Level 1 students who have gained their Excellence diplomas prior to sitting their external assessments.

2011 saw a major change in the way we do academic coaching bringing its focus to the student - Whanau teacher interface. To allow this to happen effectively we have enhanced all student analysis reports so that they predict results in real time as well as adding the summary data from all previous years to them.

Further enhancements for academic coaching for 2012 will be a trial of having the parents meet the teacher report day where parents make a single 20 minute appointment to see their son/daughters Whanau teacher. Each student would then give a 10 minute presentation on their progress to their parents and Whanau teacher and then there would be a 10 minute discussion on where to next. Other schools are reporting improved school/parent relationships as a result of this sort of parent teacher meeting.

For 2012 we will trial having our Year 13 students assist in a Year 9/10 class for 1 period per week for Terms 1 to 3. We expect that this will provide the Year 13 students with leadership and mentoring opportunities along with a chance to hone some curriculum skills while also helping the Year 9 and 10 students with their progress.

NCEA Level 1 has undergone a major overhaul in 2010. Our Heads of Departments and teachers are to be commended for their efforts with the introduction of the new NCEA standards and their continued work with the implementation of the New Zealand curriculum document. This overhaul will continue in 2012 with the implementation of new Level 2 standards.

At the other end of the school our Year 7 and 8 team has been working hard on implementing the National Standards. I am pleased with the progress for our students and the way the team have gone about the implementation.

Co-curricular

The students of the college have continued to participate fully in co-curricular activities. The inter-house competition has been hotly contested with unprecedented participation in the athletics and spirited competitions in all other events. We again had 4 nominations at the ASB sports awards and 2 category winners Abbie Palmer as a Year 9 student won her area, which is squash, and would have been close to taking out the overall award. Kelsey Power won the tennis award. The code of hockey has achieved highly in all of its competitions. The addition of 2 more cricket wickets, compliments of the cricket club, will lift the number of students playing cricket. The addition of the lights to the artificial turf has meant that teams can now practice after 5 in the winter.

Pastoral system

2011 saw the change to the pastoral system where the Deputy Principals were assigned houses. The move to vertical deans was deferred but will take place in 2012. The role of the Whanau teacher as the primary contact person for a student has been enhanced and will be enhanced further in 2012.

Staffing

The college continues to attract high quality teachers. Our staff go the extra mile for our students. At this stage we only have two staffing changes for 2012, HOD Mathematics and ICT.

Buildings

It has been a quiet time on the buildings front as expected. July 2011 to July 2012 is the last year of our Ministry of Education 5 year property agreement. We spent most of our 5 year property money in 2008/9. We are now in the process of setting out the development plans for the next 5 years. Replacing carpets, modernising toilets and modernising the last 4 classrooms will be initial projects. During 2011 the board has funded from its own reserves numerous drainage fixes, remedied heating issues in prefabs, the staffroom and the boardroom.

Grounds

Early in 2011 the college purchased its own tractor and mowing equipment and started taking care of the grounds totally. The PTA has also been very active with gardens and painting murals. The initial impression of the college has been improved. It is nice to be at a stage that most of the major renovation work has been completed and money can be targeted to more cosmetic areas.

ICT

The college continues to provide full access to computers for its students. The college's wireless system is ready for use by students. This will enable all students to connect an internet capable device to the school's network to assist with their learning. At this stage although ipad/iphone type devices look really exciting the mini laptops with almost all of the ipad functionality built in look like the cheapest (around \$400) and easiest option to use. We have not added a computing device to the stationary list but having one in 2012 will be an advantage. The last step in making all of this happen is to get internet over fibre for the college. We have been advised that we have been moved to the first phase of the fibre role out for schools but have not been told yet when this connection will happen. We will start promoting purchasing of computing devices once this has happened.

PTA

The PTA has decided to become more active again within the college. It has set its sights on the grounds and has completed over 100m of gardens and a new mural in the Library courtyard. Murals have also been organised for the Performing Arts block. The PTA has taken over the running of Tides Out - Bream Bay Fun Run as its major fundraising project. Their efforts have been appreciated by the students, teachers, board and the wider community.

Financial

The college entered the year in a healthy financial position with good reserves having been built up from money paid to the college through its running of the transport network. This has enabled the board to spend freely in areas that it may not have in the past. The college is expected to finish the year with a working capital exceeding \$100,000.

Board Changes

It has been a busy year for the Board of the college who have continued to work hard for the school. They have reviewed all policies, overseen the development taking place on the strategic plan, instigated two community evenings; 1) the Restorative evening and 2) the Strategic Plan consultation meeting as well as monitoring the college's performance in all areas. At the start of this year Peter Dunn, who has been Board of Trustees Chairperson for the last 10 years, stepped down from the position and Rick Stolwerk took over. Peter has been an integral part of the improvements that have taken place at the college during the last 10 years. As a little insight to the time Peter has put in, he has chaired over 100 board meetings and attended over 400 weekly meetings with me as the Principal.

Peter is moving to Southland in the New Year which may result in a possible Board by-election. Thank you Peter, personally, on behalf of the school and on behalf of the community.

ERO

The college had its triennial Education Review Office visit in week one of Term 4. The report is being written currently and will be released at the end of 2011. The visit went well. All of the good things seen in the last report were seen again by this ERO team. The work the staff is doing in implementing the NZ Curriculum was noted with our leading light areas being Technology, Art and the Year 7 and 8 department. Students were positive about being Bream Bay College students and Maori students thought it was cool to be Maori at Bream Bay College.

The high levels of achievement in 2008/9 were acknowledged and with the dip back to average in 2010 but with good levels of Merit and Excellence diplomas. The level of attainment in 2011 was acknowledged as being very good. Things that they encouraged us to pursue were the removal of the extension classes and moving to parent/teacher report meetings where parents come in to the college to meet the Whanau teacher only.

On the governance side the capability of our trustees was acknowledged. ERO recommended that we explore a different policy structure based around what an area should look like with accountability reporting on how we are achieving this to simplify things for the trustees. It is felt that a system, such as the one they proposed, would enhance the college's ability to continuously self-review itself. We are expecting to continue on a 3 year review cycle. The final report will not be published until late December or January 2012.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES' CHAIRPERSON REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present to you, the Bream Bay Community, my 1st Annual Report on behalf of the Board of Trustees for 2011.

2011 has been a fast and full on year for the Board and the College as a whole. When I take a pause and look back there has been so much that has happened, and so much that has been achieved, especially by the staff and the students here at the college.

I am pleased to report that our academic levels are above other decile 4 schools and our percentage of Merits and Excellences are above the National averages for Level one and two. Issues around the schools systems for the removal of standards for students who had left and students who had dropped standards have lowered our averages, however this has been a major focus for 2011 and we are expecting very good results similar to 2008 and 2009 at all NCEA levels.

You will have noticed the major change in the way we do academic coaching, bringing its focus to the student Whanau teacher interface and further enhancing reports to add predictions in real time as well as cross referencing to previous year's results. Our Principal's expertise in the running of PC Schools has made a lot of information about our children's progress very accessible and up to the minute.

As a Board we are currently in the last year of our Ministry of Education 5 year property agreement. So we will be focusing on the development plans for the college for the next 5 years. Areas identified so far are replacing carpets, the modernization of toilets and also the modernization of the last four classrooms. The board has funded from its own reserves numerous drainage fixes remedied heating issues in some of the prefabs, the staffroom and the boardroom.

Early in 2011 we also purchased our own tractor and mowing equipment so we could start taking care of the school grounds without the need for outside contractors. At this point I would like to acknowledge the fantastic work that the PTA and the schools Caretaker and Grounds man have done in improving the gardens and the overall appearance to the entry to the college and surrounding buildings. Having attractive well kept grounds, gardens and buildings is essential to enhance the feeling of pride we all have in the college. Thank you to all the people who helped design and plant the gardens.

It is a requirement for me to report on the Colleges finances. The College entered the year in a healthy financial position. The reserves having been built up from money paid to the College through its efficient running of the transport network, which in turn administers the school bus runs and contracts. The money we make from this Network Group assists with projects that we may have otherwise forgone. The college is expected to finish the year with working capital exceeding one hundred thousand dollars. The audited accounts will be available early next year for anyone who wishes to view them.

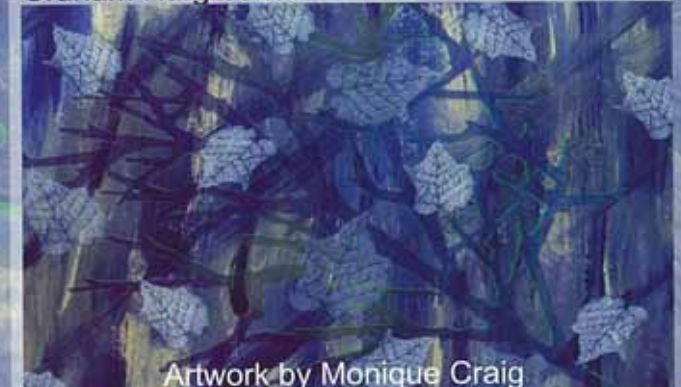

Finally to the students - I congratulate you all on your individual achievements that you have made this year, and I wish you every success for the future, whatever paths you wish to take.

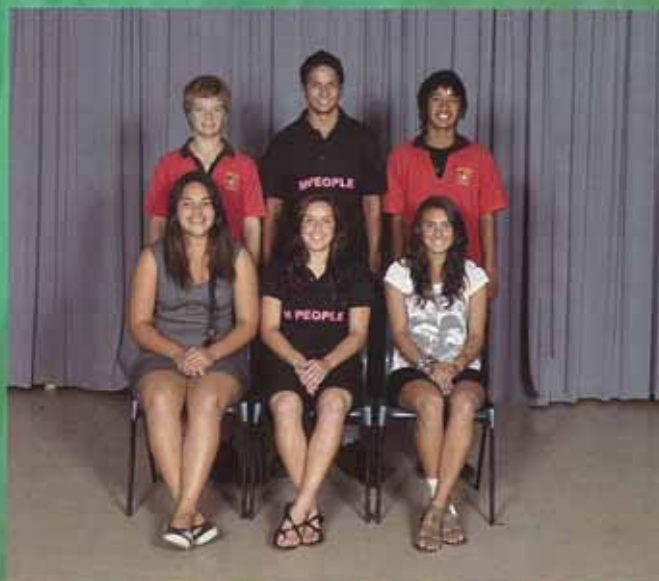

LEADERSHIP CAMP



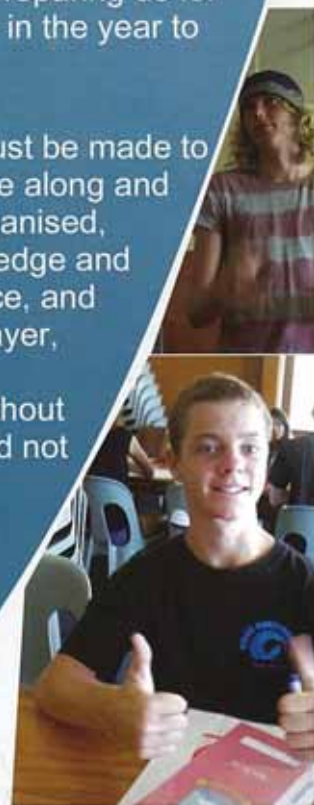

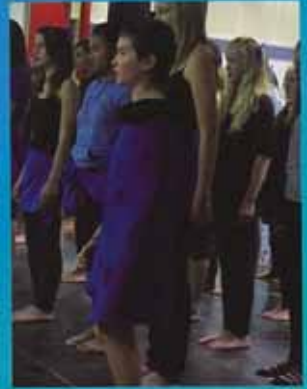


Haka COMPETITION

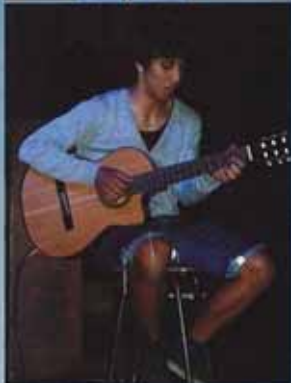

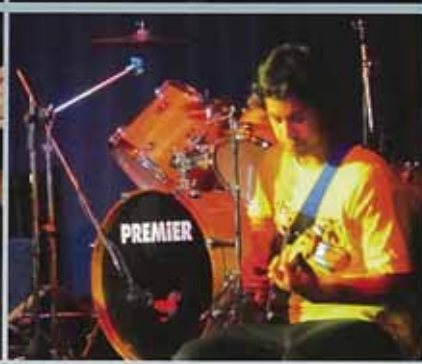

SKI TRIP

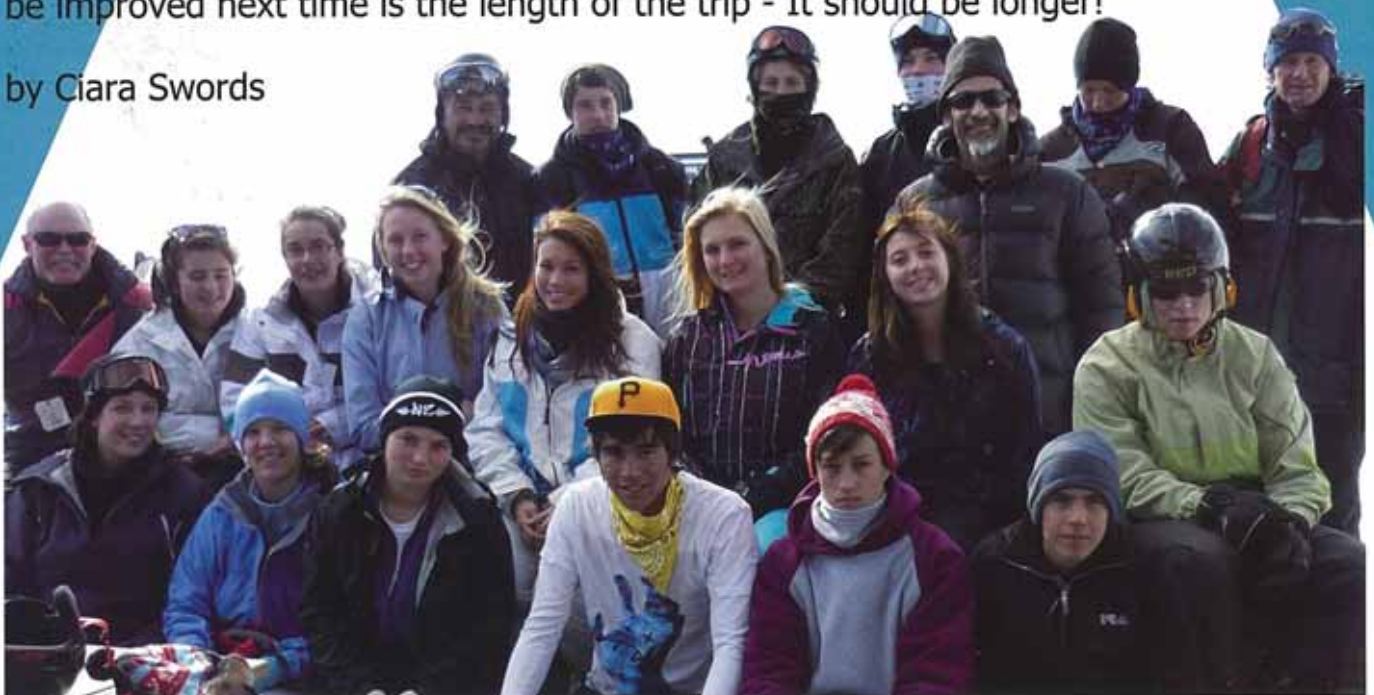

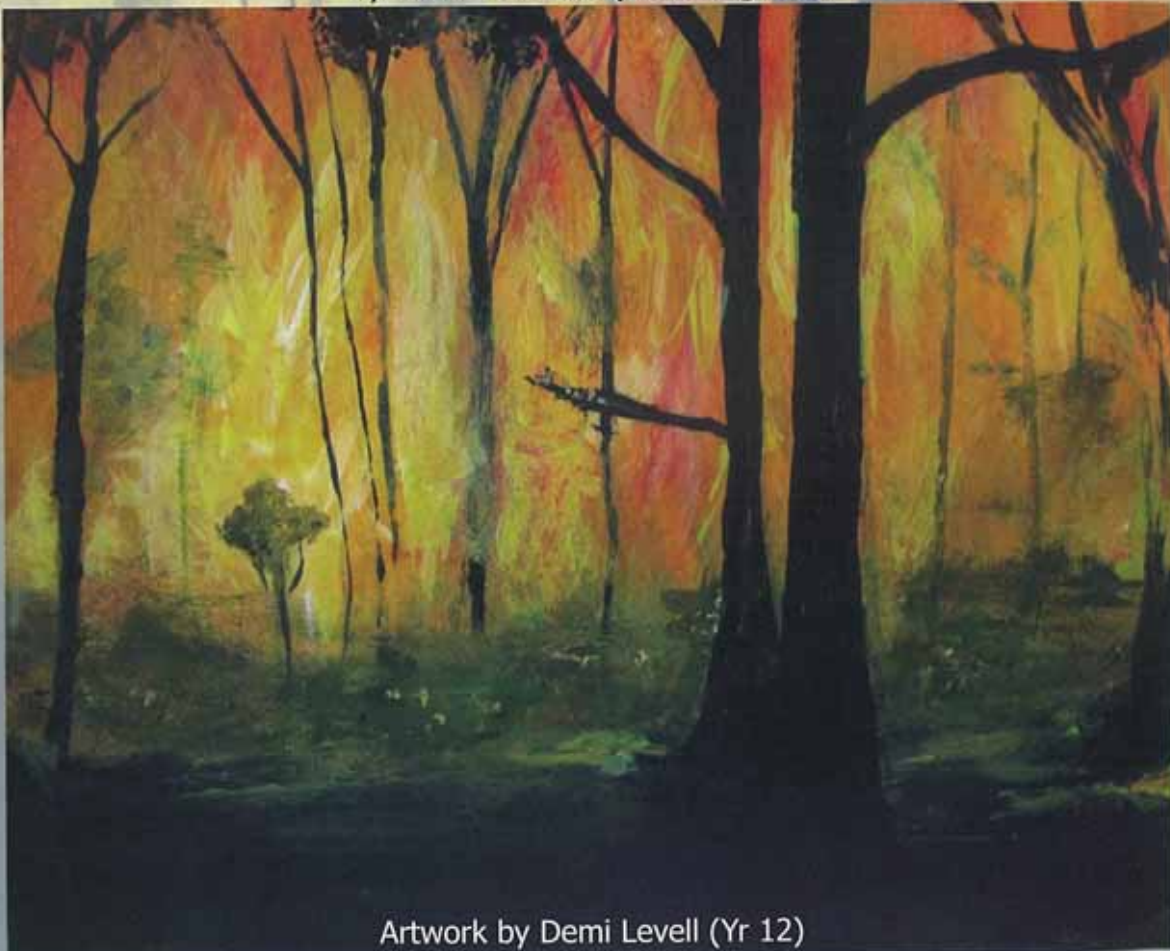

This made me sad...

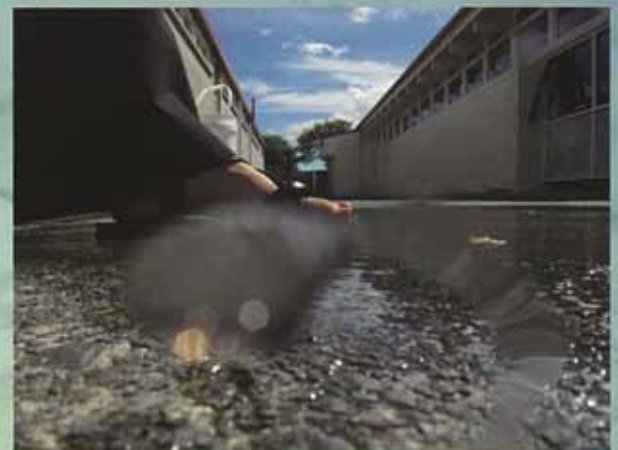
