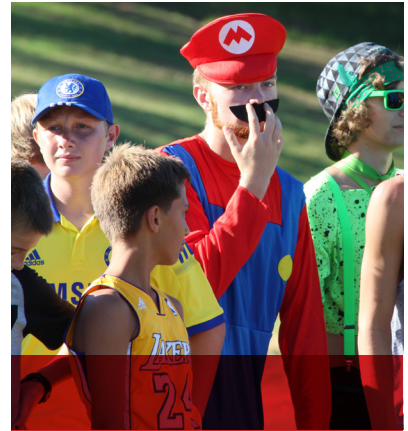

# PRINCIPAL REPORT



**T**ēnā Koutou katoa  
2015 has been another exciting year.  
**College Roll:** The College roll on the 1st of March was 459. The roll is expected to be similar for 2016. Our guaranteed minimum roll from the Ministry of Education is 445.

The College was happy with its NCEA results for 2014 with all averages being better than National averages. There were 17 Senior 100+ Club members and 46 Junior 100+ Club members in 2014. We are on track for 21 Senior 100+ Club members and 59 Junior 100+ Club members for 2015. We have a student who has attained an Auckland University Scholarship worth up to \$50,000 which is New Zealand's most sought after scholarship and this is our fourth award of these in 3 years.

What we know about learning and how we go about creating deep learning has been a 2015 focus. We have had staff trained in Feuerstein methods of creating new neural pathways which can be used to mitigate dyslexia, ADHD, and many other cognitive conditions. We have staff working on practices that accelerate learning to get students caught up with their year levels. We are learning new ways to create deep learning. Surface learning is simply described as learning that is retained for a short period such as long enough to sit a test while deep learning is described with words such as sticky learning or learning that lasts. Learning partners, co-construction, publishing and using the learning in an authentic context are all part of this. We have also reshaped what we will assess for the key competencies and how we will go about doing this. Lastly, all staff have been focused on how to use technology to enhance learning. All staff are now ready for us to make the transition over the holidays to being fully digital in 2016. A notable part of the technology journey this

year was the professional development given to staff by Dr Alec Couros from Canada, a world acclaimed expert on using digital technology to enhance learning.

## Co-curricular

We had 19 students travel to Japan and stay with our sister school Higashi Senior High School. This has created lifelong memories and introduced our students to a variety of cultures. Higashi Senior High School will visit us in 2016. We will also have an overseas trip to Samoa in the 2016 term 3 holidays.

The Inter-house competition has been strongly contested again this year. Congratulations to Inverness for taking out the competition for the second year in a row. We will add a new focus, student leadership, to these events in 2016. The College introduced trials to participate in the Stage Challenge competition this year. The resulting performance earned us a second place in the competition. The Senior Ball themed as Egyptian was a huge success with 170 students in attendance. Our kapa haka roopu performed with distinction at the Tai Tokerau festival and our Music night and Te Tuinga concert were high quality performance evenings. These events have been further enhanced by the X factor lighting rig we now have set up in the auditorium. We thank one of our board members Mr Garner for his help in this area.

The year 7 and 8 movie night in place of a show night is an example of where learning is heading. Not only did the students get to create scripts, create props, perform the acts, they got to record the acts and edit them to publication standard and then play them to an authentic audience – their whanau. Next time we will look to publish the acts online also.

The College socials have continued to have low attendance numbers. With this in mind we will reduce the number from 4 to 2 in 2016 and reduce them further in the future if the need is not there.

Congratulations to Abbie Palmer for winning the squash section of the ASB sports awards. Abbie has been the Sportswoman of the Year in the ASB awards in 2013 and 2014. This year Abbie medalled in the Youth Commonwealth games, silver in the woman's doubles and bronze in the mixed doubles, was placed 18th in the World Junior champs, is 6th in the NZ team, is in the top 20 in the



World Squash Federation Junior rankings and 157th in the World senior rankings. This is quite some achievement when there are more than 49,000 squash courts in 188 countries in the world and more than 20 million squash players worldwide.

### **Pastoral systems**

Our vertical DP, Dean, Whanau teacher and pastoral systems are now paying dividends. These are linking well with outside agencies and the relentless focus is on achievement based on goals set at the start of the year. We are now reviewing our systems with a view to how the identification on behaviours that need adjusting leads to changes for individual students. This is leading to discussions on how teachers can adjust practice in the classroom and intentionally teach these students new ways of interacting with the class. The revamped approach to the key competencies will help this also. The College's uniform was reviewed this year and we have replaced our jacket with an anorak and adjusted our sweatshirt. Students are reporting favourably on the change. It is expected that all of our students are in uniform all of the time.

We have changed our bell times to allow for a longer whanau time in the afternoon and one less class change in the morning. These changes are now allowing whanau teachers to do more with their whanau class and we expect to see more leadership opportunities come from this area in 2016. This change included a change to what happens before school where students can now get something from the shops if their parents desire this but they are expected not to linger and return to school as soon as they have what they need. The town centre is reporting very positive changes to our students' behaviour in and around their shops since this was put in place.

### **Staffing**

2015 has had its challenges on the staffing front. We have Ella Buckle, Emma Scobie and Victoria Foster off on maternity leave and Junie Shelford and Rose Nathan off on study leave. Added to this was my sabbatical for 10 weeks over terms 2 and 3. We welcomed Emma Howard and Fiona McGregor on as full time staff. Thank you to Katrina Hiki, Mel Dalglish, Sarah King, Lisa Williams, Paula Rogers Kiri, Kathy McCully and Anna Pascoe who have filled long term relieving positions and to Sarah-jane Kidd who retired mid year. A big thank you to all of the staff, who due to rearrangements, have filled in for other staff in Deans' roles, house DP role, Head of Science role and a DP role. A special thank you to Alison Dalglish (Acting Principal) and the Senior Management team for their work while I was away. A highlight for our school and for Tai Tokerau was Bream Bay College being able to run a day with Michael Fullan for all Northland secondary schools. We had 230 education professionals and teachers

from 22 schools attend. Michael is a world acclaimed education change expert. The day was very positive and left all schools firmly focused on firing up their engine rooms, the staff of their schools, in terms of collaboration for the good of all students in our region. As a Principal I can tell you that we have outstanding teaching staff, support staff, middle managers and senior managers who are both supportive and focused on improving the College. I thank them all for their hard work.

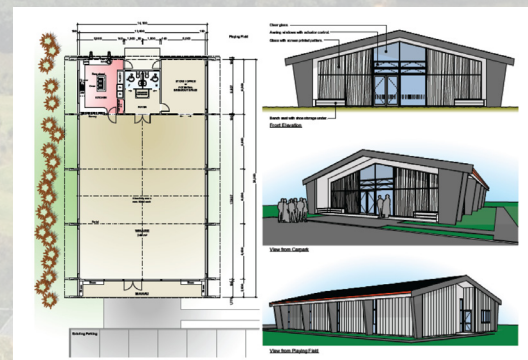
### **Buildings**

In 2014 we finished all of our Ministry of Education funded (\$825,607) building projects related to the 2012 to 2017 5YA (five year agreement) property cycle. We have had to replace our boiler this year as the old boiler was beginning to show signs of leaking. In 2014 we changed our Caretaker and Cleaners roles and we have been continuously improving our practices in relation to the buildings and grounds and cleaning since then.

Added to this we revised our painting schedule and we have been ensuring we do not use our painter for general maintenance. As a result we are able to add some "gloss" to the site which is being noticed by our visitors and students. The twice yearly cycle of chemical washing the school is also helping.

We committed in 2014 to an upgrade of almost all of our lighting under a process run by Torque IP. The cost of the project was \$62,784 and as a result of this we will save \$18,000 per year in electricity costs and this will make us \$28000 better off after 5 years and then \$90,000 per 5 years better off from then on. We are currently looking at whether a solar panel system, to eliminate our base usage of 20kW per hour, is viable to further reduce our ongoing electricity costs.

The Board has agreed to sell two of our school houses to fund this project. We are waiting on the sale proceeds to be freed up and then planning in earnest can start. At the October Board meeting the board agreed to sell two more of our school houses and the funds from these will be used to upgrade existing classrooms into Innovative Learning Environment rooms. This will allow the College to meet one of the new strategic goals that has been consulted on in 2015.

The furniture being used in our classrooms is also undergoing some upgrading. We put some Modern Learning Environment furniture into a Laboratory and the Fabrics



room at the start of the year and into P6 in term 3. We have added Ottomans to the corridors in HA block as a joint venture between the PTA, Student Council and the school. Further changes in classroom furniture will happen in term 4 and in 2016. The Board agreed to put \$10,000 in to outdoor fitness machines for 2015. We have costed exactly a 10 station track around the fields and a further 10 station weights area. We are seeking funding for another \$40,000 to do the whole job. Below is an example of a weights type area.



### **Going digital**

2015 has been a staff capacity building year where we have focused on learning new skills to use technology to enhance learning. We have honed our online collaboration techniques, websites, publishing, online workbooks, presentations skills, digital citizenship, and video editing skills to name but a few areas. We have purchased a site license for Camtasia and Snagit which is free to our students and parents to use for high quality screen casting. We now have Office 365 available for students and their families to download and use also. The end point of this work is to have all work available online in 2016 and technology being used seamlessly to enhance learning on a period by period basis. The most common question from parents is still what ICT device to buy. Any tablet, apple or android 4 or above, will do the job for students from year 7 to midway through year 10. Mid to late year 10 to year 13 a laptop becomes the better option for students. Students are adept at using any sort of device and can make very worthwhile use of phones, tablets or laptops all at the same time by taking advantage of their individual strengths. In most cases students just use whichever device is the closest. As a Principal I consistently use two laptops, a smart phone and a tablet and I would not like this selection reduced in any way. We will publish via email to parents further information on devices before the end of 2015. There are some exciting changes coming with computers with digital styluses that will make them a preferred type of purchase for older students.

### **PTA**

A big thank you to the PTA and to our caretaker who have worked on the grounds through working bees this year. The gardens are looking wonderful and the

tidying up of our boundaries by the removal of noxious trees is starting to look good also. The PTA's major fund raiser, the Tides Out Fun Run, was a tremendous community based event which was well supported by the community. The major focus of PTA meetings is getting to know about the college and the debates are lively.

### **Financial**

The Board agreed to a budget with a cash surplus of \$105,000 this year. We are on track to achieve this. Notable items in the capital purchase list is a school car which has already done 12000 km on school related business saving \$2,640 in travel expenses. We were also part of a consortium to resign a new photocopying contract with current supplier Xerox. These negotiated changes resulted in 3 new copiers, a 3d printer, worth \$6,000, and annual savings of \$15,000 per year. These savings will result in cheaper print credits in 2016. Savings achieved in 2015 have been used to fund going digital projects. We have maintained 2 Japanese students from Jin-ai Girls High School in Japan for 2015 and will have 2 more in 2016. We have re-established our relationship with a German agent and are looking to have a German student in 2016 also.

### **Board Changes**

The Board have had a busy year reviewing the College as part of its 3 year review cycle and revamping the strategic plan. Consultation on the strategic goals is nearly complete and we will produce our 2016 annual plan based on these. The College thanks its board members for all of their efforts and encourages any parents who may wish to be board members to consider putting their names forward for the 2016 elections.

### **Thanks**

The role of a Principal is both varied and exciting. It has been a pleasure working with staff, students and the community to help ensure that Bream Bay College is a top performing school. I would like to wish all of our senior students good luck in their exams (remember good luck is 80% prior work and 20% what happens on the day) and thank all of our Staff and Board for their efforts in making the College the place it is.

# BOARD OF TRUSTEES

**T**HE SCHOOL BOARD OF TRUSTEES' primary function is to Raise Student Achievement - all of the decisions that the Board makes, focus on that sole purpose. I'd like to talk about 3 things;

1. Student Achievement at BBC  
2. Progress on the Whare, and the  
3. Future direction of the school. **So first, let me begin with student achievement at BBC.** The student tracking system that we have here at BBC is second to none in NZ. It not only provides tracking information to each student and parents, but it is also a powerful tool for teachers, staff, and the Board. It allows us to identify areas where we are performing, and areas that require additional attention. It allows us to focus our resources to the areas with the greatest need.

One of the Ministry's National goals is that by 2017 85% of all students leave school with NCEA level 2 as a minimum qualification. Their data analysis clearly shows that students that leave school with at least NCEA level 2 earn higher incomes, and are less reliant on the state for handouts, than students that leave school with a lower qualification. Currently, only 77% of all school leavers in NZ have NCEA level 2 or higher. At BBC it is 80% of all school leavers. This is a statistic that we can be proud of. Our NCEA results are in the top half of all secondary schools in NZ, and in the top 20 - 30% of all schools with our socio economic environment - Decile 4. Our results are showing year on year improvements, and our student tracking system suggests that this year's results should continue that positive trend. We can be proud of that statistic too. So from an academic achievement perspective, this college is performing well, and we will continue to strive to raise student achievement to even higher levels in the future. Now of course academic achievement is only one part of a successful school, and today we celebrate student achievement also in the areas of culture, sports, leadership and citizenship. All of these facets are important to prepare our students for life beyond this school. **The second thing I'd like to talk about is the progress on our new Whare.** You may recall that the Board is in the process of selling two school houses, in order to raise the funds to build a new Whare at the front of our school. 40% of our students identify as Maori, and alongside our full immersion classes, Maori

culture is strong at BBC. The new Whare will be a central focus for Maori culture, and will provide a prestigious place for us to welcome visitors to our school. Our current Whare is at the rear of the school, behind the gymnasium, and it is in a very poor state. It is not worth relocating. We have held a number of community consultations on the Whare project, and we have developed some concept plans. The project is not progressing as fast as we would like however, as we are hamstrung by the bureaucratic process associated with the Ministry's house sale process. This is taking longer than planned, and this will push the Whare project well into next year. **The last topic I'd like to discuss is the future direction of the school.** Every few years the Board reviews the school's Strategic goals, to decide on the areas that the Board would like the school to focus on. The Board has developed new draft goals this year, and shared these with you to hear your feedback. We have received a lot of feedback already, and so far we have received overwhelming support for our goals. I'd like to summarise our five goals, they are; 1) To invest in school property and facilities that will allow all stakeholders to take pride in the school 2) To convert the school to Innovative Learning Environments, as funding becomes available 3) To have staff and students confidently use a range of technologies, to enhance learning. We want technology to improve student learning, and not for the sake of technology 4) To develop a school culture centred on respect, citizenship, and achievement, and 5) To promote the school as a positive learning environment Our last community consultation on these goals will be held on Friday. We will then finalise these goals, and they will then set the direction and priorities for the school for the next few years. You will notice that these goals are not significantly different to some of the focus areas that we are currently already working on. This is a reflection of the school's current performance - the school is performing well, and continues to improve year-on-year. The proposed Strategic goals will help to continue this positive trend. This year has been a very busy one for the school. As well as the normal day-to-day activities, school trips and cultural performances, there have been a number of other developments taking place. Like the bedding in of the school maintenance team (with our new caretaker and cleaning staff), the replacement of our boiler, and of course Mr. Buckland's 10 week sabbatical. That was where a number of staff were asked to step up to the plate to ensure the continued smooth running of the school in Mr. Buckland's absence. On that note, on behalf of the School Board, I would like to thank all staff for their hard work, and for the passion, enthusiasm and dedication that they bring to the school every day, to really make a difference to the achievement of each and every one of our students. And for those students that will leave this school at the end of this year to progress to the workforce or further education, I wish you all the best and trust that BBC has provided you with the skills to thrive in the big world outside these gates.

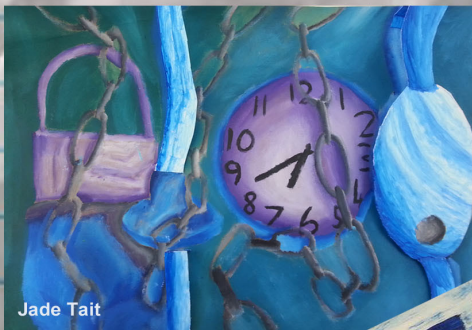
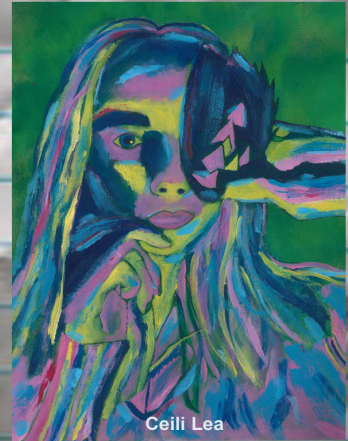
The group shopped up a storm in Singapore on the way back and the whole group came back subtly changed forever and some with itchy feet and wanderlust simmering.

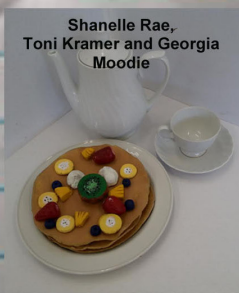

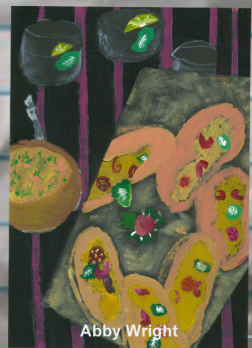

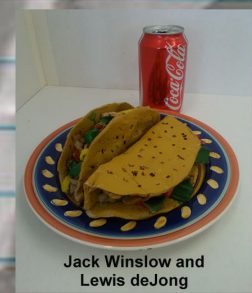

# symbolism and surrealism

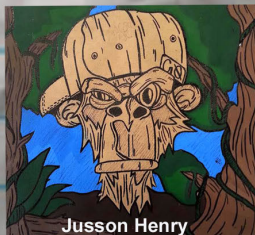

# BIOLOGY



## EVEL 2 BIOLOGY



Students started the year with a trip to Shelly Beach at Waipu Cove to investigate species interrelationships and patterns on the Rocky Shore. The weather was beautiful and the marine life didn't disappoint, with the discovery of 3 octopi in one rock pool. Level 2 students went on to study microscopic biology, and apply critical thinking to biological information they are exposed to. They also learnt about biological processes at the cellular level and how genes are expressed and impacted upon by the environment. A competition using playdough to recreate a cell and its organelles, saw some exceptional artistic ability and excellent knowledge of the inner workings of a cell.

## EVEL 3 BIOLOGY



Students started the year learning about biotechnology. This involved visiting the Liggins Institute at the University of Auckland Medical School, and carrying out DNA amplification and gel electrophoresis. They also got to meet current scientists working at the university and were able to ask them questions about their work. In the second half of the year students focused heavily on evolutionary process and recent human evolution. Students found the human evolution fascinating and were eager to discuss current discoveries happening in this field this year and the implications of these discoveries on our understanding of early human species. The Level 3 Biology students have achieved exceptionally high results as a class and half the class set their sights on sitting the Scholarship Biology Exam.

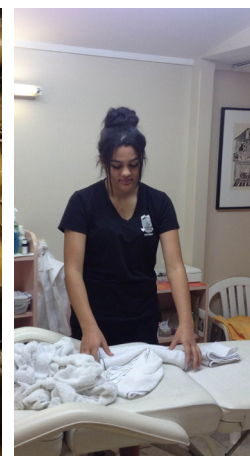
## 2 015 IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION

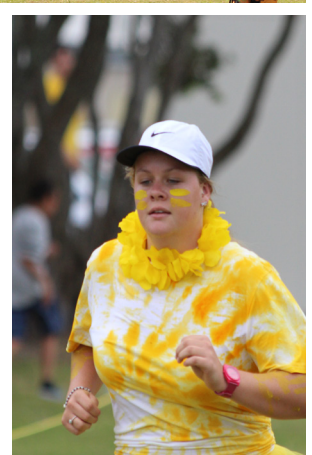
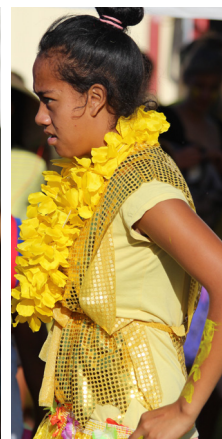
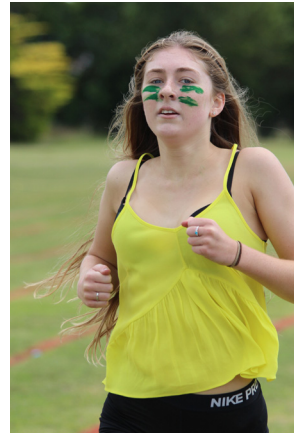
The Interhouse Competition may not have gone our way this year but we have competed enthusiastically and strongly in every event and achieved success in the Volleyball and Swimming competitions.
