# PRINCIPALS REPORT

**COLLEGE ROLL** The College roll on the 1st of March was 454. The roll for 2017 is expected to be in excess of 470 students. Our guaranteed minimum roll from the Ministry of Education for 2017 is 445. We changed the enrolment process for year 7 students from visits to local primary school to inviting parents and students into the college to enrol. This was well received and we will continue to do this from now on.

The College was happy with its NCEA results for 2015 with all averages being better than National averages. There were 17 Senior 100+ Club members and 46 Junior 100+ Club members in 2015. We are on track for 28 Senior 100+ Club members and 43 Junior 100+ Club members for 2016. Our year 13 students continue to be successful with Scholarship applications which this year include an Otago University Scholarship worth up to \$45,000, Keystone Scholarship \$20,000, Auckland University Scholarship \$10,000 and an AUT McDonalds Te Tai Tokerau Scholarship \$12,500.

Bream Bay College officially joined the NPDL (New Pedagogies for Deep Learning) Global group which is a global alliance of schools working

toward Deep Learning under the lead of internationally acclaimed education change expert Michael Fullan. Our first change was to swap to using the NPDL international learning competencies referred to as the 6C's. These are Citizenship, Character, Creativity, Communication, Collaboration, and Critical Thinking and Problem Solving in place of the New Zealand Curriculum Key Competencies. Year 7 and 8 have adjusted to the much more rigorous assessment of the 6Cs and improved overall but year 9 and 10 students have struggled with the increased expectations. The end result of the focus on the 6Cs will be students who are more self-directed in their learning and students who are more employable.

Alongside this we have continued our neuroscience journey with whole staff professional development on how the teenage brain works and a matching community evening. The work with Feuerstein methods continues but it is hard to draw concrete conclusions as when students start to feel more focused and in control of their learning they want to move back to their classes.

Leveraging digital is an integral part of NPDL and we are pleased with the transitions made this year towards using digital devices to enhance learning. The areas where we consider ourselves to be starting to make progress are around presenting learning and learning partners.

Lastly we are looking to improve our already impressive academic tracking to include specific tracking of the learning competencies and further analysis of existing results in terms of gains and drops that are automatically graded into categories such as neutral, down, concern, major concern, critical concern and up, pleasing increase, major increase, amazing increase. This will ensure that progress up and down is responded to in the appropriate way.

**Co-curricular** The college year continues to be packed with co-curricular activities and our students continue to excel at the highest levels. The Inter-house competition has been strongly contested again this year. Congratulations to Inverness for taking out the competition for the third year in a row. We continue the move towards more student voice in what is happening and greater levels of organisation and control by the students. Our Te Tuinga Concert with a drama thread weaving it all together was a tremendous success. The Music night showed off our quality performers. We had two students dance at the Military Tattoo in Wellington and the new music sensation the Panimals is growing in status and skill level. The Samoa trip ran successfully with 17 students gaining memories that will last a lifetime. Higashi Senior High School sent 14 students and two teachers to visit our school and we will return to Osaka Japan to visit in 2017.

Looking to the future the year 13 Leadership Camp for 2017 will move closer to home and we will have our year 9 and 10 students go out for a day each to work with our seniors. The year 9 and 10 programme will now include a camp and movies night every second year in line with the year 7 and 8 programme. And we will continue to increase student voice and organisational roles.

In 2017 we will host the 41st Tai Tokerau Festival. Organisation for this is well under way.

Special congratulations: To Alien Weaponry our thrash metal band made up of two of our students and one student from another school. They are the first band to win the Rockquest National & Pacifica Beats Awards in the same year and the youngest band to win either award. The 2016 Stage Challenge performance won the local competition with awards for choreography, drama, set design & function, environmental or social awareness, school initiative, stage crew, stage use, performance skill and concept. The performance also won the National Award for Drama.

**Pastoral systems** The DPs, Deans and Whanau teachers have been stepping up the work done with students who are identified as at risk. Attendance to all classes will be a focus area for 2017. This will be backed with a change in our systems that will prevent a student gaining credits at both Junior Diploma level and NCEA level if they have not attended more than 80% of the periods. We expect the individual analysis of the 6Cs to give our pastoral team better insights into what to do to assist students at risk and improve their learning competencies.

The change to the bell times to allow for a longer Whanau time in the afternoon, 30 minutes, and one less class change in the morning has been updated to two 5 minute session in the mornings and three 25 minute sessions in the afternoons. This is still in discussion for 2017 but student surveys now show better interactions between seniors and juniors.

We have had a major focus this year on respectful language. The first step was to sort out what was respectful language and this proved a little more difficult than expected. Having got a common understanding we are now moving towards eliminating language that is not respectful from the College. This will continue in 2017.

**Staffing** 2016 has been a relatively stable year for staffing. We have appointed a new HoD Maori - Milton Ross and a new Science teacher - Megan Stalman for 2017 and we are in the process of appointing a new HoD English and a new HoD Social Sciences. We have had a recent change in year 7 and 8 and will also appoint a new year 7/8 teacher.

As a Principal I can tell you that we have outstanding teaching staff, support staff, middle managers and senior managers who are both supportive and focused on improving the College. I thank them all for their hard work.

**Buildings** 2016 has been a relatively quiet year on the building front. We have refurbished the swimming pool seating, removed some gardens and reshaped some centre of the school areas, made adjustments to the mezzanine area in the gym and installed half of our outdoor exercise equipment. The balance of the equipment will be installed around the fields over Christmas when they are dryer and the concrete trucks will not make a mess. Importing this gear from China has meant that the College has been able to totally fund it from applications to trusts. We have now started on the process of updating our 10 year plan and producing a new 5 year plan that will allow us to start on new building projects mid 2017.

The new OSH laws came into effect this year and there have been considerable changes to the way we operate. These are mostly changes that should have been in place previously but for various reasons have not. The new law does not alter what good practice looks like but has altered how lack of good practice is dealt with.

The new Whare is getting closer. One school house has been sold and another one is in negotiations between government departments on the price. Our Architects are working on the drawings so the project can be

Our Architects are working on the drawings so the project can be consented and then it is just a case of managing the project in a timely fashion. Our aim is to have it functional for the Tai Tokerau Festival.

We have added some bar height tables and stools to most rooms in the school with half of the tables having whiteboard tops. We will add more diverse types of furniture to classrooms again at the start of next year.

**Going digital** Steady progress is being made on our digital journey. Staff are to be congratulated on their work to date. Our digital footprint increased enough to require an upgrade from a 100mb to a 500mb fibre connection. There were some teething troubles with our wireless setup but these have been sorted and now there are minimal connectivity issues.

The most common question from parents is still what ICT device to buy. Any tablet, apple or android 4 or above, will do the job for students from year 7 to midway through year 10. Mid to late year 10 to year 13 a laptop becomes the better option for students. Students are adept at using any sort of device and can make very worthwhile use of phones, tablets or laptops, all at the same time, by taking advantage of their individual strengths. In most cases students just use whichever device is the closest. As a Principal I consistently use two laptops, a smart phone and a tablet and I would not like this selection reduced in any way. We will publish via email to parents further information on devices before the end of 2016. There are some exciting changes coming with computers with digital styluses that will make them a preferred type of purchase for older students.

**PTA** A big thank you to the PTA and to our Caretaker who have worked on the grounds through working bees this year. The gardens are looking wonderful and the tidying up of our boundaries by the removal of noxious trees is starting to look good also.

The PTA's major fund raiser, the "Tides Out Fun Run & Walk" was a tremendous success with 450 people taking part. We look forward to this continuing to grow.

The major focus of PTA meetings is getting to know about the College and the debates are lively.

**Financial** The Board agreed to a budget with a cash surplus of \$85,000 this year. We are on track to achieve this.

We have maintained 2 Japanese students from Jin-ai Girls High School in Japan for 2016 and will have 1 in 2017.

**Board Changes** The Board completed the review of the Strategic Plan in 2015 and we have been full steam ahead on the new plan for 2016. The triennial elections took place in May and the elected board members are Selina Gordon, Jimmy Miller, Derek Heiwari, Jane McQueen, Mike Swords, Fiona Macgregor and Tayla Marriner. Heather Jacobson joined the board through the selection process and Ramari Pirihi and Rea Whaanga have been recently co-opted as Maori trustees. Welcome to Scott Crawley as Student Trustee from October.

A big thank you to outgoing board members Peter van Cingel, a previous board chair (1 term) and to Graham Hargreaves the previous board chair (2 terms) for their service to the community.

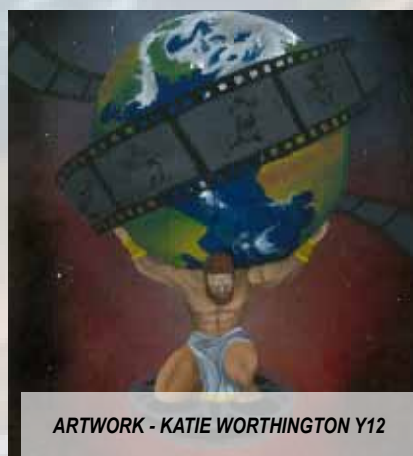

# BOT

## atena koutou katoa

The Board provides the direction of the college in collaboration with the community and the staff. At our most recent meeting we reviewed our strategic goals and confirmed that they were still valid.

### Significant Achievements

The academic progress of our students is paramount. The Board is pleased to be able to confirm that the expected academic results for 2016 are better than our 2015 results which were all above the National averages. We receive updates on achievement at each Board meeting. Our systems are good enough that, as a Board, we can confidently comment on expected results.

In the past students were assessed for key competencies. This year a change was made and students are now assessed for the 6C's which are deemed to be attributes that employers want in their employees. The 6C's are to be able to communicate clearly, work collaboratively, think critically, embrace culture, develop creativity and utilise connectivity. We always ask for improvements and we look forward to seeing further improved results with this change to tracking the 6C's and the ability to identify students' risk levels.

The College is well known for its performing arts abilities and all students are to be congratulated for this. This year there were two exceptional results that I wish to draw attention to. First, our Stage Challenge performance winning the local competition and then also taking out the National Award for Drama and second, two of our students are in the band Alien Weaponry which won both the Smokefree Rockquest and the Pacifica Beats national competitions. Not only are they the

youngest band to win these competitions but they are also the first to win both competitions. Congratulations to Henry and Lewis de Jong and Alien Weaponry.

This year, outdoor exercise equipment was purchased. Half of the equipment has been installed beside the Horticulture / Gymnasium area. The rest will be installed around the fields over Christmas. It has been a significant learning curve importing the gear directly from China but the savings to the school are huge; \$40k, and we have more equipment than we thought we would be able to purchase.

The Board's project to build a new whare at the front of the school has gained momentum. We are finally nearing the end of the sale process for 2 of our school houses which will net the college \$400,000 to be spent on the new whare. It has been a long process but the Board is now hopeful that, with the school managing the project to save costs, the building will be built by the end of term one next year.

### New Scholarship

We wish to acknowledge Helen and Bruce Matheson for donating \$55,000 to create a new Scholarship for the college to be known as the "Harvey Abercrombie Scholarship." A maximum of \$5000 per year will be awarded until the capital and interest is depleted. This will be awarded to a student or students studying towards qualifications related to the primary industries.

### Current issues

We are moving closer to all students having a digital device. The Board is keen to see some definitive data on this and to explore options, should they be needed, to make sure students are not disadvantaged. Currently through our computer pods we have between 7 and 9 terminals available in all classrooms.

How does one do it? We are successfully accelerating the learning of students who come into our school 3 or 4 years below their year level to a stage where they can achieve NCEA level 2 in year 12 or the beginning of year 13. The challenge is to accelerate them further so that they achieve the qualification easily and have pathways into NCEA level 3 and further education.

The board is confident that the focus on deep learning will produce results for these students. It is thanks to our teachers, the development of individual learning programmes and to the students themselves that this is being achieved.

The College has commenced its process of working with the Ministry of Education to create a new 10-year property plan and a new 5-year agreement which will see significant work undertaken once again in the College. The Board has two more school houses in the disposal process which will contribute an extra \$800,000 to the approximately \$900,000 being provided by the Ministry of Education. We are hoping to get agreement to use the bulk of this money to remove the prefabs in the middle of the school and build an innovative learning block for the year 7 and 8 classes.

The creation of Halls of Fame for the College, where we recognise achievements at the highest levels, is part of our Strategic Plan but due to many reasons has not progressed. We look forward to the College displaying proudly the achievements of its past pupils for all to see.

The board was pleased to see the College take on the role of running the Tai Tokerau Festival for 2017 and we are sure that it will be remembered as positively as our last hosted festival in 2007. The teaching staff and community groups are well down the track with organisation. It is hoped that the Whare will be built in time for the festival.

## Board Update

The triennial elections took place in May. Although we have six places, only five parents were willing to take on the responsibilities of being a Trustee, Selena Gordon, Derek Heiwari, Jimmy Millar, Mike Swords and myself. We then went through the formal selection process and gained Heather Jacobson. Fiona MacGregor was voted on as the teacher Trustee. Since then, the annual election of the student Trustee has taken place with Scott Crawley being elected. At our most recent meeting we co-opted two Māori representatives onto the Board, Ramari Pirihi and Rea Tipene.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome our newest members. We are now a Board of

I would like to thank the outgoing Board members for their service to the College, to student Trustee Tayla Marriner; we wish her well for her future; to Peter van Cingal who served one term and was chairperson last year and to Graham Hargreaves who served for two terms and was chairperson for four of those years.

On behalf of the Board, thank you also Principal, Wayne Buckland and staff of Bream Bay College. As Board members we learn just how much you do for our students. And finally the students, farewell to all of you who are leaving, may your futures be bright and happy.

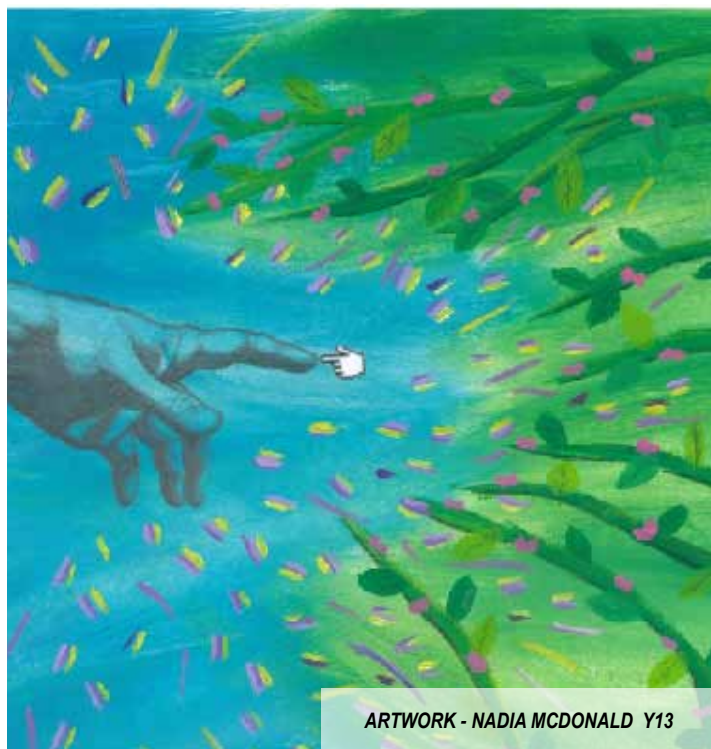
I would like to end my report with a whakatauki that I recently read. It sums up the Board and I think each classroom and the school as a whole. It means it takes all kinds of people.

### social science

Social Science has had just three Heads of Department since the start of the College in Bream Bay. Clive Cramer was HOD when we arrived in 1978 and kept the position for many years before leaving for Auckland; then it was Eric Hansen's turn and finally I took over in 2005 after completing a degree in History. Compared to other departments where HODs have come and gone over the years this shows remarkable longevity and also a deep interest for the various topics the department covers. While we can accept the current push for sciences, technology, and engineering from government and universities, the importance of Social Science should not be ignored. It is after all about people and the world we live in and that world today, politically and economically, seems to be struggling in uncertain times. This makes it even more essential for Social Science subjects so students can learn the reasons for this uncertainty.

Nationalism is on the rise in Europe partly due to the biggest movement of refugees since WW2, there is an anti-globalisation movement, technology has replaced the work of millions of people, the young are not voting, there is a general feeling of disillusionment towards politicians and politics in general, political commentators are saying it feels like the 1920-30s and finally the outcome of an acrimonious U.S. election this coming week (at the time of writing) may make things difficult for

our small trading nation.

Therefore it continues to be essential that the students in our department are; taught to think critically, taught the importance of caring for the environment, encouraged to learn our history and what makes other countries (especially our trading partners) similar or different, to be proud of our country's achievements, be encouraged to use technology as a producer not just a consumer, uphold democratic beliefs and above all develop a passion for learning which may lead to making a difference somewhere or for someone. This is what Social Science is about.

Trips have been always been a main feature of most Social Science subjects and it was Clive Craymer who first took senior students on field trips to the South Island. These days students are taken overseas. I wonder how many of our students have even been to the beautiful and different South Island. Soon it might be full of tourists and be too expensive for locals to visit and sadly even then Clive had to end those trips because at that time internal air travel became more expensive than flights to Australia. Eric Hansen took his Geography students all over the place too and he particularly encouraged visits to Waitangi and the Treaty grounds with his interest in our early history. Eric also started the Year 9 trip to Wellington and Parliament, a trip which still continues today.

Before becoming HOD I was able to take my social studies classes on day trips without having to fill the bus with 50 students along with other huge planning logistics. The trips would end at the wonderful Matakōhe Museum but on the way I would take the class to various other local attractions that I would scout out each year such as; the Cove Tannery, a huge piggery at Matakōhe where a sow helpfully gave





class to various other local attractions that I would scout out each year such as; the Cove Tannery, a huge piggery at Matakōhe where a sow helpfully gave birth to 11 piglets to a very silent and attentive bunch of kids, (one of those students is now current HOD of Years 7 and 8, Victoria Foster), an absolutely amazing glass blowing exhibition just for us at Pahi, again to silent and enthralled kids, some great trips through the Maungaturoto Dairy company before OSH stopped that and to various local horticulture industries. I miss those trips. The students enjoyed them too as I noticed one year whilst editing a thank you letter for a parent.

It read;

‘Dear Mrs Miller, We loved going in your car because when you went around corners we opened the back doors and leant right out.’ Oh dear I thought, thinking of all the corners on the way to Matakōhe.

We live in a great area and there are so many places to visit and interest students with career ideas but not many businesses these days have the time to show 50 students around. However I do have a photograph of a Year 8 student Sam Matthews of Waipu, sitting at the desk of broadcaster, the late Paul Holmes at TV1 so we must have ventured south too and talked our way in. Ah those were the days.

As HOD I continued for some years the trips to Waitangi but mostly I have concentrated on taking annual trips to Auckland where students have completed various historical tasks at the wonderful War Memorial Museum, and then fitted in other

visits such as Maori Television, the Tip Top Factory, the Howick Pioneer Village, the Sky tower, Bastion Pt, the Auckland Art Gallery, anywhere I could successfully convince people that they would love our large number of kids and at places that might inspire them.

I am very pleased that I was able to introduce a new subject to the department five years ago, Environmental Studies. This subject has been keenly taught by the two teachers and enjoyed by our senior students. Bream Bay provides a great range of sites and situations for field studies with this subject and many students are now furthering their interests at Tertiary level and we applaud their commitment to caring for our beautiful country.

So now it is time to hand the job over to the fourth SS HOD, and I hope they will be enthusiastic and supportive about the six subjects in the department, have the energy and commitment to continue with trips despite the number of forms to fill in, and in general encourage our students to enjoy learning, to continue to go off and see the world, and then come home to make a difference. Each week it seems I hear of ex-students who are finishing a degree, traveling in some foreign country, or taking up some interesting job and I hope this culture from our students continues despite the changing world.

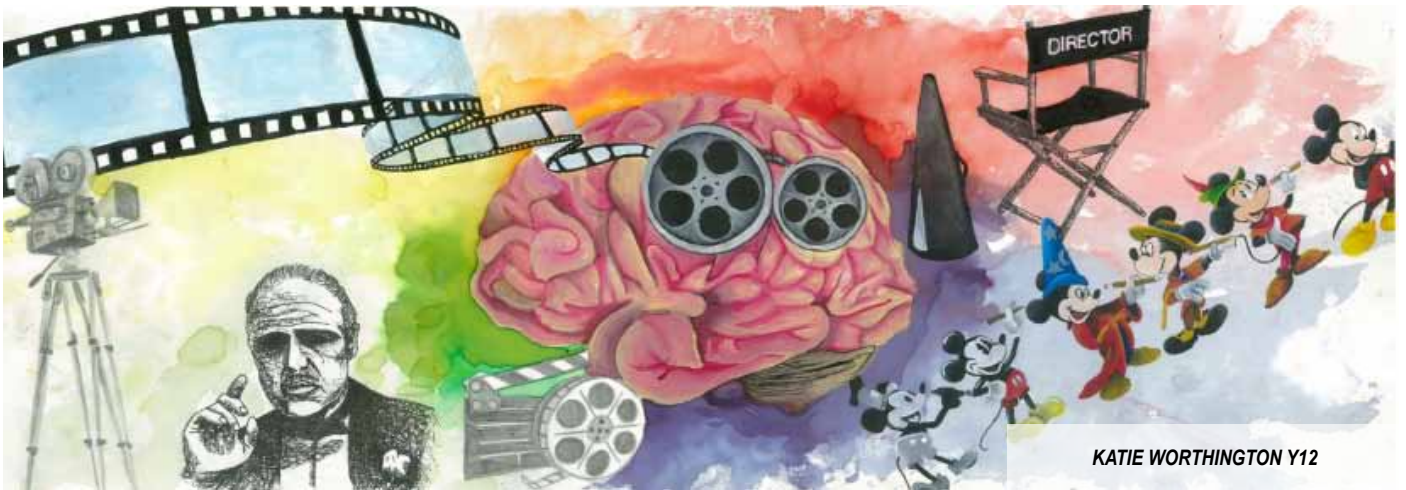

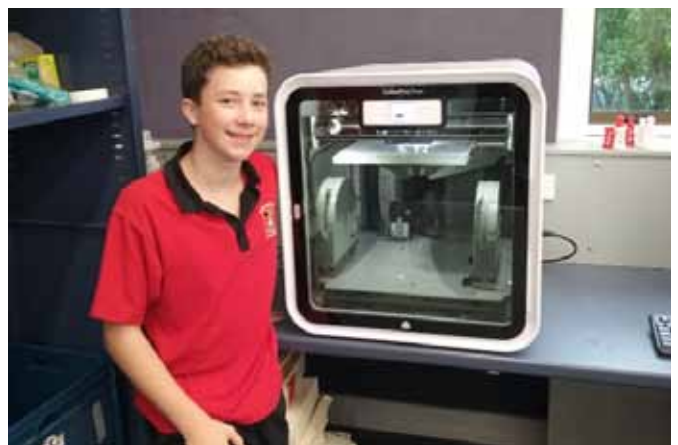

## farnet

FarNet is a network of schools who collaborate to provide access to curriculum and learning opportunities for students through online learning. There are currently 25 schools in the FarNet cluster and Bream Bay College is the fund-holder school of the cluster. The e-Principal of FarNet, Carolyn Alexander-Bennett was welcomed to Bream Bay College earlier this year and whilst she leads FarNet, she is also a member of the Senior Leadership team here.

Bream Bay College's involvement with FarNet has meant that students can now enrol in any curriculum course which they need to achieve their future pathways in a model of distance learning which is far more engaging than the traditional correspondence school model. This year has seen 5 senior students involved in online learning with Level 3 Media Studies, Level 2 Classical Studies, Level 3 English, Level 2 Economics and one junior in Beginner's Japanese. Students attend a weekly video conference class where they see not only their teacher but their fellow class members and use a range of web tools to collaborate, communicate and fully participate in their learning.

One of our online students, **Kasey Carr** met her fellow students and her Economics teacher when she flew to Wellington as part of their field trip. She got to visit Te Papa and the Beehive where she met the Prime Minister, Rt Hon John Keys.

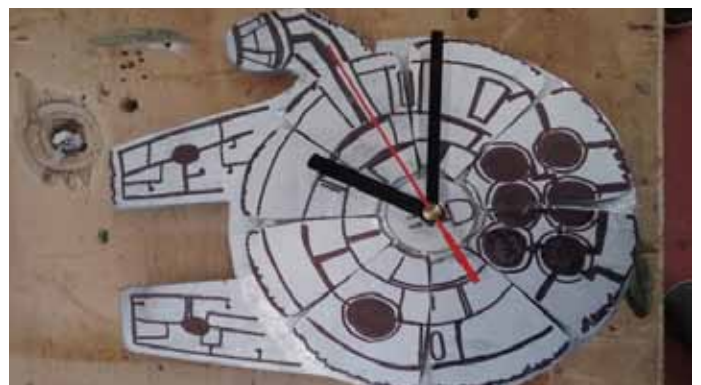
